



Ekphrasis: Writing the Collection

May 9th to June 7th 2014

Definition: Ekphrasis is the written translation of a visual work of art.

Nanaimo Art Gallery presents *Ekphrasis: Writing the Collection*, an exhibition of works from the permanent collection. For this exhibition seven local writers have been invited to compose new poetic responses to specific artworks. Paintings, prints and sculptures can speak without words, but what do they say to specific

individuals, and how can viewers share their impressions? This exhibition creates the opportunity to read artworks through the perspective of other artists working in the medium of language.

The questions of how visual art (image) and poetry (words) relate to each other can lead to the term ekphrasis. Originating in ancient Greece and taught as a rhetorical device where the purpose is not only to describe an object, but to share the emotional experience and content of it as well. Using ekphrastic poetry, one can bring the experience or essence of an object to the listener or reader through highly detailed descriptive writing.

The world we live in today is saturated with images from advertising, television, magazines, and especially computers and handheld devices. There is less need for visual description when high quality reproductions surround us and many images are easily found through Google. The speed with which we take in images rarely leaves time for thoughtful consideration. Ekphrasis is a way to deepen the conversation by giving artworks careful attention. Works of visual art often have an ineffable quality that, while impossible to put into words, can also be the paradoxical spur that compels us to try. The goal of *Ekphrastic* poetry is to surpass mere description in order to embody qualities that are beyond the physical aspects of the work it observes.

The Exhibition features new acquisitions by prominent BC artist and former Vancouver Island University professor, Ian Garrioch; prominent artist and VIU alumnus Brendan Lee Satish Tang and internationally acclaimed artist, Sonny Assu. Poems and texts responding to these and other artworks have been created especially for the show by Naomi Beth Wakan, Nanaimo Poet Laureate; Lisa Webster-Gibson, spoken word artist, visual artist, and musician; Valentina Cardanilli, local artist and creative instigator; as well as responses from NAG staff Jacqueline Yeo, writer and art education assistant; Chris Kuderle, administrative director; Rob Bos, downtown gallery coordinator, and Jennifer Pierce, poet and gallery assistant. These writer/poet responses are a supplement to the viewers 'own, and merely add an additional lens with which to interpret the artwork.

PROJECT UPDATES

25 Victoria Road - RFP Process:

An RFP to manage the Community Performing Arts Centre at 25 Victoria Road was issued on 2014-Apr-11. A mandatory meeting and building tour was held for prospective proposal call respondents on 2014-Apr-23. Eight persons attended representing 3 non-profit and one for profit arts organization. The proposal response deadline was pushed back from 2014-May-09 to 2014-May-23. One submission was received from the Harbour City Theatre Alliance and is currently being evaluated.

Port Theatre – Community Performing Arts Centre (CPAC) Community Consultation Process:

The Port Theatre has created an organizational committee tasked with designing and implementing a community consultation process for the Port Theatre's proposed CPAC expansion. The consultation process will include four engagement events as follows:

- a traditional open house (completed on 2014-May-22);
- a panel discussion (scheduled for 2014-Jun-05);
- a high energy "design jam" workshop (scheduled for 2014-Jun-19); and finally
- a summary/what we heard open house (mid-September, 2014)

Additional stakeholder and user group interviews will also occur during this period. A project summary document has been completed and will be available for viewing and discussion at the various events, along with a series of survey questions. All documents will also be available for viewing on the Port Theatre website.

In is anticipated that the results of the community consultation process will be summarized and presented to City Council in late September/early October by the Port Authority along with a request for project support and a funding commitment.

- Cemetery Heritage Drive (Design and 1,000 Copy Print Run) working in partnership with the Nanaimo Museum.
- Heritage Bike Tour City Core (Design and 1,000 Copy Print Run) working in partnership with ACES, and spin off from Bike to Work Week.

Heritage Interpretive Signs:

- Wellington Pioneers/Jimmy Claxton (Early Black American baseball player born in Wellington) – Interpretive Sign for placement (Design and installation) – working in partnership with Wellington Neigbourhood Association and Nanaimo African Heritage Society the informational sign will provide information on the history of the Wellington Area, plus a special section on Jimmy Claxton.
- Westwood Lake Heritage Interpretive Sign (Design and installation) working in partnerships with descendents of the Westwood family and the City's P,R&E Dept. the informational sign will provided information on Westwood Lake park, and its connection to the Westwood family, and the early settlement of this area of Nanaimo.

Heritage Plaques:

 Placement of plaque marking 100th anniversary of War Measures Act – working in partnership with the Ukrainian Canadian Civil Liberties Association. Plaque will be provided by the Association and installed on the Queen Elizabeth Waterfront Walk near the Yacht Club – unveiling will occur as part of ceremony held across Canada at 11:00 a.m. on 2014-Aug-22.

EVENTS

2014 Paint-Out/Shoot-Out - Update:



A Paint-Out/Shoot-Out has been held in partnership with the Nanaimo Arts Council since 1997. This year's event is scheduled for Sunday, July 27 in tandem with the Bathtub Festival street fair. Local artists and photographers will be randomly assigned a heritage building located in the downtown core, primarily along Commercial Street, to paint or photograph on a time limited basis. Finished pieces will then be judged later Sunday afternoon. The event will begin at 10:00 a.m. and finish by 4:00 p.m. with judging and then awarding of cash prizes. The C&H Dept. will provide a \$1,000 budget for prizes, as well as coffee/tea/cookies. In turn, the Arts Council organizes the event, participant registration and promotion. The event has been a successful vehicle for raising the profile of both downtown heritage and the arts.

PROJECT UPDATES:

Public Art - 2014 Temporary Public Art Selections Installed:

On 2014-MAY-16, two temporary public art pieces were installed:

1. Laura Timmerman's Heshook-ish Tsawalk (an artist's **interpretation** of Nuu-chaanulth First Nation community's "Heshook-ish Tsawalk", meaning all things are connected and inter-dependent upon one another). Adopted by Council 2014-MAR-03.

The project faces the Port Theatre and Front Street giving the project high visibility to traffic and pedestrians. Next to the location is the stairwell or gateway from the waterfront to the Diana Krall Plaza. This location was chosen not only for the high visibility but the low impact on the structure that a temporary art piece can have due to the installation and securing of the project.





2. Dan Ritchie's Pacific Octopus, a supersized, shiny sea creature nestled along the Nanaimo shoreline. Adopted by Council 2014-MAR-10.

The project faces the Millstone Estuary next to the waterfront pathway. This makes the project highly visible to pedestrians and visitors to Maffeo Sutton Park. This location was chosen not only for the high visibility but the low impact on the structure that a temporary art piece can have due to the installation and securing of the project.



Poet Laureate:

As previously noted, the City of Nanaimo and Nanaimo Daily News have collaborated to start a monthly poetry column to encourage Nanaimo's writers to celebrate poetry.

A total of 25 submissions were received for the month of May. Thirteen (13) of those submissions were from Fairview Community School elementary students. Two poems were selected (a haiku from a grade 5 student Jeffery Adams; and "Nanaimo: What's in a Name? by Judy Millar) and published in the 2014-MAY-29 edition of the Daily News.

<u>Here's what Naomi had to say about May's poem selections:</u> We are so delighted to see such a generous submission of poems this month. Thank you all for sending them in. We are so sorry we can't print more of them.

Two poems for this month, for a load of young poets from Grade 5, Fairview Elementary, tried their hand at a Nanaimo-themed poem. To acknowledge their efforts, in addition to their regular selection, the selection committee chose to add a small poem from one of the students A big "thank you" to teacher, Noreen Keen, for encouraging them. For the poem of the month, the wonderful writer and performer from Nanaimo, Judy Millar showed her true colours. I really had my fingers crossed hoping that this was the poem that the committee would choose, and it was. Of the young writers, Jeffery's "snapshot" of a Nanaimo moment is so familiar. Somehow his linking of people on the land and people on the ferries emphasizes Nanaimo's past and present

as a hub city with people coming and going. The mention of Newcastle Island also introduces a seasonal feel of tourists who come to enjoy the region.

Judy's fun poem offers rhyme where it is very welcome — in witty poetry. Almost rhymes (they are called "slant" rhymes), such as "Pot" and "distraught" remind one that Ogden Nash is not the only poet whose attempts at rhyme make you wince and laugh out loud. Judy is a master at these "not quite" rhymes. The archives state that the original word was "Snuneymuxw", but we left it as the poet chose to write it. I actually don't know some of the roads Judy mentions, and probably you don't either, so let's get our maps out and find them. Poetry can do that, that is, make you curious, draw you in so that you are involved, make you want to try to express things that way yourself. I do hope so.

EVENTS:

Cultural Awards:

The 2015 Cultural Awards will be held Thursday 2015-APR-09. Revisions to the nomination form have been made. These revisions will now include the specific responsibilities of both the recipient as well and will include the date of the event.

The Nanaimo Cultural Awards Program has been an important program for community building and partnerships since 1998. It brings awareness to the breadth and variety of the cultural activity in our community. It also builds pride in the cultural accomplishments of individuals and organizations and pride in our community. This program also encourages and gives inspiration to aspiring young artists and future cultural leaders of our community.

Culture Days (September 26, 27, 28):

Culture Days is committed to reaching the goal of having all Canadians in every community say "I Love Culture" and making culture a daily habit. The Nanaimo Culture Days Planning Committee (facilitated by the Nanaimo Arts Council, and whose mandate is to assist with the planning, coordinating and implementing of Nanaimo's 2014 Culture Days celebration) met on 2014-MAY-27 to discuss the mandate and goals of Culture Days in Nanaimo. The next meeting will be 2014-JUN-16at the Vancouver Island Regional Library.

Culture Days is a collaborative movement to encourage awareness, participation and engagement of all Canadians in the arts and cultural life of their communities. Now in its fifth year, this Canada-wide celebration represents the largest-ever public participation campaign undertaken by the arts and cultural community in this country. Culture Days will feature free hands-on activities that invite the public to participate in the "behind-the-scenes" world of artists, creators, historians, architects, curators, and designers at work. Through this exchange, artists and creators have a unique opportunity to engage people of all ages in their creative practice. Culture Days will take place September 26th-28th, 2014, in all provinces and territories.

Invaded Spaces:

The CREANIMATION concept transforms everyday urban spaces into exciting and animated cultural spaces. Temporary "Invading Space" installations are a way of animating underused areas or reinvigorating a space where permanent installations are not possible. CREANIMATION can be used to introduce future re-development, potential landscaping schemes, and a sense of community and culture vitality.

On 2014-MAY-12, the City of Nanaimo demonstrated *CREANIMATION through Collaboration*: showing how "Invading spaces" can transform urban spaces into exciting cultural spaces enhancing the Cultural Vitality for the surrounding area. There were approximately 100 visitors in total that were engaged by the space with many standing back and observing the space. There was a live painting and entertainment on site to assist in the activation of the space.



Park(ing) Day:

Park(ing) Day has been scheduled for Friday, 2014-SEP-19, to recognize International Park(ing) Day.

Park(ing) Day is an annual open-source global event where citizens, artists and activists collaborate to temporarily transform designated parking spaces into "PARK(ing)" spaces: temporary public places. The concept began in 2005 when a local San Francisco art and design studio, converted a single metered parking space into a temporary public park in downtown San Francisco. Since 2005, PARK(ing) Day has evolved into a global movement, with organizations and individuals (operating independently of this gallery but following an established set of guidelines) creating new forms of temporary public space in urban contexts around the world.
