RE: 2013 TEMPORARY OUTDOOR PUBLIC ART SELECTIONS

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

That the Cultural Committee recommend that Council approve the 2013 Temporary Outdoor Public Art selections.

PURPOSE:

To have approvals in place to allow the artists to begin their art works and complete by early May (public art week).

BACKGROUND:

At their meeting held on 2014-JAN-22, the Public Art Selection Panel reviewed the outdoor art submissions and chose three pieces for public display.

DISCUSSION:

Temporary public art displays are becoming a common method for municipalities to animate outdoor spaces and parks. Viewing of the changing art pieces provides people a reason to attend the parks and "check out" new pieces of art. Because the art pieces are not permanent, they can also be conservative or controversial, yet advance public art programs at a low cost to the municipality.

We are now in our fifth year of displaying temporary outdoor public art in conjunction with the Nanaimo Art Gallery.

In September 2013, the City of Nanaimo Purchasing Department issued a joint Call to Artists requesting submissions for outdoor art. This call closed in mid-January 2014 with 3 artists/teams submitting concepts for consideration. Outdoor venues with a special emphasis on downtown parks and the Harbourfront Walkway are available to the artists and pieces are to be installed in May 2014 during public art week.

On 2014-JAN-22 the seven-member selection panel, comprised of representatives from the Parks Recreation and Culture Commission, the Cultural Committee, the Nanaimo Art Gallery, and City of Nanaimo staff met.

They evaluated the submissions based upon the following selection criteria:

- 1. Quality of the proposal;
- 2. quality of the submitted work;
- 3. suitability and durability of the work (i.e. its ability to withstand a year of external installation);
- 4. ability of the proposal to meet public safety and vandalism consideration; and,
- 5. addition of vitality to the public space.

Three pieces recommended will be going on display in City outdoor parks for the one-year period. Honoraria for these four pieces will total up to \$12,000. A summary of the pieces is attached (Schedule A). The chosen pieces are made various materials and themes. If approved, the temporary outdoor public art pieces will be installed jointly in May by the City of Nanaimo and the artists. The artists will retain ownership of their works and will remove their works at the end of the installation period.

The Nanaimo Art Gallery, the City of Nanaimo, and the artists will then partner together to create interpretive and didactic materials for the works and to educate the public on outdoor art and temporary art programs. In addition, plaques recognizing the artists and describing their pieces will be on display with each piece and available in a brochure format.

In an ongoing effort to continually improve the outdoor art program, a survey will be developed to discuss potential modifications to the program for 2015.

STRATEGIC PLAN CONSIDERATIONS:

Community Building Partnerships: Public art helps animate our public places and spaces making them more welcoming, attractive and interesting, contributing to cultural vitality. This piece will engage visitors to the Service and Resource Center and make their visit more interesting and enjoyable.


Laura Timmermans






His piece will emulate the girth, the bark, the moss, the sap, and all the colors and textures of a tree. His work will be positioned to allow viewers to see all sides of the tree as well as the top.



STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

That the Cultural Committee recommend that Council receives this information.

PURPOSE:

To update the committee about the outdoor art pieces currently on display.

BACKGROUND:

The outdoor temporary art program, a joint partnership between the City of Nanaimo and Nanaimo Art Gallery (NAG), is entering its' fifth year of displaying temporary outdoor public art in parks. Each year, the outdoor art program has been modified to continually improve.

Under the terms of a partnership between NAG and City of Nanaimo between 2010 and 2012, NAG retained ownership of temporary public art pieces commissioned by City and displayed at City venues. Initially, these pieces were constructed and intended to be on display for a one year duration. The intent was that the Gallery would sell these works after the one year display period. Auction proceeds were to be split between both partners. This arrangement proved not to be very profitable or sustainable and, as a result, was modified in 2013.

For the past year, artists have loaned their work for exhibition on public land for a period of 12 months. The auction element has been removed from the program and artists have retained ownership of their pieces, and are responsible for removing them after the exhibition. Currently, the City administers the program and NAG provides some support and consultation.

Attempts have been made by Nanaimo Art Gallery to sell remaining works from 2011 and 2012 without success. The City agreed that works could remain in place for an extended period, and the Gallery has agreed to deal with the remaining works and find resolutions in early 2014. NAG is responsible for the works listed in this document.

In 2013, the City approved the donation by NAG of Jason Gress' work *Frame*, which has become an important landmark at Maffeo Sutton Park.

DISCUSSION:

Twelve art works are currently on display in City Parks. The following chart identifies the pieces and artists, the dates of installation, and timeframe for removals.

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TERMS OF REFERENCE NANAIMO CULTURE AND HERITAGE COMMISSION

(adopted ####-MON-##)

Mandate

The Nanaimo Culture and Heritage Commission acts as a resource to Council by providing policy advice for the planning, development and provision of City culture services and facilities, heritage conservation matters, and promoting and supporting activities that benefit and advance culture and heritage in the City.

Scope of Work

To achieve these objectives, the Nanaimo Culture and Heritage Commission will undertake the following activities:

- Advise Council on culture and heritage conservation matters, issues and priorities;
- Advise Council on opportunities for culture development and the implications of development on Nanaimo's heritage through participation (single seat) on the Design Advisory Panel;
- Assist with the development of culture and heritage policy, planning goals, objectives, and priorities as set by Council;
- Receive submissions on relevant culture and heritage matters from individuals and groups;
- Improve public awareness and support for culture development and heritage preservation and the importance of archeological sites and material;

Objectives

The Commission will act as a liaison with community groups, agencies, the public, business and other government sectors. In addition, the Commission will work to develop, promote and maintain community support for culture and heritage by:

- Advising Council on cultural, heritage and heritage conservation matters, issues and priorities.
- Reviewing all applications for funding and making recommendations to Council
- based on criteria and guidelines established regarding the distribution of various cultural and heritage grants.
- Promoting public awareness of cultural and heritage organizations and cultural and heritage activities in our community, and maintaining a cultural and heritage awards program.
- Coordinates the selection process for works of art for display in municipal public spaces and buildings.

 Sponsoring annual educational opportunities for arts, cultural and heritage organizations.

Membership

The Commission will be comprised of 11 Council appointed members, as follows:

- two (2) members of Council, with one appointed as Chair and the other Vice-Chair; and,
- nine (9) community-at-large members.

Appointment and Term

Members may only serve two consecutive, three year terms. Re-appointment to the Commission may be considered after an absence for at least one term.

Meetings

The Nanaimo Culture and Heritage Commission will meet monthly, or at the call of the Chair.

Members missing three (3) consecutive monthly meetings are deemed to have resigned.

Authority and Related Documents

The Nanaimo Culture and Heritage Commission Terms of Reference supplements other Council bylaws and documents, including:

- · Advisory Committees Terms of Reference, and
- Council Procedure Bylaw 2007 No. 7060.

The Nanaimo Culture and Heritage Commission is a select committee of Council as per the *Community Charter.*



ADVISORY COMMITTEES TERMS OF REFERENCE

(adopted 2010-JAN-25)

The following Terms of Reference apply to all Advisory Committees of the City of Nanaimo unless otherwise noted.

Appointment and Term

The member(s) of Council will be appointed annually by motion of Council.

Other members will be appointed for a three-year term commencing April 1st in the year following a general local government election (does not apply to PNAC). At-large members will be appointed by Council. Council will ratify appointments of members recommended by their specific associations.

Members of the Committee will serve without remuneration.

Chair

The Committee will elect the Chair annually at the first meeting following April 1st from amongst its members.

Meeting Procedures

All points of procedure not specifically provided for in these Terms of Reference shall be decided and determined in accordance with the current Council Procedure Bylaw.

Except where the provisions of the *Community Charter* apply, all Committee meetings shall be open to the public. Where the Committee wishes to close a meeting to the public, it may do so by adopting a resolution in accordance with the *Community Charter*.

The order of business is to be as set out in an agenda package to be provided to Committee members in advance of the meeting date. All decisions of the Committee will be reached by consensus or a majority vote of the members present.

Minutes of the meeting will be adopted by the Committee at its next regular meeting. After adoption, minutes will be circulated to Council for their information. Originals of the minutes will be signed by the Chair of the Committee and forwarded to the Legislative Services Department for safe keeping.

Reporting to Council

The Committee may report to Council on any issue within its mandate or other issues as requested by Council.

The Committee Chair will present recommendations of the Committee to Council for their consideration.

Budget

The annual budget of the responsible department will include funds for the operation of the Committee.

Staff Support

Staff support will be determined by the City Manager or his/her designate. Typical support functions include the following:

- Organizing and preparing the agenda, in conjunction with the Committee Chair;
- · Distributing the agenda packages to Committee members;
- · Taking and preparing draft minutes;
- · Managing the files of the Committee, as necessary;
- · Maintaining a list of outstanding issues for Committee action;
- In conjunction with the Chair, drafting Committee reports to Council;
- Provide professional advice on issues discussed by the Committee;
- Other duties as authorized by the City Manager or his/her designate

CRIMSON COAST DANCE SOCIETY

City of Nanaimo, Parks, Recreation and Culture Cultural Operating Grant for 2013/2014

1. Briefly describe the operation and history of your organization.

Crimson Coast Dance Society is dedicated to the development, support and presentation of professional dance and is one of a very few such dance presentation companies operating in a setting outside of major urban areas such as Montreal, Toronto, and Vancouver. This gives CCDS a rare status, reflecting not only on the cultural position of Nanaimo, but also on our place within the Canadian context. We engage and pay nationally, internationally and regionally recognized artists and stage technicians to present affordable, accessible productions. We offer contemporary dance in a variety of styles and settings, and through a variety of formats, in order to engage as wide a spectrum of our population as possible.

Crimson Coast offers performing mentorships to pre-professional students or emerging artists, and provides coaching and/or paid opportunities to dance alongside some of North America's finest performers. The opportunity for dancers to interact directly with professionals is not one that can be created in a dance class, and provides a true picture of a performer's life. It also provides valuable experience in handling technical rehearsals that are far beyond the scope of rehearsals provided in dance academies.

Crimson Coast Dance Society also programs outreach events and performance opportunities that are educational in nature for dance enthusiasts at a grassroots level. Our Body Talk Project is directed by a council of youth between the ages of 14 and 18, who, under the guidance of a facilitator, learn arts and other administration or production skills whilst participating in the Project.

Since incorporation in 1998, Crimson Coast Dance Society has produced over 250 dance-related events, ranging from formal mainstage presentations to informal events, for people of all ages. Our events are either ticketed at below national/city average prices or have been offered free of charge/by donation.

Crimson Coast Dance Society is viewed as a model of innovation in outreach into our community by the British Columbia Arts Council Dance Section. We have had a relationship with this provincial arts funding body since our inception in 1998. Canadian Heritage, Canada Council for the Arts and the British Columbia Arts Council support our work with steady funding.

2. Describe the specific cultural activity or project to which the grant funding would be applied; describe the need for this activity in the community and the level of community involvement. *Maximum two pages*.

Our 2013/2014 season of **Dance on the Crimson Coast**, marks our 16th year of presenting professional dance in Nanaimo. The cultural activities to which the grant funding would be applied are:

- Presentation of New Animal by 605 Collective at the Port Theatre, November 9th 605 collective consists of some of the hottest young dancers in British Columbia. This new work has been creating much interest since it's premier in late 2012 at The Cultch in Vancouver and has resulted in national and international touring. Two performers from the Company will present 2 workshops, one for adults and one for teens on November 7th and 8th.
- Presentation of Peggy Baker Dance Company part of their Western Canada tour, in January 2014. The company, led by world renowned contemporary dance artist Peggy Baker will perform at Malaspina Theatre at VIU, and will also be offering a week-long residency. Ms. Baker is acclaimed as one of the most outstanding contemporary dancers of her generation. She is the recipient of numerous awards including a Governor General's Award for Lifetime Achievement in the Arts, the Order of Canada, the Order of Ontario, the 2006 Premier's Award for Excellence in the Arts, three Dora Mavor Moore Awards for Outstanding and an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Calgary.
- Facilitation of the seven month process with a group of high school age youth to develop and present the Body Talk Project culminating in a week of subsidized workshops during March Spring Break, and with a public performance on March 22nd. Body Talk 2014 features a fusion of Hip Hop and Swing dance and will involve visiting professional guest artists in these styles. Once again, this important Project is created for our community by our mentored youth Body Talk Cru, which has already begun meetings to produce this year's event.
- As indicated, each of these three presentations is surrounded by outreach
 activities that give our community direct interaction with our guest artists. These
 include classes, workshops, week-long residencies, discussions, forums
 roundtables, and other public events involving the visiting dance artists with
 community members and groups, as well as our season-long innovative Body
 Talk Project, directed by our youth Body Talk Cru.

CCDS will also be presenting our 14th annual four day **InFrinGinG Dance Festival** in July. For the second year, we will present this Festival within and as part of the Nanaimo Dragon Boat Festival. The huge success of this partnership in 2013 will be built upon with mainstage performances, workshops, dialogues and other dance events, as well as a number of ticketed performances at the Vancouver Island Conference Centre. We will feature professional dance artists from many parts of Canada, as well as local professional and pre-professional performers. While this festival is not directly funded through CCDS' operating grant from the City of Nanaimo, the Festival could not occur without The City of Nanaimo's support of CCDS as a Nanaimo institution.

CCDS' programming and projects are primary examples of responding to needs and opportunities identified in the draft City of Nanaimo Cultural Plan. Specific examples include:

- Section 5.1 "Build stronger relationships with, and between, cultural
 organizations and businesses and increase opportunities for working together to
 build capacity within organizations." CCDS collaboration with the Nanaimo
 Dragon Boat Festival to present the InFrinGinG Dance festival of our focus on
 collaborative approaches to build culture in Nanaimo.
- Section 5.1.b. "Facilitate grassroots arts/cultural opportunities from a young age
 and based in neighbourhoods and schools." CCDS' Body Talk project is a preeminent example of a youth focused and youth driven, grassroots cultural
 project, undertaken in collaboration with SD 68 and with the VIU Child and Youth
 Care degree program to provide a practicum for a student. These efforts also
 respond to strategy C in section 6.1
- Section 5.2.b. "Leverage our cultural assets and resources to make Nanaimo a
 desirable place to visit for interesting and unique cultural experiences." As noted
 above, the existence of an organization like CCDS outside of the major urban
 centres is rare, and the programs presented by CCDS draw audience from a
 much wider area than the City of Nanaimo. Since 2008 the number of
 professional dance artists in Nanaimo has increased from 1 to 6. 2 of the 5 new
 local artists are here directly because of the dance activity generated by CCDS.
- Section 6.3, Strategy C "Create a mentorship program where professionals connect with and mentor aspiring young artists and creative entrepreneurs." The Body Talk program is exactly the program identified in this strategy, and could usefully serve as a template for expanded mentorship across a wide range of artistic and other activities in Nanaimo.

Crimson Coast's development over the last 15 years is attributed to its commitment to community through which it has sought to engage, serve, and educate the audience, strengthen the community, support emerging dance artists, and provide a professional presentation infrastructure for national and international artists. The community of Nanaimo is rapidly transforming to include an extended network of professional arts organizations and audiences that value contemporary dance and can place it in a national context. There are many city goals and community desires that we contribute to through our programming. These include experience of diversity in artistic programming; forming community connections; learning new skills; creative expression, and participation in activities that contribute to one's overall health, intergenerational inclusiveness, youth engagement.

We continue to seek partnerships for every production. We have worked with special needs, educational, and social resource organizations, and have strived to cross all economic, gender, cultural, and age barriers. There is an ongoing partnership with Tillicum Lelum, and this is showing an increase in participation (in outreach programs and audience) by aboriginal youth. Partnerships with local businesses (art galleries, clothing stores, dance studios, cafés, libraries, specialty shops) provide venues or donations and in return benefit from an increased public profile. In addition to our Festival involvement with Nanaimo Dragon Boat Society, frequent co-production opportunities are developed with The Port Theatre. CCDS participates in many community initiated events, and is an active participant in Made In BC, the province-wide assembly of presenters that tours featured B.C. artists annually, and offers support for risk-taking programming.

The mission of Crimson Coast Dance Society is to develop and support professional dance creations, productions, performances and educational opportunities at both grassroots and professional levels in central Vancouver Island.

The vision of Crimson Coast Dance Society is:

- to create regional working opportunities and to provide an environment for central Vancouver Island based, emerging dance artists to develop and demonstrate their craft:
- to provide performance and teaching opportunities for regional, national and international dance professionals;
- to create educational opportunities for the local dance community;
- to develop a discerning audience for dance on central Vancouver Island;
- to offer creative, recreational, and physical activities for the general, regional community interested in dance;
- to create opportunities for the development of skills in performing arts production and administration;
- to contribute to the growing arts community and arts activities in Nanaimo and the central Island region;
- to offer Nanaimo audiences the opportunity to experience artistic excellence in performances by highly regarded Canadian artists presented in shows with high production values, and which reach a broad spectrum of our population.

We are now moving into our 15th year of presenting professional dance in Nanaimo. In looking at our growth as an organization, we have made remarkable strides during those years. We started with a volunteer staff and paid our artists through a split of ticket sales. Now, we have a full-time Artistic Director and a General Manager. We pay our guest artists standard professional fees. Our budget has grown during this time. Crimson Coast Dance Society has established itself as a significant part of the economic and cultural fabric of Nanaimo, and of contemporary dance presentation in Canada.

In 2009, we obtained Federal and Provincial funding which enabled us to review our development as an organization and prepare a 5 year strategic plan, under the guidance of consultant Sandra Thomson. A copy of this plan was supplied with a previous application. In 2012, that plan was updated in a day-long facilitated retreat, and new strategic objectives identified. The Board of the Society continues to work to develop the strategies identified, by setting new action items for our each year. The action list forms part of the agenda at each Board meeting, and the implementation of the plan is considered on an ongoing basis.

In 2010, we obtained funding from British Columbia Arts Council that enabled us to engage a student from VIU on a co-op summer project to review our marketing strategy, and to report on suggested revisions and improvements. The student employed was in the Tourism program at VIU, and the work she carried out produced substantial community feedback and led to her proposing changes to our marketing strategy. In 2013, we received funding from British Columbia Arts Council under their Capacity and Sustainability program awarded to take us to the next stage and engage professionals to redesign our web site and to develop the new marketing strategies though social media. This work is currently under way.

Specific Fundraising Activities and Initiatives

Crimson Coast Dance Society has received funding from various sources at the local, provincial and national levels. We continue to pursue funding at a variety of levels through foundation grants, corporate sponsorships and donations.

In terms of fundraising events, the Board of Directors is continuing to develop a strong and successful fundraising program to specifically support Crimson Coast's programming. In 2013-2014 the organization will focus on developing and implementing a multi-year campaign to increase financial support from and engagement with individuals and businesses in Nanaimo, with a target of \$30,000 in annual giving. In addition, CCDS will continue to develop our two major annual events, the Wee Tipple Party and the recently held Mad Hatter Tea Party, which was a sold-out success.

Request for increased funding from the City of Nanaimo

Over the past few years, CCDS has significantly increased the benefits it provides to Nanaimo. In particular, the development of the Body Talk project has been a key focus. This project specifically addresses many of the key goals identified in the draft Nanaimo Cultural Plan, and could serve as a template for other projects designed to address youth and community engagement in the arts. However, implementing this project costs more than twice as much as the typical theatre presentation that we are funded for. To date CCDS has successfully sustained this project, primarily by accessing start-up funding from the Province. However, the project has now moved beyond the start-up phase, and requires operational funding to be sustained. The requested increase in operating funding to \$32,000 is sought to ensure our ability to continue to facilitate and grow the Body Talk program. We have included separately, a description of the Body Talk Project for those Commission members desiring to familiarize yourselves with this important program.



4. Describe the organizational structure of your organization including staffing complement (volunteer and paid), membership and facilities: both office space and performance/display venues used. *Maximum one page*.

Management structure

Crimson Coast Dance Society is a non-profit, charitable society that is run by a Board of Directors that operates as a governance board as well as a working board. We employ an Artistic Director/Producer whose vision is a driving force behind the events and programs that we offer. Our General Manager Michael Wright who had been in post since 2008, has recently retired, and we expect to begin a search process for a replacement soon. In the meantime, members of the Board have stepped in to take on key management roles on a volunteer basis.

The Board of Directors meets regularly. Board Committees meet regularly to advance planning in areas such as Production (Front of House and Volunteer responsibilities); Personnel; Hospitality (for visiting artists); Membership; Fundraising and Finances.

We highly regard and utilize our circle of volunteers. Our Board of Directors regularly acts as volunteer facilitators for productions, under the guidance of the Artistic Director. They recruit members and others from the community to serve on production committees. These volunteers are provided with instruction for tasks that rely on common sense more than specialized training. We attempt to capitalize on the strength of the individual in matching them with responsibilities. This serves us well and makes for a satisfying experience for the volunteer.

We have a wide membership base, currently standing at 124 members. These members regularly receive information about our activities through specific mailings and invitations to attend workshops at reduced rates.

Office and Performance Venues

Our office is located in The CIBC Centre for the Arts at 150 Commercial Street in downtown Nanaimo. We keep all our records at this location.

The performance venues we rent on a regular basis are: The Port Theatre, Malaspina Theatre at Vancouver Island University, Vancouver Island Conference Centre, Maffeo Sutton Park, as well as local dance studios for workshops.

5. Describe current and planned approaches to audience development - include program planning, marketing and promotion, school programs, and cooperation with other artists, arts organizations and community groups. *Maximum two pages.*

Program Planning

We seek to offer a wide range of dance-related events that speak to the many interests of the people in our community. The Artistic Director is responsible for the review of current and upcoming performances and artists and booking a season of presentations that fit the experience of our audience, whilst occasionally pushing boundaries, all the while remaining true to the current form of modern dance. The works, therefore, range from classical-modern productions in standard venues to avant-garde productions in alternative spaces. Our Body Talk Project, because of its youth-orientated nature, usually features a fusion of hip hop with popular ethnic dance styles. This varied programming enables our community to experience the wide range of contemporary dance that is available. It also ensures that programs are designed to fit a wide range of dance enthusiasts and potential new audience members.

Artists visiting the community are engaged to teach or mentor while they are here. These activities support a strong local dance community and give members of that community knowledge of current contemporary dance techniques and choreographic approaches. This is vital to the growth of a local dance community, and it strengthens the City of Nanaimo's sense of pride in local skilled and experienced artists. The programming supports the development of a relationship between local artists with established Canadian artists with whom they would not have the opportunity to work so closely otherwise. We also present workshop and class opportunities to the general public with each production.

It should be noted that our tickets and class fees are priced as low as possible in order to keep our productions financially accessible to a broad sector of our community. Our "Dancing In Hard Times" program also offers financial assistance to those members of our community who would otherwise be unable to take part in these activities. We also offer public performances that are free/by donation each season to include as many people as possible in our audience base.

Marketing and Promotion

For Crimson Coast Dance Society, marketing and promotion extends beyond encouraging people to attend specific productions. Marketing plays a key role in meeting our visions and mission, by maintaining the visibility of dance as one of the core cultural modalities in Nanaimo.

In our marketing in general, we seek to address many angles of interest in our quality productions and outreach activities. We circulate e-mails, press releases, entertainment listings and flyers that are specific to target markets. We visit professional groups, youth groups, inner city or community schools, or clubs and organizations that have been identified as potential participants and offer informative sessions within their weekly or monthly meetings. We place target specific ads in various publications. Increasingly, promotion tools include the use of social media sites such as Facebook and Twitter, and as previously noted, we are in the midst of a program to redesign our website and to develop our social media marketing tools

CCDS works with local photographers, graphic designers and publicists to publicize our events. Because we are an arts organization, we have a particular focus on publicity events and materials which extend beyond the conventional. For instance, our recent "lemon" photo shoot with citizens of Nanaimo in support of our presentation of 605 Collective created both a unique event, and unique posters and images. Because of our focus on extending the range of what constitutes publicity, our marketing campaigns provide a unique venue for local photographers, graphic designers and publicists to practice and extend their arts.

Crimson Coast maintains a high profile in the community throughout our season. We advertise in local newspapers, both by paid ads and editorial press releases. Posters and handouts are distributed throughout our regional area. We also make use of local television and radio stations, and contact them well ahead of time to set up interviews.

School programs and cooperation with other artists, arts organizations and community groups

Crimson Coast Dance Society has worked with many of our local arts groups throughout our history. We are pleased to network with other organizations in the community, including: Victoria Dance Series, Vancouver's Dance House Productions, The Provincial presenter's network, Made In BC, The Port Theatre, Nanaimo Youth Services, Downtown Nanaimo Business Improvement Association, Vancouver Island Symphony, TheatreOne, Nanaimo Museum, Oceanside Rotary, Vancouver Island Regional Library, Open Minds and Open Windows Society, Haven Society, CANS Food Festival, the Christmas parade, the Child Development Centre and local art galleries.

We send many visiting guest artists into the public schools or dance academies to teach.

We work closely with Malaspina Theatre at Vancouver Island University and the student body by providing supervised on-the-job training for the final year technical crew students, as well as providing a practicum opportunity for a student from the Child and family services program with our Body Talk project.

Crimson Coast Dance Society strives to make all of our activities accessible to all members of our community. Each season, we reach out to our community in the following ways:

"Dancing in Hard Times" Program - Through this program, we subsidize the cost of ticket prices or class tuition for those who would be prevented from attending due to their financial circumstances.

Free/By Donation Dance Performances - Each season, we offer dance performances to the public that are free or by donation. This form of outreach makes contemporary dance accessible to everyone, regardless of income level.

Free Tickets to Social Service Organizations - We offer free tickets to organizations in our community such as Haven House and Nanaimo Youth Services, to give to people who would not otherwise be able to attend our events.

Tickets for Fundraisers for Other Organizations - We support other organizations in our community with their fundraising efforts by providing free tickets for silent auctions, prizes, and the like.

Performances for Fundraisers for Other Groups - When other organizations and individuals in our community are putting on performance-based events for a worthy cause, we support them by offering dance presentations at a minimal cost or for free to the organizers, to the best of our ability, based on availability, budget and human resources.

Body Talk Project – The members of our Youth Council – the Body Talk Cru – receive modest honoraria to encourage their full participation in the year-long project, as well as travel and ticket subsidies.

InFrinGinG Dance Festival – Collaborating with the Nanaimo Dragon Boat Festival, CCDS will once again be presenting most of the Dance Festival events for free as part of the combined festivals/

Crimson Coast's programming has defined Nanaimo as a recognized centre of professional dance presentation in Canada. Our events consistently bring in audience members from outside of Nanaimo. Last season, our performances specifically brought in audience members from Seattle, Bellingham, San Francisco, Vancouver, Victoria, Salt Spring Island, Courtenay, Gabriola Island, Parksville, Duncan and other outlying islands (Denman, Cortez and Pender). Many of the out of town guests, along with visiting artists, patronized local restaurants and gift shops and stayed at local hotels.

There is both direct and indirect economic benefit from the work Crimson Coast performs in the community. Direct benefits involve the spending of around \$100,000 directly into Nanaimo's economy by hiring workers, renting venues, paying for advertising and purchasing goods and services to promote and present our events. Most of this money is raised from sources outside of Nanaimo. Indirect benefits involve the spending incurred by our patrons as they attend our events, and out of town artists spending time in the community while participating in our events.

As to our 2013/2014 season, we look forward to presenting the events, which are described in Paragraph 2 above.

For our 2014/2015 season, we will be presenting a season consisting of at least three mainstage events, as well as planning the return of our InFrinGinG Dance Festival to its fall time slot, in October 2014, with four days of presentations. In connection with each of these events, we will present workshops, residences and dance classes. We are continuing our involvement with the Nanaimo Dragon Boat Society by integrating small performances, classes, workshops and dialogues within their Festival programming, in July 2015, so that we may continue to bring dance to the broader community and build on this collaborative partnership.

Artists invited to participate in the 2014/2015 Season will include Roger Sinha (Toronto), Raven Spirit Dance (Vancouver), Tara Friedenberg (Vancouver), Miriam Colvin (terrace). Our Body Talk Project will continue to develop based on teen input and the work of previous years. We shall continue to make use of all opportunities to engage in innovative and exciting outreach activities.

It is not usual for performers to promote specific touring projects more than two years in advance, and for this reason we cannot be specific about the artists or the programs we propose to present in 2015/2016. However, we shall continue to present a minimum 3 show Mainstage Season, A mentorship program for teens in career explorations in the performing arts (Body Talk Project), In The Belly Of The Dragon DragonBoat Outreach Partnership, and an InFrinGinG Dance Festival. For budgeting purposes, our goal is to see modest continuing growth in resources, to allow existing programs to be extended, and new programs to be initiated.

The Body Talk Project: (Earn while you learn



The Body Talk Project is an annual event which provides a week of family friendly affordable dance classes to our community, one for teens and one for 'everyone else' (families)! This allows an opportunity to explore the dance arts with your entire family when funds might otherwise limit this option.

Classes are generally a fusion of two genres of dance including a cultural dance style. The event is curated and produced by our Teen Council whom we call The Body Talk Cru.

Highlighting the Voice of Our Youth:

The Body Talk Cru is a group of young adults (13 to 18) who enjoy opportunities for career explorations in the dance arts. Arts administration, curation, marketing, rehearsing and performing are all part of the discovery journey as the Cru are mentored through event planning and production for the Body Talk Project each year.

Teamwork and leadership skills are learned as these young people contribute to our community through their efforts. Facilitation is through the Crimson Coast Dance Society.

Meetings generally take place every week for two hours after school and during business hours. The Cru meets Sept/Oct through the end of May and stay connected over the summer through Facebook.

Cru members have access to all of Crimson Coast Dance Society's programming and events, workshops and performances. They have the opportunity to bring their friends along and they receive an honorarium for their efforts at the end of the season. This is an "earn while you learn"



YOUTH ENTREPRENEURSHIP THROUGH DANCE

HISTORY

Five years ago, Crimson Coast Dance, in consultation with teens, created the Body Talk Project to engage youth in our community in the performing arts. The founding youth consultants developed the essential concept and structure to provide a context for a community activity that they could take ownership of. Each succeeding group of

youth has added to the scope and structure of the project. With the ongoing coordination of a paid youth facilitator, the teen cru are able to give a unique shape and direction to the Project each year. We also provide work experience to practicum student through VIU's Child and Youth Care Program, who assists in realizing the Cru's vision.



FION DOMS IT MORK?

The Bady Talk Cru is the core youth leadership group of ten teens mentored by a paid facilitator and local professional mentors, who meet weekly from October to May. Together they choose and plan the main dance event and gain skills in event planning, budget and relationship management and community engagement. They meet their high school volunteer hour require-

ments while working together to produce the annual Spring Break Body Talk Workshop. They undertake outreach to identify and involve young people in the community whom they feel would benefit from the Project as workshop participants or future Crumembers, Crimson Coast offers an honorarium to each Cru member as an incentive for participation. With profes-

slondl guidance, they conduct a post-event evaluation of the program and the project and redefine aspects of it as required. They select the artists for the next year. They also evaluate their learning for the year and wrap up their experience.

The Body Talk Warkshop: The community is invited to join the process in March to share the intensive week of classes, rehearsals and performance which the Cru prepared. They produce two workshops that week: one for teens and one for intergenerational participants. Everyone performs, including our guest artists, for a fully professional experience. Guest artists offer training in the dance styles chosen by the Cru, and work with the Cru and participants to choreograph the final show.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

The Body Talk project affords youth a rare opportunity to move beyond formal study, and to develop core skills needed to successfully work, innovate, and create in the wider world. These skills include


- Ability to organize and collaborate
- Ability to work in a co-operative environment
- Experience with basic budgeting, logistics, publicity, project organization, and other skills.

Gru participation gives youth job experience, a resume, high school community volunteer hour fulfillment, and letters of recommendation for jobs or other volunteer positions as appropriate.

The Body Talk project has historically served youth from homes experiencing poverty or other adifficulties. We believe that all youth have creative voices and we strive to create an environment that demonstrates that equality. Poverty is a factor in the lives of many youth and children living in the Nanaimo. An article in the Nanaimo News Bulletin (November 26, 2010) stated that about 5.2% of those under 19 living in Nanaimo lived in families who collected income assistance – nearly twice the Provincial average. An article in the December 28, 2010 edition of the Nanaimo Daily News noted "The Nanaimo-Ladysmith school discommentations".

While many youth from disadvantaged homes excel, others lack the confidence or skills to adapt successfully to the wider world. For these youth, Body Talk provides a critical bridge of skills, confidence and recognition.


