
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PiT Count Methodology


Nanaimo 2023 Point-in-Time Count 'ENUMERATION'


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
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

- Possibility for rapid rehousing/bridge is greater with shelter

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

 Need for the foreseeable future for more shelter spaces to accommodate new entries and to become vehicles for healing and rapid rehousing.

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




81.2 % homeless for more than 6 of last 12 months (77.1% in 2020)


Reaching Home defines "Chronic" Homelessness as being without housing:

6 of the last 12 months, or 18 of the last 36.










Steps to take to prevent and divert youth and Indigenous individuals from entering homelessness

- 1. Understand reasons for *local* Indigenous and youth homelessness through further study.
- 2. Connect with community partners engaging with partner agencies to develop community-wide, community-led solutions.
- 3. Support service providers with data to apply for funding for solutions.


