It was moved and seconded that the Nanaimo Arts Alive Summer School of the Fine Arts Society be awarded a Security Grant in the amount of \$435. The motion carried.

It was moved and seconded that Council transfer the yearly budgeted \$2,000 in the Grants Advisory Committee budget from Security Check Grants to the Other Grants category, once the Provincial government starts paying for criminal record checks for volunteers and employees of non-profit organizations (2013-NOV-30). The motion carried.

(b) Nanaimo Dragon Boat Society (Angels Abreast Dragon Boat Team) (OG-03)

Committee members noted:

• this application does not meet the Other Grant criteria.

It was moved and seconded that the Nanaimo Dragon Boat Society (Angels Abreast Dragon Boat Team) be <u>denied</u> an Other Grant in the amount of \$17,150 in order for the Angels Abreast Dragon Boat Team to attend the International Breast Cancer Celebration of Life Regatta in Sarasota, Florida in October, 2014. The motion carried.

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GRANTS POLICY AND GUIDELINES INDEX

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1. <u>COMPOSITION AND TERM</u>

The Grants Advisory Committee shall be appointed by Council and shall be comprised of:

- 2 members recommended by the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission, one from the Cultural Committee, and one from the Recreation Committee
- 1 member recommended by the United Way
- 1 Council member as appointed by Council and that member will serve as Chair of the Committee
- 1 member recommended by the Nanaimo Alcohol and Drug Action Committee
- 1 member recommended by the Social Planning Advisory Committee
- 2 members of the general public appointed by Council
- 1 non-voting Staff liaison recommended by the City Manager

The bodies recommending appointees shall be requested to ensure that the recommended representatives provide a good balance of knowledge in their respective areas of service, and to ensure the commitment and attendance of their recommended representatives.

The maximum term for any member shall be three years.

2. <u>TERMS OF REFERENCE</u>

The Terms of Reference of the Grants Advisory Committee shall be:

- to advise Council on the amount of financial assistance which the municipality should grant to applicants, including permissive taxation exemptions. Recommendations shall be made in accordance with the guidelines and criteria defined in this Policy;
- (b) to recommend policies to Council with regard to non-statutory tax exemption (Permissive Tax Exemptions under Sections 224 and 227 of the *Community Charter*);
- (c) to make recommendations on requests for the subsidized use of civic facilities and resources as if they were requests for financial assistance ("in-kind" grants);
- (d) to maintain the confidentiality of all matters reviewed by the Committee;
- (e) to provide all applicants with observations, recommendations and/or reasons for the recommendations of the Committee;
- (f) to ensure that civic grant funding does not subsidize activities that are the responsibility of senior governments, as this would represent a downloading of senior government costs to local taxpayers;
- (g) to ensure that priority of funding in all categories shall be given to small organizations, rather than larger ones;
- (h) to ensure that grants from the City will be awarded on the basis of demonstrated need for the service within the community.

 to consider appeals by organizations who do not agree with grant recommendations made by City committees. Appeals are limited to a review of the process and are not intended to be a review of the Committee's judgment.

3. <u>CATEGORIES OF GRANT FUNDING</u>

Grant funding will be divided into the following categories:

- Security Checks
- Other Grants
- Permissive Tax Exemptions (Cash Grants)
- Permissive Tax Exemptions

Recommendations on the amount of grant funding any applicant will be awarded from these categories shall be made in accordance with the guidelines that are outlined in this Policy.

4. <u>YEARLY ALLOCATION FOR GRANT FUNDING</u>

The amount of money available in each category shall be determined by Council during the Financial Plan process each year.

5. <u>COORDINATION OF GRANTS-IN-AID PROCEDURES</u> (with the Regional District of Nanaimo)

<u>Funding:</u> The amount raised from the Regional District levy on the City of Nanaimo shall be returned to the City each year on the condition that the funds are used as either basic or supplementary grants to those organizations which have a primary base of operations within the city, but also provide services which are of a benefit to residents outside the City.

6. <u>GUIDELINES FOR MAKING GRANT RECOMMENDATIONS (by category)</u>

(a) <u>SECURITY CHECKS</u>

<u>Statement of Purpose:</u> Security Check grants are awarded to organizations that must have security checks performed by the R.C.M.P. on their employees and/or volunteers and meet the criteria specified below.

Criteria for Awarding Grants:

- must be able to identify services provided to residents of Nanaimo
- nonprofit organization
- sound financial and administrative management
- demonstrated financial need
- \$500/year maximum award to any organization from this category (2012-JAN-09)
- eligible organizations can only apply for financial support from this category once a calendar year (applications reviewed in November)
- applications for this category must be received by October 31st
- must adhere to all City of Nanaimo bylaws and policies
- awards from this category are exclusive of awards from the other categories

Kind of Funding:

Security Check Fee Reimbursement

(b) <u>OTHER GRANTS</u>

<u>Statement of Purpose:</u> Applications that don't fit into any categories of any of the granting committees are to be referred to the Grants Advisory Committee for review and recommendation. If the scope of the grant request exceeds the committee's budget, the Grants Advisory Committee can make a recommendation subject to the grant being funded from Council contingency.

Criteria for Awarding Grants:

- large number of volunteers;
- registered non-profit society;
- sound financial and administrative management;
- □ financial need;
- accessible to a large portion of the community;
- must have a broad base of support;
- must have another source of financial support;
- must be local in focus and must adhere to all City of Nanaimo's bylaws and policies;
- cash grants will not be provided if the organization receives a Permissive Tax Exemption, or where the facility is provided by the City of Nanaimo free of charge or at a substantially reduced rate. Notwithstanding the above statement, organizations facing critical financial difficulties are eligible to apply for emergency funding.

Kind of Funding:

- educational funding;
- emergency funding;
- capital grants on a matching basis up to a maximum of \$5,000;
- in-kind funding for facility rental.

(c) <u>PERMISSIVE TAX EXEMPTIONS (Cash Grants)</u>

<u>Statement of Purpose:</u> An organization may only be added to the Permissive Tax Exemption roll for the following year. In some unusual cases it may be appropriate to give an organization a cash grant during the current year.

Criteria for Awarding Grants:

- the property must be recommended for a Permissive Tax Exemption in the following year; and
 - (1) the property qualifies for Permissive Tax Exemption as a Church, Public Hospital, Community Care Facility, or Private School; or
 - (2) the organization can demonstrate an extraordinary financial need;
 - (3) must adhere to all City of Nanaimo's bylaws and policies.

<u>Application Deadline:</u> Will be considered at the time of application for Permissive Tax Exemption.

7. PERMISSIVE TAX EXEMPTIONS

Section 220 of the *Community Charter* identifies certain properties which are exempt from taxation. This section includes property owned and occupied by Her Majesty, the municipality, School Boards, hospitals and churches. As Section 220 exemptions are specifically provided for, Council's discretion is restricted, except in determining the extent of the exemption in certain cases.

Sections 224, 225, 226 of the *Community Charter* identify situations in which Council may exercise discretion in granting full or partial exemptions from taxation. These exemptions must be adopted by bylaw, by the 31st of October of the year preceding exemption.

All buildings and properties that receive a permissive tax exemption must be reviewed every three years to ensure that they continue to meet the specific criteria set out in their applicable category. A report to Council with recommendations for their endorsement is done after each review. The Grants Advisory Committee may also review specific organizations annually for various reasons determined by the committee.

In making recommendations to Council, the Grants Advisory Committee should ensure that:

- (a) the goals, policies, and general operating principles of the municipality as a whole are reflected in the organizations that receive municipal support;
- (b) exemptions are not given to services that are otherwise provided on a private, for profit basis, this would provide an unfair competitive advantage;
- (c) the services provided by the organizations should be an extension of municipal services and programs and must fall under the responsibility of local government, senior government program costs must not be transferred to property taxpayers, as this would represent a downloading of senior government costs to local taxpayers;

- (d) the taxation burden resulting from the exemption must be a justifiable expense to the taxpayers of the municipality, the sources of municipal revenue are limited and requests for exemption must be considered in concert with the other needs of the municipality;
- (e) the services provided by the organizations should provide benefits and be accessible to the residents of the City of Nanaimo, and, in an appropriate age range, the organization's regulations must allow all Nanaimo residents to participate at a reasonable fee.
- (f) the organization is adhering to all City of Nanaimo's bylaws and policies.

In order to more clearly specify criteria, Permissive Tax Exemptions will be divided into the following categories:

- Churches
- Public Hospital
- Senior Citizens' Housing Facilities
- Community Care Facilities
- Private Schools
- Recreation
- Other
 - Community Services
 - Community Associations
 - Arts and Cultural Organizations
 - Other Permissive Exemptions

8. GUIDELINES FOR MAKING RECOMMENDATIONS ON PERMISSIVE TAX EXEMPTION BY CATEGORY

(a) <u>CHURCHES</u>

<u>General:</u> The buildings set apart for public worship and the land upon which they stand are exempt from taxation under Section 220(1)(h) of the *Community Charter*. Church halls and such lands as Council considers necessary to support the statutory exemption may be considered as an extension of the exemption under Section 224(2)(f).

<u>Policy:</u> The maximum area of land to be exempted from taxation shall be 2 acres of the land upon which the buildings for public worship stand plus the footprint of the building(s) used for public worship (Revised 1986-AUG-25). This exempted area will not exceed the land area of the legal parcel(s) upon which these buildings stand. Church properties which are currently on the PTE roll and do not conform are to be removed.

Buildings for public worship shall be those established by the Area Assessor and will not include a church manse.

- (b) <u>PUBLIC HOSPITALS</u>
 - <u>General:</u> Buildings set apart and used as a hospital under the *Hospital Act*, except a private hospital under that *Act*, and the land upon which they stand are exempt from taxation under Sections 220(1)(j) and 220(1)(k) of the *Community Charter*. Council may, by bylaw, under Section 224(2)(h) of the *Community*

Charter, exempt any area of land surrounding the exempted building under Sections 220(1)(j) and 220(1)(k).

<u>Policy:</u> Where a building has been identified as a hospital under the *Hospital Act* (except a private hospital) by the Area Assessor, Council will exempt the legal parcel(s) upon which the hospital building stands and any adjoining parcel that Council finds to be necessary to the operation of the hospital.

(c) <u>SENIOR CITIZENS' HOUSING FACILITIES</u>

<u>General:</u> Section 220(1)(i) of the *Community Charter* exempts from taxation a building that was constructed or reconstructed with the assistance of aid granted by the Province after 1947-JAN-01, but before 1974-APR-01, and that is owned and used exclusively without profit by a corporation to provide homes for elderly citizens, together with the land on which the building stands. It also allows Council, by bylaw, under Section 224(2)(h) of the *Community Charter* to exempt, by bylaw, any area of land surrounding the exempted building. Section 224(2)(k) of the *Community Charter* allows Council to exempt from taxation land or improvements for which a grant has been made, after 1974-MAR-31, under the Housing Construction (Elderly Citizens) Act before its repeal in 1996.

<u>Policy:</u> Where a building has been identified as meeting the above criteria by the Area Assessor, Council will exempt the legal parcel(s) upon which the building stands. As it is impossible for any new building to meet this criteria, this section will apply to only seven existing properties: The Mt. Benson Sr. Citizens' Housing Society (tax folios 81301.000; 81312.000; 81315.000; 84328.000), and George R. Pearkes Sr. Citizens Housing Society (tax folios 16006.051; 16006.252; 16006.275).

(d) <u>COMMUNITY CARE FACILITIES</u>

<u>General:</u> Section 224(2)(j) of the *Community Charter*, allows Council to exempt from taxation land and improvements owned or held by a person or organization and operated as a private hospital licensed under the *Hospital Act* or as a licensed community care facility, or registered assisted living residence, under the *Community Care and Assisted Living Act*.

<u>Policy:</u> Council will exempt property that meets the above criteria and is owned or held and operated by a registered non-profit society.

(e) PRIVATE SCHOOLS

<u>General:</u> Section 220(1)(I) of the *Community Charter*, with certain restrictions, exempts private schools from taxation. It also allows Council, by bylaw, under Section 224(2)(h) of the *Community Charter* to exempt from taxation any area of land surrounding the exempted building.

<u>Policy:</u> Where a building has been identified as meeting the above criteria by the Area Assessor, Council will exempt the legal parcel(s) upon which the building stands and any adjoining parcel that Council finds to be necessary to the operation of the school. The permissively exempt property must be accessible to the general public as identified in 7 (e) above.

(f) <u>RECREATION</u>

<u>General:</u> Section 224(2)(i) of the *Community Charter* permits Council, by bylaw, to exempt from taxation, certain organizations using property as a public park or recreation ground, or for public athletic or recreational purposes.

<u>Policy:</u> Permissive Tax Exemptions will be given to organizations that own property that is maintained and used for public park or recreation purposes if they:

- (1) provide full financial and operating information as requested by the Grants Advisory Committee;
- (2) meet the conditions of Section 224 of the Community Charter,
- (3) meet the general guidelines outlined in 7(a) to 7(f) of this Policy;
- (4) are registered non-profit societies.
- (g) <u>OTHER</u>

<u>General:</u> Section 224(2)(a) *Community Charter* permits Council, by bylaw, to exempt from taxation, land or improvements that are owned or held by a charitable, philanthropic, or other not for profit organization that are used for a purpose that is directly related to the purposes of the organization.

<u>Community Service Organizations</u>

This has been historically interpreted to include organizations that provide service to the community such as social service agencies.

<u>Community Associations</u>

This can include community associations that provide a place for local communities to meet, engage in activities that enhance the local community, or hold land that is available for community use.

Arts & Cultural Organizations

This can include organizations that provide or promote arts and cultural activities.

Other Permissive Exemptions

<u>Policy:</u> Permissive Tax Exemptions may be given to organizations that:

- (1) provide full financial and operating information as requested by the Grants Advisory Committee;
- (2) meet the conditions of Section 224 of the Community Charter; and,
- (3) are registered non-profit societies.

9. <u>APPEALS</u>

<u>Statement of Purpose</u> The mandate of the Grants Advisory Committee is to review appeals for process issues only. That is, to determine whether the original advisory committee had all the correct information and used the appropriate criteria to make their recommendation. The Grants Advisory

Committee will not revisit the actual decision, i.e. whether the correct amount was granted.

Criteria for Allowing an Appeal:

- Was the advisory committee's decision based on the application not meeting certain criteria or submitting incomplete or incorrect information? Did the advisory committee misinterpret some of the information submitted?
- Did the committee notify the applicant of its recommendations two weeks <u>before</u> it was sent to the next level (either to Council or to the Parks, Recreation & Culture Commission), thereby giving the applicant time to respond?
- Does the applicant believe that the recommendation was based on incorrect or incomplete information? Does the applicant believe its information was misinterpreted?
- Did the advisory committee have all the information and the appropriate criteria to make its recommendation?
- Did the advisory committee determine the application should be reconsidered based on this new/different information?

IX. PERMISSIVE TAX EXEMPTIONS

Permissive Tax Exemptions are the most complicated aspect of the Grants Advisory Committee.

Simply put, Council is permitted to (but not required to) exempt certain organizations from property taxation. The authority for this comes from Section 224 of the *Community Charter*, which is included in this manual for your information. Past Grants Advisory Committees have adopted the approach that exempting taxes should be treated the same way as granting cash, and have required applicants to show financial need before granting tax exemptions. The Grants Policy & Guidelines adopted by Council in September of 2000 divide Permissive Tax Exemption applications into several categories and provide some specific criteria for each category. Further information can be found in the Grants Policy & Guidelines included in this manual (pages 5-9).

By October 31 of each year, Council must adopt a bylaw that authorizes the Permissive Tax Exemption roll for the following year. An organization that is first added to the bylaw in the current year will not be exempted from taxation until the following year. The Grants Advisory Committee will only consider this organization for a cash grant equivalent to taxes in the current year if there are dire financial circumstances. Once added to the Permissive Tax Exemption roll, an organization will remain on the roll unless removed. The Grants Advisory Committee will review the entire Permissive Tax Exemption roll every three years. The most recent review was done in 2011.

Division 6 — Statutory Exemptions

General statutory exemptions

220 (1) Unless otherwise provided in this Act or the *Local Government Act*, the following property is exempt from taxation to the extent indicated:

(a) land, improvements or both vested in or held by the Provincial government;

- (b) land, improvements or both vested in or held by
 - (i) the municipality, or
 - (ii) the municipality jointly with another municipality or a regional district;

(c) land, improvements or both exempt from municipal taxation by another Act;

(d) land, improvements or both

(i) of a public library under the *Library Act*, or

(ii) vested in or held by a municipality and occupied by a public library under the *Library Act*;

(e) land, improvements or both of an Indian, in a municipality incorporated under section 12 (1) of the *Local Government Act*, who is an owner under the letters patent, except for taxation under section 197 (1) (a) *[municipal property taxes]*;

(f) land, improvements or both in a municipality, other than a municipality incorporated under section 12 (1) of the *Local Government Act*, that

(i) are held in trust by the Crown for a band of Indians, and

(ii) are not leased to or occupied by a person who is not a member of the band;

(g) the land actually used and occupied for the interment of the dead or in respect of which a certificate of public interest under the *Cremation, Interment and Funeral Services Act* has been issued by the director under that Act, together with the improvements included as part of the cemetery, mausoleum or columbarium under that Act, other than

(i) premises used for the provision of funeral services within the meaning of that Act, except any part of those premises used for the provision of bereavement rites and ceremonies,

(ii) crematoriums within the meaning of that Act, and

(iii) premises, or that part of premises, used primarily for the sale of cemetery services or funeral services within the meaning of that Act;

(h) a building set apart for public worship, and the land on which the building stands, if title to the land is registered in the name of

(i) the religious organization using the building,

(ii) trustees for the use of that organization, or

(iii) a religious organization granting a lease of the

building and land to be used solely for public worship;

(i) a building that was constructed or reconstructed with the assistance of aid granted by the Provincial government after January 1, 1947 but before April 1, 1974 and that is owned and used exclusively without profit by a corporation to provide homes for elderly citizens, together with the land on which the building stands;

(j) a building set apart and used solely as a hospital under the *Hospital Act*, except a private hospital under that Act, together with the land on which the building stands;

(k) land and improvements for future hospital requirements that are

(i) designated for the purposes of this section by the minister responsible for the *Hospital Act*, and

(ii) vested in, or held by, a society or corporation that is not operated for profit and that has as an object the operation of a hospital;

 (I) a building owned by an incorporated institution of learning that is regularly giving children instruction accepted as equivalent to that given in a public school, in actual occupation by the institution and wholly in use for the purpose of giving the instruction, together with the land on which the building stands;

(m) fruit trees;

(n) improvements, other than dwellings and the fixtures, machinery and similar things mentioned in paragraph (o),

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erected on farm land and used exclusively to operate a farm, up to but not exceeding the greater of the following:

- (i) 87.5% of the assessed value;
- (ii) an assessed value of \$50 000;

(o) fixtures, machinery and similar things located on farm land and used exclusively to operate the farm that, if erected or placed, in or on land, a building or fixture or structure in or on it, would, as between landlord and tenant, be removable by the tenant;

(p) an improvement designed, constructed or installed to provide emergency protection for persons or domestic animals in the event of a disaster or emergency within the meaning of the *Emergency Program Act*;

(q) sewage treatment plants, manure storage facilities, effluent reservoirs, effluent lagoons, deodorizing equipment, dust and particulate matter eliminating equipment;

(r) a floating dry dock, other than the onshore facilities of the floating dry dock, if the floating dry dock has a lift capacity greater than 20 000 tonnes.

(2) Septic disposal systems are not exempt from taxation under subsection (1) (q).

(3) An exemption under subsection (1) (b) to (p) does not include exemption from a fee.

(4) An exemption under subsection (1) (b), (d), (g), (h), (i) or (l) extends only to taxation under section 197 (1) (a) *[municipal property taxes]*.

Grandparented pollution abatement exemptions

221 (1) In this section:

"final determination under the Assessment Act" means a determination on the assessment roll for a taxation year, subject to any change that is finally determined under the Assessment Act by revised assessment roll, by supplementary assessment roll or on further appeal;

"pollution abatement provision" means section 339 (1) (q) of the *Local Government Act*, section 15 (1) (s) of the *Taxation (Rural Area) Act* or section 396 (1) (e.01) of the *Vancouver Charter*, as those provisions read before their repeal and replacement by the *Budget Measures Implementation Act*, 1997.

(2) Land and improvements that were exempt for the 1996 taxation year under a pollution abatement provision are exempt to the extent established by subsection (3), if

(a) the land and improvements were exempt under that provision for the 1996 taxation year on final determination under the *Assessment Act*, and

(b) as applicable,

(i) for an exemption in relation to land only, the land continues to be exclusively or primarily used for the purpose of abating pollution,

(ii) for an exemption in relation to improvements only, the improvements continue to be exclusively or primarily used for the purpose of abating pollution, or

(iii) for an exemption in relation to land and improvements, the land and improvements continue to be exclusively or primarily used for the purpose of abating pollution.

(3) The amount of an exemption under subsection (2) for a taxation year is limited to the portion of the assessed value of land and improvements that is the least of the following:

(a) the portion that the British Columbia Assessment Authority determines is attributable to the use of pollution abatement for that taxation year, subject to final determination under the *Assessment Act*;

(b) the portion that was exempt for pollution abatement purposes for the immediately preceding taxation year on final determination under the *Assessment Act*;

(c) the portion that was exempt for the 1996 taxation year on final determination under the *Assessment Act*.

Grandparented dust and particulate matter eliminator exemptions

221.1 (1) In this section:

"final determination under the Assessment Act" means a determination on the assessment roll for a taxation year, subject to any change that is finally determined under the Assessment Act by revised assessment roll, by supplementary assessment roll or on further appeal; **"new exemption provision"** means the aspect of section 339 (1) (p) of the *Local Government Act*, as that provision read after its repeal and replacement by the *Budget Measures Implementation Act*, 2003, that referred to "dust and particulate matter eliminating equipment" and that is continued by section 220 (1) (q) of this Act;

"previous exemption provision" means the aspect of section 339 (1) (p) of the *Local Government Act*, as that provision read before its repeal and replacement by the *Budget Measures Implementation Act*, 2003, that referred to "dust and particulate matter eliminators".

(2) Subject to subsection (3), a dust and particulate matter eliminator is exempt from taxation if the eliminator

(a) was, on final determination under the *Assessment Act*, exempt for the 2003 taxation year under the previous exemption provision,

(b) was not exempt for the 2004 taxation year under the new exemption provision because it was not dust and particulate matter eliminating equipment, and

(c) continues to be a dust and particulate matter eliminator.

(3) The exemption under subsection (2) does not apply to any increase in assessed value that is attributable to changes to or replacement of the dust and particulate matter eliminator.

Phased farm property tax exemption

222 (1) This section applies to real property

(a) that is in a newly incorporated municipality, or in an area newly included in a municipality, and

(b) that was, immediately before the incorporation or inclusion, exempt from taxation because of section 15 (1) (f) or (f.1) of the *Taxation (Rural Area) Act* but that, after the incorporation or inclusion, is not exempt from taxation under this Act.

(2) Real property referred to in subsection (1) is exempt from taxation for the first 5 years after incorporation or inclusion, to the indicated percentage of the exemption that would have applied had the incorporation or inclusion not taken place, as follows:

year after incorporation	% of exemption that would have applied
1st	100%
2nd	80%

Exemptions under regulations

223 (1) In addition to the provisions of any other Act, the Lieutenant Governor in Council may make regulations prescribing exemptions from property taxes under any Act in respect of one or more of the following:

> (a) prescribed industrial land or industrial improvements, or both;

> (a.1) prescribed business land or business improvements, or both;

(b) prescribed improvements at prescribed community airports;

(c) prescribed land or improvements at prescribed community ports.

(2) Without limiting section 283 [variation authority], regulations under subsection (1) may be different for different community airports and different community ports.

(3) An exemption under subsection (1) (b) or (c) applies to an airport or port only for a taxation year in which it is operated as a community airport or community port, as applicable.

Division 7 — Permissive Exemptions

General authority for permissive exemptions

- **224** (1) A council may, by bylaw in accordance with this section, exempt land or improvements, or both, referred to in subsection (2) from taxation under section 197 (1) (a) [municipal property taxes], to the extent, for the period and subject to the conditions provided in the bylaw.
 - (2) Tax exemptions may be provided under this section for the following:
 - (a) land or improvements that

(i) are owned or held by a charitable, philanthropic or other not for profit corporation, and

- (ii) the council considers are used for a purpose that is directly related to the purposes of the corporation;
- (b) land or improvements that

(i) are owned or held by a municipality, regional district or other local authority, and

(ii) the council considers are used for a purpose of the local authority;

(c) land or improvements that the council considers would otherwise qualify for exemption under section 220 *[general statutory exemptions]* were it not for a secondary use;

(d) the interest of a public authority, local authority or any other corporation or organization in land or improvements that are used or occupied by the corporation or organization if

(i) the land or improvements are owned by a public authority or local authority, and

(ii) the land or improvements are used by the corporation or organization for a purpose in relation to which an exemption under this Division or Division 6 of this Part would apply or could be provided if the land or improvements were owned by that corporation or organization;

(e) the interest of a public authority, local authority or any other corporation or organization in land or improvements that are used or occupied by the corporation or organization if

(i) the land or improvements are owned by a person who is providing a municipal service under a partnering agreement,

(ii) an exemption under section 225 [partnering and other special tax exemption authority] would be available for the land or improvements in relation to the partnering agreement if they were used in relation to the service,

(iii) the partnering agreement expressly contemplates that the council may provide an exemption under this provision, and

(iv) the land or improvements are used by the corporation or organization for a purpose in relation to which an exemption under this Division or Division 6 of this Part would apply or could be provided if the land or improvements were owned by that corporation or organization;

(f) in relation to property that is exempt under section 220 (1)(h) *[buildings for public worship]*,

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(i) an area of land surrounding the exempt building,

(ii) a hall that the council considers is necessary to the exempt building and the land on which the hall stands, and

(iii) an area of land surrounding a hall that is exempt under subparagraph (ii);

(g) land or improvements used or occupied by a religious organization, as tenant or licensee, for the purpose of public worship or for the purposes of a hall that the council considers is necessary to land or improvements so used or occupied;

(h) in relation to property that is exempt under section 220 (1)
(i) [seniors' homes], (j) [hospitals] or (l) [private schools], any area of land surrounding the exempt building;

(i) land or improvements owned or held by an athletic or service club or association and used as a public park or recreation ground or for public athletic or recreational purposes;

(j) land or improvements owned or held by a person or organization and operated as a private hospital licensed under the *Hospital Act* or as a licensed community care facility, or registered assisted living residence, under the *Community Care and Assisted Living Act*;

(k) land or improvements for which a grant has been made, after March 31, 1974, under the *Housing Construction (Elderly Citizens) Act* before its repeal.

(3) The authority under subsection (2) (e) and (g) to (j) is not subject to section 25 (1) [prohibition against assistance to business].

(4) Subject to subsection (5), a bylaw under this section

(a) must establish the term of the exemption, which may not be longer than 10 years,

(b) may only be adopted after notice of the proposed bylaw has been given in accordance with section 227 [notice of permissive tax exemptions], and

(c) does not apply to taxation in a calendar year unless it comes into force on or before October 31 in the preceding year.

(5) Subsection (4) (a) and (b) does not apply in relation to exemptions under subsection (2) (f) and (h).

(6) If only a portion of a parcel of land is exempt under this section, the bylaw under this section must include a description of the land that is satisfactory to the British Columbia Assessment Authority.

(7) A bylaw under this section ceases to apply to property, the use or ownership of which no longer conforms to the conditions necessary to qualify for exemption and, after this, the property is liable to taxation.

Partnering, heritage, riparian and other special exemption authority

225 (1) In this section:

"eligible property" means property that is eligible under subsection (2);

"exemption agreement" means an agreement under subsection (5).

(2) The following property is eligible for a tax exemption under this section:

(a) eligible partnering property, being property that

(i) is owned by a person or public authority providing a municipal service under a partnering agreement, and

- (ii) the council considers will be used in relation to the service being provided under the partnering agreement;
- (b) eligible heritage property, being property that is
 - (i) protected heritage property,

(ii) subject to a heritage revitalization agreement under section 966 of the *Local Government Act*,

(iii) subject to a covenant under section 219 of the *Land Title Act* that relates to the conservation of heritage property, or

(iv) if property referred to in subparagraphs (i) to (iii) is a building or other improvement so affixed to the land as to constitute real property, an area of land surrounding that improvement;

- (c) eligible riparian property, being property that
 - (i) is riparian land,

(ii) is subject to a covenant under section 219 of the *Land Title Act* that

(A) relates to the protection of the property as riparian property, and

(B) has the municipality granting the exemption under this section as a covenantee in whose favour the covenant is made, and

(iii) meets any other requirements prescribed by regulation;

(d) eligible cemetery property, being land held for cemetery, mausoleum or columbarium purposes;

(e) eligible golf course property, being land maintained as a golf course.

(3) A council may, by bylaw, exempt eligible property from taxation under section 197 (1) (a) *[municipal property taxes]* to the extent provided in the bylaw and subject to the conditions established by exemption agreement.

(4) The authority under subsection (3) is not subject to section 25 (1) *[prohibition against assistance to business]*.

(5) For the purposes of this section, the council may enter into an agreement with the owner of property that is exempt or is to be exempt under this section, respecting the extent of the exemption and the conditions on which it is made.

(6) Without limiting subsection (5), an exemption agreement may do one or more of the following:

(a) require the eligible property to be subject to a covenant under section 219 of the *Land Title Act* in favour of the municipality;

(b) provide that the exemption is subject to specified conditions;

(c) provide that, if

(i) a condition is not met,

(ii) a required covenant under section 219 of the *Land Title Act* is discharged, or

(iii) any other circumstances specified in the agreement occur,

the property owner must pay to the municipality an amount determined in accordance with the agreement.

(7) A bylaw under this section

(a) must establish the term of the exemption,

(b) may only be adopted after notice of the proposed bylaw has been given in accordance with section 227 [notice of permissive tax exemptions],

(c) may only be adopted by an affirmative vote of at least 2/3 of all council members, and

(d) does not apply to taxation in a calendar year unless it comes into force on or before October 31 in the preceding year.

(8) An exemption under this section ceases to apply to property, the use or ownership of which no longer conforms to the conditions necessary to qualify for exemption and, after this, the property is liable to taxation.

Revitalization tax exemptions

226 (1) In this section:

"exemption agreement" means an agreement under subsection
(7);

"exemption certificate" means a revitalization tax exemption certificate issued under subsection (8);

"**revitalization program bylaw**" means a bylaw under subsection (4).

(2) A council may, for the purpose of encouraging revitalization in the municipality, provide tax exemptions for land or improvements, or both, in accordance with this section.

(3) For a revitalization tax exemption under this section to apply to a particular property,

(a) the exemption must be in accordance with a revitalization program bylaw under subsection (4),

(b) an exemption agreement under subsection (7) must apply to the property, and

(c) an exemption certificate for the property must have been issued under subsection (8).

(4) A revitalization tax exemption program must be established by a bylaw that includes the following:

(a) a description of the reasons for and the objectives of the program;

(b) a description of how the program is intended to accomplish the objectives;

(c) a description of the kinds of property, or related activities or circumstances, that will be eligible for tax exemptions under the program;

(d) the extent of the tax exemptions available;

(e) the amounts of tax exemptions that may be provided under the bylaw, by specifying amounts or by establishing formulas by which the amounts are to be determined, or both;

(f) the maximum term of a tax exemption that may be provided under the bylaw, which may not be longer than 10 years.

(5) A revitalization program bylaw

(a) may include other provisions the council considers advisable respecting the program including, without limiting this,

(i) the requirements that must be met before an exemption certificate may be issued,

(ii) conditions that must be included in an exemption certificate, and

(iii) provision for a recapture amount that must be paid by the owner of the property to the municipality if the conditions specified in the exemption certificate are not met, and

- (b) may be different for
 - (i) different areas of the municipality,
 - (ii) different property classes under the Assessment Act,

(iii) different classes of land or improvements, or both, as established by the bylaw,

(iv) different activities and circumstances related to a property or its uses, as established by the bylaw, and

(v) different uses as established by zoning bylaw.

(6) A revitalization program bylaw may be adopted only after

(a) notice of the proposed bylaw has been given in accordance with section 227 [notice of permissive tax exemptions], and

(b) the council has considered the bylaw in conjunction with the objectives and policies set out under section 165 (3.1) (c) [use of permissive tax exemptions] in its financial plan.

(7) The council may enter into an agreement with the owner of a property respecting

(a) the provision of a revitalization tax exemption under this section,

(b) any requirements that must be met before an exemption certificate is issued, and

(c) any conditions on which the tax exemption is to be provided.

(8) Once

(a) all requirements established in the revitalization program bylaw, and

(b) any additional requirements established in the exemption agreement

have been met, a revitalization tax exemption certificate must be issued for the property in accordance with the exemption agreement.

(9) An exemption certificate must specify the following in accordance with the revitalization program bylaw and the exemption agreement:

(a) the extent of the tax exemption;

(b) the amount of the tax exemption or the formula for determining the exemption;

(c) the term of the tax exemption;

(d) if applicable, the conditions on which the tax exemption is provided;

(e) if applicable, that a recapture amount is payable if the exemption certificate is cancelled, and how that amount is to be determined.

(10) So long as an exemption certificate has not been cancelled, the land or improvements, or both, subject to the exemption certificate are exempt from taxation under section 197 (1) (a) *[municipal property taxes]* as provided in the exemption certificate.

(11) An exemption certificate may be cancelled by the council

(a) on the request of the property owner, or

(b) if any of the conditions specified in the exemption certificate are not met.

(12) An exemption certificate or cancellation does not apply to taxation in a calendar year unless the exemption certificate is issued or cancelled, as applicable, on or before October 31 in the preceding year.

(13) The designated municipal officer must

(a) provide a copy of an exemption certificate to the relevant assessor as soon as practicable after it is issued, and

(b) if applicable, notify that assessor as soon as practicable after an exemption certificate is cancelled.

(14) The authority to provide a tax exemption under this section is not subject to section 25 (1) [prohibition against assistance to business].

Notice of permissive tax exemptions

- **227** (1) A council must give notice of a proposed bylaw under this Division in accordance with section 94 *[public notice]*.
 - (2) Subject to subsection (3), the notice under subsection (1) must

(a) identify the property that would be subject to the bylaw,

(b) describe the proposed exemption,

(c) state the number of years that the exemption may be provided, and

(d) provide an estimate of the amount of taxes that would be imposed on the property if it were not exempt, for the year in which the proposed bylaw is to take effect and the following 2 years.

(3) In the case of a bylaw under section 226 (4) *[revitalization program bylaw]*, the notice under subsection (1) of this section must include a general description of each of the following:

(a) the reasons for and the objectives of the program;

(b) how the proposed program is intended to accomplish the objectives;

(c) the kinds of property, or related activities or circumstances, that will be eligible for a tax exemption under the program;

(d) the extent, amounts and maximum terms of the tax exemptions that may be provided under the program.

CITY OF NANAIMO

BYLAW NO. 7177

A BYLAW TO EXEMPT CERTAIN LANDS AND BUILDINGS FROM TAXATION

WHEREAS Section 224 of the *Community Charter* provides general regulations for the exemption of property from taxation;

AND WHEREAS Section 224 of the *Community Charter* provides specific exemptions for certain types or uses of property.

AND WHEREAS Council deems it expedient to exempt property enumerated herein:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the City of Nanaimo in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

TITLE

1. This Bylaw may be cited as the "PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION BYLAW 2013 NO. 7177".

CHURCHES

- 2. Subject to Section 3 of this Bylaw, the Church lands, together with the buildings thereon, listed on the attached Schedule 'A' and further clarified in Maps 'A-1' to 'A-10', shall be exempt from taxation.
- 3. Church halls situated upon lands described in Schedule 'A' of this Bylaw, whether such halls are within church buildings or apart there from, are deemed to be necessary to their respective church operations.
- 4. The maximum area of land to be exempted from taxation shall be 2.0 acres (87,120 sq. ft.) of the land upon which the buildings for public worship stand plus the footprint of the building(s) used for public worship. This exempted area will not exceed the land area of the legal parcel(s) upon which these buildings stand.

SENIOR CITIZENS HOUSING

5. The Senior Citizens Housing Facility lands and buildings listed on the attached Schedule 'B' shall be exempt from taxation.

COMMUNITY CARE FACILITIES

6. The Community Care Facility lands and buildings listed on the attached Schedule 'C' shall be exempt from taxation.

MISCELLANEOUS NON-PROFIT

7. The Miscellaneous Non-Profit lands and buildings listed on the attached Schedule 'D' and further clarified in Maps 'D-1' to 'D-21', unless otherwise specified, shall be exempt from taxation.

<u>REPEAL</u>

8. "PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION BYLAW 2012 NO. 7152" is hereby repealed.

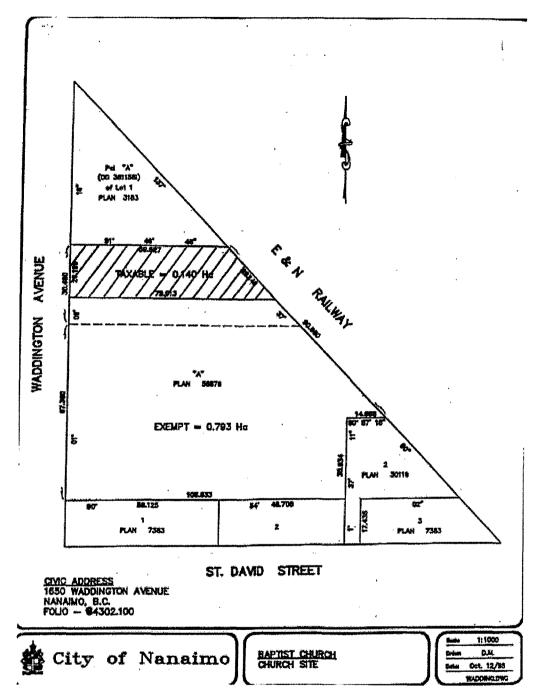

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION:

- 1. <u>deny</u> the Nanaimo Dragon Boat Society (Angels Abreast Dragon Boat Team) (OG-03) an Other Grant in the amount of \$17,150 in order for the Angels Abreast Dragon Boat Team to attend the International Breast Cancer Celebration of Life Regatta in Sarasota, Florida in October, 2014;
- 2. award a Security Check Grant to Nanaimo Arts Alive Summer School of the Fine Arts Society (SC-02) in the amount of \$435; and,
- 3. transfer the yearly budgeted \$2,000 in the Grants Advisory Committee budget for Security Check Grants to the Other Grants category, once the Provincial government starts paying for criminal record checks for volunteers and employees of non-profit organizations (2013-NOV-30).

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this report is to outline the Committee's recommendation regarding the Other Grant and Security Check Grant applications received.

BACKGROUND:

The Grants Advisory Committee met on 2013-NOV-20.

These exemptions must be adopted by bylaw, by the 31st of October of the year preceding exemptions.

RE: Request for Funding to Support Nanaimo's D.A.R.E. Program

Dear Mayor Ruttan,

As you may know, each year local RCMP officers teach the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) Program to many of Nanaimo's Grade 5 and 6 school children to empower them to avoid the use of drugs and alcohol by making healthy choices. While the program is offered at no cost to schools, the cost of the students' learning materials is covered by funds raised from within Nanaimo.

D.A.R.E. BC is a charitable organization which partners with the RCMP to help raise these funds. The learning materials cost \$10 per student.

During the last two school years insufficient funds were raised in to cover the full cost of the materials for your students.

Last year, D.A.R.E. BC undertook a special appeal to service clubs and PACs which raised \$2,500, less than the cost of learning materials for the 1,033 who took the program during the 2012-13 school year, leaving a \$7,830 shortfall which was again covered from our reserve fund. Unfortunately, this fund is now depleted.

We will continue our best efforts to raise sufficient funds within Nanaimo to cover the full cost of delivering the program during the current 2013-14 school year. However, it is unlikely we will be able to raise sufficient funds to cover the full cost of the program from community groups alone.

D.A.R.E. BC is appealing to Nanaimo City Council to make a commitment to cover the anticipated shortfall in funding. Without such a commitment some students may not receive a full set of learning materials. A number of other municipalities in B.C. provide annual grants to support the D.A.R.E. program in their community. We are requesting that Nanaimo does the same.

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D.A.R.E. BC's Mission

Drug abuse is one of our society's most corrosive social problems and with the movement to legalize the use of marijuana the need for prevention programs targeted at youth has never been greater.

The D.A.R.E. BC Society is a Canadian registered charity (CRA Registration # 89140 7413 RR0001) whose purpose is to empower the children of British Columbia with the critical thinking and life skills necessary to choose a drug-free life. The Society's primary mission is to support the delivery of the RCMP's Drug Abuse Resistance Education Program to BC's Grades 5 and 6 school children.

The Society was established over decade ago in the community of Prince George, BC. Since its inception well over 100,000 BC school children have taken D.A.R.E., making it the most widely used and comprehensive youth drug prevention program in BC. Over 250 police officers teach D.A.R.E each year to 12,000 Grade 5 or 6 school children in over 100 BC communities (see page 5). D.A.R.E. has been so successful that it has become the foundation of the RCMP's Community Prevention Education Continuum which is a community-lead, police-assisted, comprehensive drug prevention strategy encompassing youth from Kindergarten through to Grade 12.

D.A.R.E. BC's ongoing mission is to provide the RCMP with the resources and support needed to deliver the D.A.R.E. program to Grade 5 and 6 students in every community in the British Columbia.

The D.A.R.E. Program

The D.A.R.E. Program is a comprehensive school-based drug prevention program taught by police officers to children at the Grade 5/6 level. The program is delivered over a 10-week period, and each lesson is presented in a fun and factual way, designed to maximize student participation using an interactive workbook.

The D.A.R.E. Officers partner with classroom teachers to build protective factors for children by providing information and social skills needed to live drug- and violence-free.

D.A.R.E. also provides opportunities to establish positive relationships among police, children, parents, teachers and other community members.

A 2007 survey of the British Columbia students, parents, teachers and principals had an extremely positive view of the D.A.R.E. program. Of the 5,337 students surveyed, 93% agreed that they learned new ways to make good and informed decisions about the use of alcohol, tobacco and drugs by attending the D.A.R.E. program. In addition, 95% felt the D.A.R.E. program would help them to decide against using drugs in the future.

Over 96% of the 3,050 parents surveyed felt D.A.R.E. had a positive effect on their children's attitudes towards drugs and on their children's decision-making skills. Of 284 teachers surveyed, 97% expressed very positive feelings about having D.A.R.E. officers in their classrooms to deliver the program.

Principals also showed strong support for the program and agreed that D.A.R.E. had a positive effect on their school's students. Of the 200 school principals surveyed, 96% felt the program fully met their professional educational standards and practices.

Accessibility

- The D.A.R.E. BC Society is committed to ensuring that the program is inclusive of everyone, regardless of race, colour, ancestry, place of origin, language, religion, marital status, family status, physical or mental ability, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity or income.
- The program is offered in both official languages English and French.
- A brail version of the student workbook has been developed for students with low vision.
- The program is provided at no cost to students, parents, teachers and schools to ensure financial restraints do not exclude anyone from participation in the program.
- D.A.R.E. Officers receive training on techniques for teaching the program to students with learning disabilities.
- Almost 18% of students graduating from the program are from Aboriginal communities.
- D.A.R.E. Officers teaching the program represent a wide variety of ethnic and religious backgrounds.

Funding Partnerships and Community Supporters

- D.A.R.E. Officer salaries are covered by the RCMP detachments which offer the D.A.R.E. Program to school children in the communities they serve.
- The RCMP also recruits D.A.R.E. Officers from Canadian Border Services, the Department of Oceans and Fisheries, the BC Corrections Service, Canadian Forces Police and municipal police. These agencies cover the salary costs of the D.A.R.E. Officers in their communities.
- The Federal RCMP and the B.C. Ministry of Justice cover the salary costs the RCMP's Drugs and Organized Crime Awareness Service Coordinators who oversee the delivery of the D.A.R.E. program and help to establish community-lead, police-assisted, comprehensive youth drug prevention strategies encompassing youth from Kindergarten through to Grade 12.
- Our education partners include 800 BC schools which support the delivery of the D.A.R.E. Program. Teachers and principals welcome D.A.R.E. because the program directly supports the goals and prescribed learning outcomes of the Health and Career Education curriculum for BC schools.
- Many community organizations contribute generously to cover a portion of the cost of D.A.R.E. learning materials for students in their community.

Permissive Tax Exemption Questionnaire

1. Please see the attached page for a detailed overview of the Nanaimo Museum.

2. We have 4 feature exhibits planned as well as the opening of the final section of the permanent gallery telling the story of Nanaimo's last Chinatown, our retail story and an overview of the downtown hub development and our heritage buildings.

3. Feature exhibits and smaller hallway/lobby exhibits provide several opportunities each year to work with various community groups and organizations to produce "their story". These exhibits also address timely topics which may be related to conferences in the building or anniversaries. Several public programs encourage residents to discover their history and heritage.

4. Our more than 60 active volunteers play a vital role in all areas of operations including gift shop/reception, gallery host/security, docents, research, collection care and management and event/program delivery. We would not be able to operate 6 days a week from September to May and 7 days a week through the summer without their help. We depend on volunteers to assist with program delivery to over 3000 school children every year, as an example.

5. We receive an operating grant from the BC Arts Council and a Community Gaming Grant from the province as well. In the past, we have received various project and capital grants form the Canadian Heritage programs federally.

6. the Nanaimo Museum is funded through and Management Agreement with the City of Nanaimo through Parks, Recreation and Culture Department. In the old building, we have a joint licence of use agreement with the City and the Vancouver Island Military Museum. We use approximately 1/3 of the building.

7. Admission fee is from \$.75 to \$2.00 with varying fees for public programs and school programs, all very reasonable. Our fees are kept low to provide easy access for everyone.

8. No we are not.

9. Operating surpluses (usually very modest) become part of a savings fund internally restricted to be used to further programming or for planned capital expenditures or small deficits.

10. Self generated revenue (including gift shop, donations, admissions, program and event fees, venue rental fees) help fund operations as budgeted. Occasionally, donations are generated for exhibit sponsorship which are used for feature exhibit costs.

10. As the Society has never paid taxes on the old museum building (since 1967) I do not know what that amount would be. We would have to include that amount in our budgeted expenses which may mean cutting back on flexible expenses which would all relate to programming.

11. The City of Nanaimo is recognized as our partner in all printed promotional material and is recognized on our funder wall in the lobby.



The Nanaimo Museum is a dynamic community facility offering diverse interpretive programming encouraging visitors to *Make a Discovery* while exploring the history and heritage of our area. The Society will celebrate 50 years (incorporated April 2, 1964) in 2014. We are celebrating the successful 5th year in our new space that was created with the vision statement: The Nanaimo Museum will enhance cultural quality of life, anchor our community and enlighten visitors while nurturing the flow of inspiration through interactive presentation of stories and objects spanning Nanaimo's history. The museum operates the HBC 1853 fort, The Bastion, an icon in the community and 3rd oldest building in BC.

Our Mission is to engage the community and visitors in meaningful experiences relating to the cultural heritage of what is now the City of Nanaimo and surrounding district (i.e. School District #68), as well as to provide a learning environment though which the public can experience links between the past, present and future. Our mandate includes:

- Expand collections while continuing to ensure they are relevant, well researched and accessible.
- Engage as many "communities" as possible through exhibits, events and programs.
- · Make exhibitions stimulating, involving, and related to Nanaimo's unique history and development.
- Use our newly designed and expanded facility to the best advantage to meet our goals.

The museum has always placed a positive and accessible visitor experience at the forefront of operations. We strive to be welcoming and friendly with informed volunteers and to ensure programming and exhibits are informative for residents and visitors alike. We encourage diversity and are a Safe Harbour designated facility. Our First Nations collection is held in trust for the Snunéymuxw First Nation with whom we work closely to interpret their story.

Our "through the door" 2012 numbers for the museum and Bastion combined were just under 57,000 which compared very well to other similar organizations, some with larger budgets and communities. In 2012 we offered 78 school programs, 80 other programming and guided tours and 11 feature or temporary exhibits.

The Nanaimo Museum also became the home of the prestigious Wally Buono Award presented annually to the top junior football player in Canada. The award ceremonies will take place every spring in Nanaimo. The award is housed in the Sports Hall of Fame exhibit area in our lobby.

The museum occupies 30% of the old museum space for workshop and non-critical artifact storage. The remaining 70% is occupied by the Vancouver Island Military Museum through a joint lease with the City of Nanaimo. All three organizations are excited about the partnership opportunities for exhibits and programming. Both museum buildings are owned by the City of Nanaimo which maintains all physical plant functions.

Our space includes an 8,000 sq ft gallery, 2500sq ft artifact storage, 600 sq ft display prep, 2400 sq ft lobby/reception/gift shop/Sports hall of Fame space. The 700 sq ft program room is working well for public and school programs, meetings and venue rental to other community groups for meetings and seminars. Venue rental is extremely popular for these spaces.

A 10-member Board of Directors (elected by the membership) governs the museum, including the following valuable community representation: Nanaimo Port Authority, Coastal Community Credit Union, Royal Bank, Snunéymuxw First Nations, local family 100 year business, legal profession, former City Councillor and the President of Vancouver Island University.

The museum is very efficiently operated with 7.5 FTE staff augmented in the summer with 4 students chosen from among the students at VIU focusing on history, education and tourism studies. We also manage and interpret the Bastion, one of the oldest buildings in BC. Between the 2 sites we welcomed almost 57,000 visitors in 2012. The museum could not deliver our interpretive programming without the assistance of over 60 active volunteers to whom we are very grateful. They contributed 4852 hours last year. Our collection includes almost 15,000 artifacts and over 10,000 photographs.

Staff positions now consist of the General Manager, Curator, Assistant Curator/Exhibit Designer, Program &Volunteer Coordinator, Administrative Assistant, Curatorial Assistant, Maintenance and bookkeeper, Gift Shop merchandiser (both part time). The General Manager manages the operation as a signing authority (CEO position).

To the Members of Nanaimo & District Museum Society:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Nanaimo & District Museum Society, which comprise the statements of financial position as at December 31, 2012, December 31, 2011 and January 1, 2011, and the statements of operations, and the related schedule of gift shop and book sales, and statements of changes in net assets and cash flows for the years ended December 31, 2012 and December 31, 2011, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with Canadian auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our gualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, the Society derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records and we were not able to determine whether adjustments might be necessary to donation revenues, excess of revenues over expenses, assets and net assets.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly in all material respects the financial position of the Nanaimo & District Museum Society as at December 31, 2012, December 31, 2011, and January 1, 2011 and the results of its operations, changes in net assets and its cash flows for the years ended December 31, 2012 and December 31, 2011 in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

As required by the Society Act (British Columbia), we report that, in our opinion, except as disclosed in Note 2, the accounting principles in the Canadian Accounting Standards for Not-For-Profit organizations have been applied on a consistent basis.

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1. Purpose of the organization

The Nanaimo & District Museum Society (the "Society") designs exhibits and programs regarding the history of the Nanaimo region. The Society is incorporated under the laws of the Society Act of British Columbia as a not-for-profit organization. It is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and is exempt from income taxes as long as certain conditions are met. It is management's opinion that these requirements have been met.

2. Impact of adopting accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations

These are the Society's first financial statements prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations (ASNPO). The accounting policies in Note 3 have been applied in preparing the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2012, the comparative information for the year ended December 31, 2011, and the opening ASNPO balance sheet as at January 1, 2011 (the Society's date of transition to ASNPO).

The transition to ASNPO has not affected the statement of financial position or the statements of operations, changes in net assets, or cash flows previously reported under Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

In preparing these financial statements, the Society has elected to apply the following transitional provision permitted by CICA 1501 First-time adoption by not-for-profit organizations at the date of transition to ASNPO:

Financial instruments

The Society elected to designate all investments held by Credential Securities to be measured at fair value at the date of transition to ASNPO.

3. Significant accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations using the following significant accounting policies:

Revenue recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Revenues with external restrictions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Admissions, programs, events, gift shop and book sales are recognized as revenue when collection is reasonably assured and the service or product is delivered. Bastion summer program grants are recognized as revenue in the funding period they relate to and other Bastion summer program revenue is recognized when proceeds are received. Donations are recorded when received. All other revenue is recognized when received or when the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Contributions received specifically for the purchase of equipment are deferred and recognized as revenue at the same rate that the related equipment is amortized.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Operating grants and Bingo Income are recognized as revenue in the period that the funding relates to or when the related expenditure is incurred. Investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

3. Significant accounting policies (Continued from previous page)

Artifacts

Due to the difficulty of estimating the fair value of the artifacts donated to the museum, donated artifacts are not recorded in the accounts.

Donated capital assets, materials and services

Donated capital assets, materials and services are recognized in the financial statements when the fair value can be reasonably determined and they are used in the normal course of the Society's operations and would otherwise have been purchased.

Volunteers contribute a number of hours to assist the Society in delivering its services. The Society rents its premises from the City of Nanaimo for \$1 per year. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair value of these items, contributed services and rent are not recognized in the financial statements.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value using the weighted average method. See schedule for the amount of inventory recognized as an expense.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include balances with banks and short-term investments that are traded in the public market and are held on a short term basis. Cash subject to restrictions that prevent its use for current purposes is included in internally and externally restricted cash.

Measurement uncertainty (use of estimates)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Accounts receivable are stated after evaluation as to their collectibility and an appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts is provided where considered necessary. Provisions are made for slow moving and obsolete inventory. Amortization is based on the estimated useful life of equipment.

These estimates and assumptions are reviewed periodically and, as adjustments become necessary they are reported in earnings in the periods in which they become known.

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3. Significant accounting policies (Continued from previous page)

Equipment

Equipment is initially recorded at cost. Amortization is provided using the straight-line method at rates intended to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives as follows.

In the year of acquisition, amortization is taken at one-half of the above rates.

Financial instruments

The Society recognizes its financial instruments when the Society becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. All financial instruments are initially recorded at their fair value, including financial assets and liabilities originated and issued in a related party transaction with management. Financial assets and liabilities originated and issued in all other related party transactions are initially measured at their carrying or exchange amount in accordance with CICA 3840 Related Party Transactions.

At initial recognition, the Society may irrevocably elect to subsequently measure any financial instrument at fair value. The Society has not made such an election during the year.

The Society subsequently measures investments in equity instruments quoted in an active market and all derivative instruments, except those designated in a qualifying hedging relationship or that are linked to, and must be settled by delivery of, unquoted equity instruments of another entity, at fair value. Fair value is determined by published price quotations. Investments in equity instruments not quoted in an active market and derivatives that are linked to, and must be settled by delivery of, unquoted equity instruments of another entity, are subsequently measured at cost less impairment. With the exception of financial liabilities indexed to a measure of the Society's performance or value of its equity and those instruments designated at fair value, all other financial assets and liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost.

Transaction costs and financing fees directly attributable to the origination, acquisition, issuance or assumption of financial instruments subsequently measured at fair value are immediately recognized in excess of revenues over expenses. Conversely, transaction costs and financing fees are added to the carrying amount for those financial instruments subsequently measured at amortized cost.

4. Investments

Included in the internally restricted cash and investments is cash of \$52,259 (Dec 2011 - \$51,543; Jan 2011 - \$1,522), money market and mutual funds of \$129,403 (Dec 2011 - \$122,442; Jan 2011 - 140,279).

In 2008, the Society transferred \$100,000 to the Nanaimo Community Foundation, an independent public foundation. This transfer was matched by a matching funds grant from the Vancouver Foundations' Renaissance Fund. The Society holds a beneficial interest in these funds. The market value of the funds held by the Nanaimo Community Foundation was \$192,351 as at September 30, 2012.

By agreement with the Nanaimo Community Foundation, the Society is to receive annual income from the funds held. These funds are held in perpetuity and controlled by the Nanaimo Community Foundation and are therefore not included in these financial statements. Investment income from these funds is recorded by the Society in the year earned and is included in the financial statements.

11. Economic dependence

As the Society's main source of income is derived from grants from the City of Nanaimo and the City of Nanaimo supplies the space to the Museum at no charge, its ability to continue viable operations is dependent upon the continued support from the City of Nanaimo. The Society has been striving to diversify its revenue sources to reduce its dependence on support from the City of Nanaimo.

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12. Financial instruments

All significant financial assets and financial liabilities of the Society are either recognized or disclosed in the financial statements together with other information relevant for making a reasonable assessment of future cash flows, interest rate risk and credit risk.

It is management's opinion that the Society is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments except as otherwise disclosed.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument might be adversely affected by a change in interest rates. Changes in market interest rates may have an effect on the cash flows associated with some financial assets and liabilities, known as cash flow risk, and on the fair value of other financial assets or liabilities, known as price risk. In seeking to minimize the risks from interest rate fluctuations, the Society manages exposure through investing in money market funds and mutual funds.

1. Please describe the work of your organization in this community.

The Port Theatre Society is a community based, professional arts organization, with a mandate to stimulate economic and artistic activity in the central Vancouver Island region. We manage The Port Theatre for the City of Nanaimo through a co-management agreement. We manage the operations, the maintenance, all of the activity (approx. 220 events annually), capital planning and fundraising for capital improvements. We manage the staffing and the safety of visiting acts, our staff and the public, as well as ensuring that this municipally funded Arts Centre remains at top performance level.

2. What are your organization's specific priorities for the coming year?

The societies priorities for 2014 are to continue our work in attracting touring acts from across the country and internationally, as well as presenting artists that would not come to Nanaimo if we did not present them, along with continuing to offer subsidized rental rates to community users, NFP organizations and to continue developing community partnerships.

We will continue our efforts to complete this Community Performing Arts Centre through the construction of a facility with multiple rehearsal spaces and a 200 seat theatre as our focus.

3. How does your organization ensure that its services address continuing and emerging community needs?

As a performing arts organization we are actively involved in a multitude of partnerships with other arts organizations to continue to raise the awareness Arts and Culture in the central island. We have numerous ongoing community programs, Schools on Stage, EyeGo to the Arts and Theatre Angels to ensure accessibility.

4. Please describe the role of volunteers in your organization.

The Society has a volunteer roster of almost 200 with a 4-6 month waiting list. Our volunteers act as our ushers, offer office assistance and are a direct connection to our community. We utilize over 10,000 volunteer hours each year.

5. Please list grants applied for/received from other governments or service clubs.

Annually, we apply for funding from The Department of Canadian Heritage and the BC Arts Council to assist with presenting. In 2013 we received confirmation of 2 years funding from the Department of Canadian Heritage.

6. Please list other City of Nanaimo grants applied for and/or received, including Operating Funding, grants from other Committees, etc.

None at this time.

7. Please provide details of fees for service in your organization, and how costs and fees are determined.

- Theatre Rental.... The rental fees are published and are weighted and scaled to ensure community access. Most rentals are based on a minimum with a % of net sales. This allows for a community group to have very reasonable rent, starting at \$800 per day....Commercial clients pay a higher base and a higher %. Virtually all of our fees are scaled to help community users.
- Ticket Centre..... Fee for community groups for set-up and sales of tickets is \$275..commercial is \$375.
- Technical Services...All of our technical services are billed out at the actual pay rate plus 20% to cover statutory deductions and a portion of benefits.
- Front of House.... We do not charge for ushering staff. We charge community groups \$50 per show... and commercial clients \$200 per show for a Front of House Manager charge..

8. If your organization is a branch of a larger organization, please indicate how this affects the financial and other information you have provided.

9. Please describe your policy and treatment of: capital, reserve or special purpose funds, and yearend surpluses or deficits.

The Port Theatre Society operates using fund accounting. All operating surpluses and deficits are carried forward into the next fiscal year with possible reallocation of the various funds. We have a 10 year rotating capital plan that is currently funded through \$75,000 annually from the City and approx. \$60,000 annually from our Ticket Centre CDF revenue.

We currently have a Studio Theatre fund which we have used to design the future expansion.

10. Please describe current or planned approaches to self generated income.

Currently the city's management fee for operating the Port Theatre comprises approximately 24% of our operating budget. We self-generate approximately 76% of total operating income. Our direct payroll to residents of the region is almost \$1 million dollars.

11. What will the effect be if you do not receive a permissive tax exemption from the City of Nanaimo?

It would have a very negative effect on our ability to operate. We would respectfully request that all City-owned facilities be taxed and discussed in the same light.

12. How has the City's contribution been recognized?

There are no guidelines in the management agreement for recognition, although we acknowledge and thank the city at every opportunity.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended December 31, 2012

1. Society operations

The society's mandate is to stimulate and enhance artistic, cultural, and economic activity of central Vancouver Island through the management and operation of The Port Theatre in Nanaimo, B.C. The society was incorporated under the *Society Act* of British Columbia and is a registered charity under the *Income Tax Act*.

2. Significant accounting policies

The society has elected to apply Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

These financial statements are the first financial statements for which the society has applied the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

The financial statements for all periods presented were prepared in accordance with the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and provisions set out in First-Time Adoption, Section 1501, for first-time adopters of this basis of accounting.

The impact of adopting these standards was accounted for in net assets at the date of transition, January 1, 2011 (beginning of the first fiscal period for comparison purposes). However, because of the elections the society has chosen upon transition, no adjustments were required to be made to net assets at the date of transition.

- Fund accounting

The society uses the restricted fund method of accounting for revenues and expenditures.

- Equipment

Equipment is recorded at cost and amortized. Amortization on the piano is recorded on a straight-line basis over its estimated useful life of 40 years.

In the year of acquisition, amortization is recorded at one-half of this rate.

- Inventory

Inventory is recorded at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost is measured using the specific identification method.

- Revenue recognition

Revenue and contributions are recognized when amounts can be reasonably estimated and when collection is reasonably assured as follows:

- Operating government grants and fees not restricted in use are recognized when received or receivable. Such grants and fees, if contributed for a future period, are deferred and reported as deferred revenue until that future period.
- Other unrestricted revenue, including ticket sales, front of house, and theatre rental, are reported as revenue at the time the services or products are provided.

- Contributed services

Volunteers contribute many hours per year to assist the society in carrying out the operations of the theatre. Because of the difficulty in determining fair market value, services contributed by volunteers are not recognized in these financial statements.

- Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

6. Capital development fund/City of Nanaimo assets

- Capital development fund

This fund represents reserve funds for which revenue is derived from collections on each ticket sold and specific donations. The capital development fund can only be used for the building and theatre equipment owned by the City of Nanaimo. The City of Nanaimo provides an annual capital contribution to the society in the amount of \$100,000 which is also to be used towards the purchase of these assets.

- Contributions to theatre assets owned by the City of Nanaimo

During the year, the society made several purchases for the building and theatre equipment, totaling \$105,907. These items have been recorded as contributions to theatre assets owned by the City of Nanaimo, as they form an integral part of the theatre and its operations. The theatre also contributed \$42,441 in existing assets to the City in satisfaction of the terms of a new co-management agreement with the City effective January 1, 2012.

The society has contributed a total of \$998,785 in theatre assets since 2002. The City of Nanaimo has contributed a total of \$800,000 in theatre assets since 2005.

7. Studio theatre fund

The studio theatre fund represents funds donated specifically towards the design and development of the studio theatre.

8. Contingency reserve fund

This fund can be used for operating and capital expenditures.

9. Endowment fund

CONTRACTOR AND A DESCRIPTION OF A DESCRI

This fund is administered by The Nanaimo Community Foundation, and is invested with Nesbitt Burns Inc. The fund represents reserve funds for which revenue is derived from collections on each ticket sold and specific donations. The capital of the endowment fund is to be held in perpetuity. Income from the fund is calculated on an annual basis by the Nanaimo Community Foundation and is distributed to the society at the end of March each year. The society has contributed \$592,048 in total to December 31, 2012. The Vancouver Foundation matched the society's contributions in 2007 and 2008 with \$326,836 in total. The balance of the endowment fund at December 31, 2012 includes fund earnings and changes in the market value of the investments:

10. Port Presents programming

The Port Presents programming supports the work of Canadian artists. The society promotes various shows during the year. The revenue for the Port Presents programming comes from ticket sales for the various shows, specific show sponsorships, and grants received to promote the programming.

During the year, the society received a grant of \$62,000 (2011 - \$62,000) from the Canada Arts Presentation Fund. This grant has been included in the Port Presents programming revenue, as the funds are designated to support the promotion of Canadian artists.

11. Co-management agreement - City of Nanaimo

The society entered into a new agreement with the City of Nanaimo to undertake the responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the the Port Theatre, effective January 1, 2012 for a five-year term expiring on December 31, 2017. This agreement grants the society the right to occupy the theatre. The terms provide an option to renew for a further five years on the same terms and conditions. The City of Nanaimo and the Port Theatre Society entered into an agreement dated for reference on April 30, 1996 that there would be a theatre constructed under the terms and conditions of the agreement. Operation of the theatre commenced in September 1998. The licence to occupy commenced in March 2000.

12. Contingent liabilities and commitments

The society entered into contractual commitments with artists and performers for shows. These commitments total \$33,200 (2011 - \$56,000) as at December 31, 2012, of which \$3,750 (2011 - \$12,094) has been paid in deposits.

These 16 parcels of land are situated within the Buttertubs Marsh, Morrell Wildlife Sanctuary, and Nanaimo River Estuary. We are pleased to continue our long-term partnership with the City of Nanaimo in managing these conservation areas for wildlife and the people of Nanaimo.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

December 31, 2012 and 2011

#### 1. OPERATIONS

The Government of Canada created The Nature Trust of British Columbia (the "Trust") effective July 1, 1971. The Trust is incorporated under Part II of the Canada Business Corporations Act.

The Trust's objective is the conservation of British Columbia's natural habitat and biodiversity through land securement and management activities. The Trust holds its properties, capital, and accumulated income in a trustee capacity. The majority of the properties owned by the Trust have been leased or are in the process of being leased to federal, provincial or municipal authorities, and to non-government organizations under long-term leases for conservation purposes.

Under the provisions of Section 149.1(1) (b) of the Income Tax Act, the Trust is classified as a "Charitable Organization", and is accordingly exempt from income and capital taxes.

#### 2. ADOPTION OF ACCOUNTING STANDARDS FOR NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

These financial statements were prepared in accordance with Part III of the CICA Handbook - Accounting ("Part III").

The Trust's first reporting period using Part III is for the year ended December 31, 2012. As a result, the date of transition to Part III is January 1, 2011. The Trust presented financial statements under its previous Canadian generally accepted accounting principles ("CGAAP") annually to December 31st of each fiscal year up to, and including. December 31, 2011.

As these financial statements are the first financial statements for which the Trust has applied Part III, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions set out in Section 1501 of Part III, First-time Adoption by Not-for-Profit Organizations.

The Trust is required to apply Part III effective for periods ending on December 31, 2012 in:

a) Preparing and presenting its opening consolidated statement of financial position at January 1, 2011; and
 b) Preparing and presenting its consolidated statement of financial position for December 31, 2012 (including comparative amounts for 2011), consolidated statement of operations and net assets, and consolidated statement of cash flows for the year ended December 31, 2012 (including comparative amounts for 2011) and disclosures (including comparative information for 2011).

After applying the new accounting recommendations the Trust identified one item that required an adjustment. In 2011 there was an unrealized loss in the fair market value of the Trust's investment portfolio in the amount of \$119,109. This amount was previously reported in the general fund statement of changes in net assets. Under the new recommendations this item is to be reported in the statement of operations. Accordingly, the 2011 comparative financial statements have been restated to report this change in fair value of \$119,109 in the statement of operations. There was no change to fund net assets or cash flow.

#### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These consolidated financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for not-for-profit organizations.

The accounting policies of the Trust are as follows:

#### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES -- Cont'd

(a) Basis of accounting

These consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Trust and the assets, liabilities, net assets, revenues, expenses and other transactions of White Lake Basin Holdings Ltd., 0772995 B.C. Ltd. and 0925311 B.C. Ltd., which are controlled by the Trust.

(b) Investments

The Trust's investment activities are governed by an endowment fund investment policy as approved by the Board of Directors. This policy has guidelines as to asset categories and mix in accordance with the investment and risk philosophy of the fund. Investment managers of the fund are selected by the Trust's Audit, Finance and Investment committee and continually monitored for performance.

#### (c) Capital assets

Capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Building consists of three suites in a strata title office building. Amortization is provided on a declining-balance basis using the following annual rates:

#### (d) Trust property acquisitions

Trust property purchased is recorded at cost. Property donated is recorded at the fair market value on the acquisition date.

(e) Pacific Estuary Conservation Program property acquisitions

The Trust holds title on behalf of all participants to properties acquired through the Pacific Estuary Conservation Program. Properties are recorded at cost.

- (f) Fund accounting
  - (i) General Fund

The general fund accounts for the Trust's unrestricted resources and administrative functions. The balance at year end represents the original capital contributed by the Government of Canada on July 1, 1971 in the amount of \$4.5 million, the Trust's investment in capital assets, changes in fair value on financial instruments, and accumulated operating surpluses and deficits.

(ii) Endowment Fund

The endowment fund was established in 2008 to ensure that the Trust maintains a sufficient capital base for its long term operating and property acquisition needs. This is a restricted fund, with only investment income generated from the endowment capital to be used by the Trust to fund these purposes, with the capital to be held in perpetuity.

#### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Cont'd

(iii) Property Fund

The property fund accounts for the accumulated cost of land acquisitions. It includes land acquired for cash, land donated, land acquired pursuant to long term leases, and certain properties acquired through the Pacific Estuary Conservation Program.

(iv) Land Management Fund

The land management fund was established to support the management and maintenance of properties the Trust has acquired to ensure that the long-term ecological and habitat values for which they were acquired are achieved. Contributions to the fund are designated by donors. Also included are funds contributed from the Forest Renewal BC program, which originated under an agreement signed in 1998 with the Trust to ensure the on-going management of properties secured under the agreement. This is a restricted fund, with only investment income generated from the capital to be used by the Trust to fund these purposes, with the capital to be held in perpetuity.

(g) Revenue recognition

The Trust follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expense or property acquisition cost is incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Investment income is recorded on an accrual basis which includes cash dividend and interest income, reinvested distributions from pooled mutual fund investments and realized gains and losses on sale of investments.

Unrealized appreciation and depreciation in the fair value of investments is recognized as changes in fair value of investments.

Endowment contributions are recorded as direct increases in net assets for capital.

(h) Use of estimates

The preparation of the consolidated financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the dates of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(i) Financial instruments

The Trust initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value with transaction costs expensed when incurred. The Trust subsequently measures its financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments in quoted active markets, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the consolidated statement of operations and net assets.

Financial assets of the Trust include cash and investments, accounts receivable and prepaid expenses.

Financial liabilities of the Trust include promissory notes payable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities and deferred revenue are classified as other financial liabilities.

#### 3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - Cont'd

The Trust performs an annual test for impairment on its financial assts. Impairment is recognized by a direct reduction to the carrying value of the asset with the loss recognized in the consolidated statement of operations and changes in net assets. When the event that caused the impairment reverses or improves in the future, the loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the consolidated statement of operations and net assets.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Trust is not exposed to significant interest or credit risks arising from these financial instruments.

#### (j) Contributed assets

The Trust receives shares and land donated from contributors. These contributions are recorded at fair market value when received.

### 4. INVESTMENTS

All investments are measured at fair value which is readily available from published price quotations in the active market.

#### 10. INVESTMENT AND OTHER INCOME

#### a) Vancouver Foundation

The Trust is the beneficiary of the income from The Nature Trust of British Columbia Fund held by the Vancouver Foundation. The capital and income funds held by the Vancouver Foundation on behalf of the Trust, which are not reflected in these financial statements, amount to \$278,191 and \$3,167 respectively at December 31, 2012 (2011 - \$271,941 and \$3,071). Included in investment income is \$12,563 (2011 - \$12,128) in respect of this fund. The fair market value of the fund on December 31, 2012 was \$341,010 (2011 - \$324,982).

#### c) British Columbia Government Endowment Fund

In April of 2008 the British Columbia government announced the creation of a \$6 million Conservation Land Operating Account on behalf of The Trust. The account will be administered by the Habitat *Conservation Trust Foundation and investment income generated from the account will be used* to fund conservation land management projects. 2012 was the first year The Trust was granted a payment from this account, totalling \$344,335, which represented payment of investment income for the past two years.

#### 12. FUNDS HELD IN TRUST

The Trust was appointed as administrator for the Vancouver Island Conservation Land Management Program and the Kootenay Conservation Program. The Trust holds funds in trust for these programs in the amount of \$80,257 and \$89,284 respectively, (2011 - \$126,860; \$0), which are excluded from the Trust's statement of financial position.

#### 14. BANK LINE OF CREDIT

In 2008 the Trust established a line of credit with a total borrowing facility of \$500,000, bearing interest at the bank's prime lending rate payable monthly and secured by certain investments held by the Trust. The line of credit was established to meet short term funding obligations.

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#### **15. CONTINGENCY**

In 2009 an action was commenced by way of a petition brought by certain petitioners under the *Partition of Property Act* to apply for a partition of certain property located on Savary Island and jointly owned by the petitioners and the Trust. On February 3, 2010, the petition was heard, and an eight or four lot partition was ordered with the terms requiring each party to share in the costs of the subdivision. This ruling was subsequently appealed by the Trust which resulted in the original decision being upheld. The petitioners submitted an application for a four lot subdivision under the *Land Title Act* on November 4, 2010. The Preliminary Layout Approval (PLA) was issued by the Provincial Approving Officer (PAO) on January 23, 2012. During 2012 the Trust and the petitioners were in discussions with respect to alternative arrangements for the subdivision, which may permit less costly alternatives or a more efficient conclusion to the conditions of the PLA. The petitioners request to the PAO for an extension of the PLA has been granted and will now expire on January 30, 2014. The Trust's proportionate share of the subdivision costs are expected to be approximately \$750,000. To date the Trust has incurred legal and other professional support expenses of \$352,434 in respect of this matter. These expenses have been reported in the statement of operations as a period expense.

In July of 2010, a further action was commenced by the same petitioners on a separate Savary Island property under the *Partition of Property Act*, which is now being settled out of court.

#### **16. LIFE INSURANCE POLICIES**

The Trust is the owner of several life insurance policies with an insured value of approximately \$2,251,700 (2011 - \$2,431,700). The Trust owns one policy in respect of which it makes the annual premium payment which is approximately \$23,000. For the remaining policies the policy donors pay the annual premiums. The total cash surrender values associated with these policies is nominal and have not been included the Trust's statement of financial position.

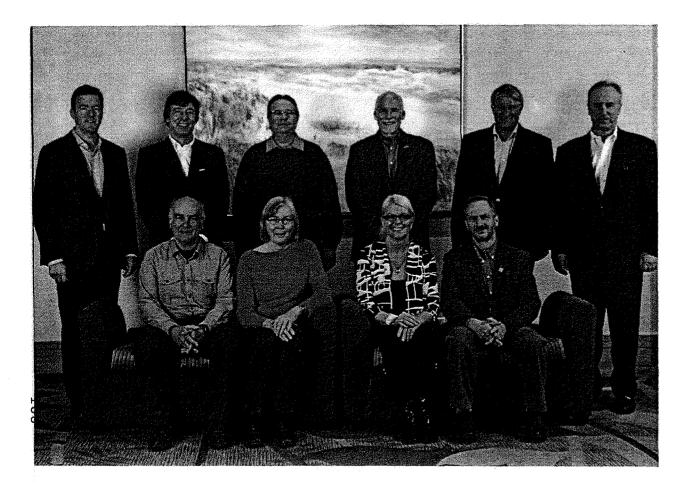

Carmen served on the Board for 20 years and has been actively involved in wildlife and land use issues across British Columbia for over 40 years.

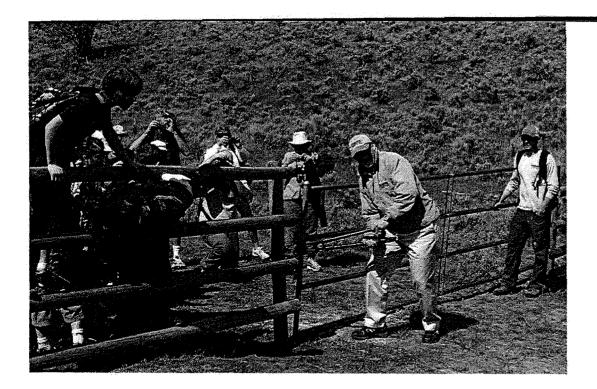

2012 was action packed—a year to celebrate! The Nature Trust of British Columbia continued to deliver on our mandate to conserve BC's natural diversity of plants and wildlife through the securement and management of ecologically significant land which is most at risk of being lost.

Our year began with the closing of one of the most significant land acquisitions in our organization's 42-year history: Twin Lakes. This is one of BC's top priority conservation properties with 2,000 acres (810 hectares) of grasslands, forest and wetlands located in close proximity to our White Lake Biodiversity Ranch. This acquisition doubled our conservation holdings in the area. One beautiful day in May I was honoured to join over 200 people to celebrate and tour the property. Now we are busy preparing a management plan to guide our conservation efforts to maintain, restore and enhance this and adjoining properties.

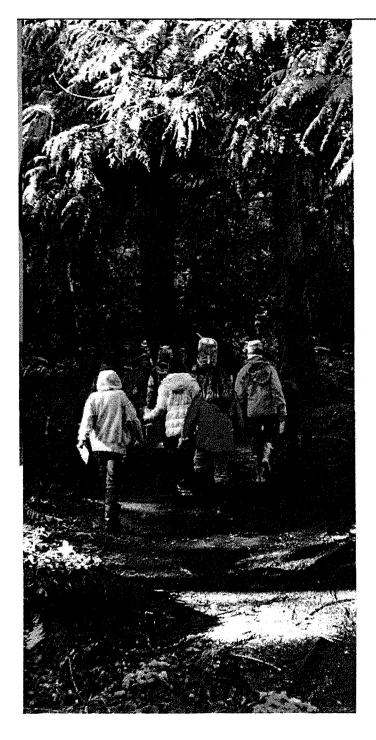
Other conservation highlights included the donation of Northey Lake – Black Creek Wetlands on Vancouver Island, the Okanagan Falls Grassland property and the Little-Levin Lake property in the Peace River. We worked with the Regional District of Nanaimo to raise funds for a beautiful 85-acre (34 hectare) property near Nanoose Bay now called Moorecroft Regional Park. One very memorable experience was the dedication of the Slocan River property now called the Kieran Galbraith Memorial Park in memory of a young man who

Considerable thought and time was committed to defining our agreement on leased lands with the Province. Approximately 60% of Nature Trust properties are leased to the Province and The Nature Trust performs land management on these properties. Under the guidance of our land management team, our Conservation Youth Crews provided young people with summer employment while performing important on-the-ground activities.

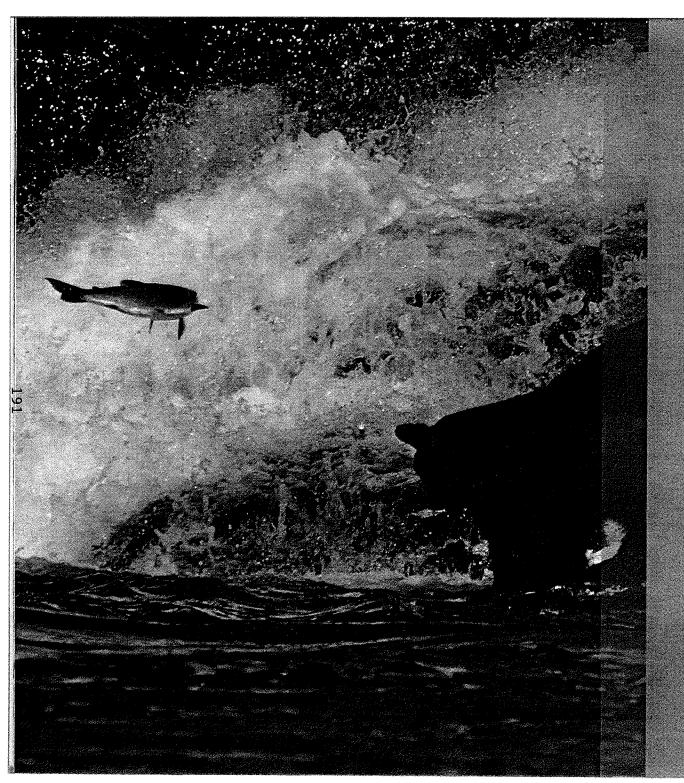

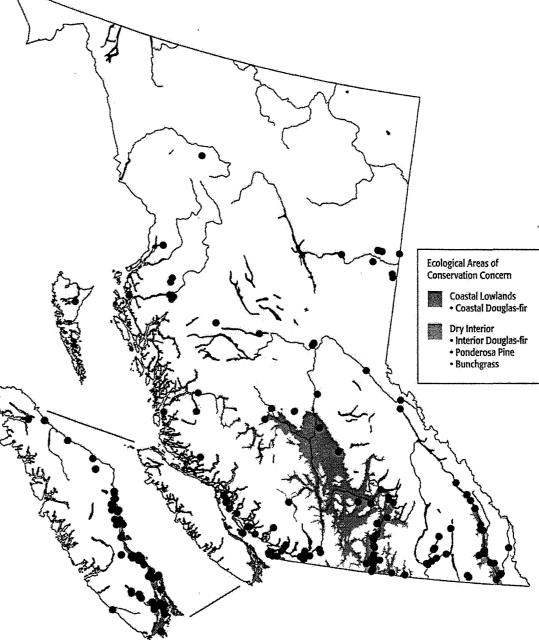

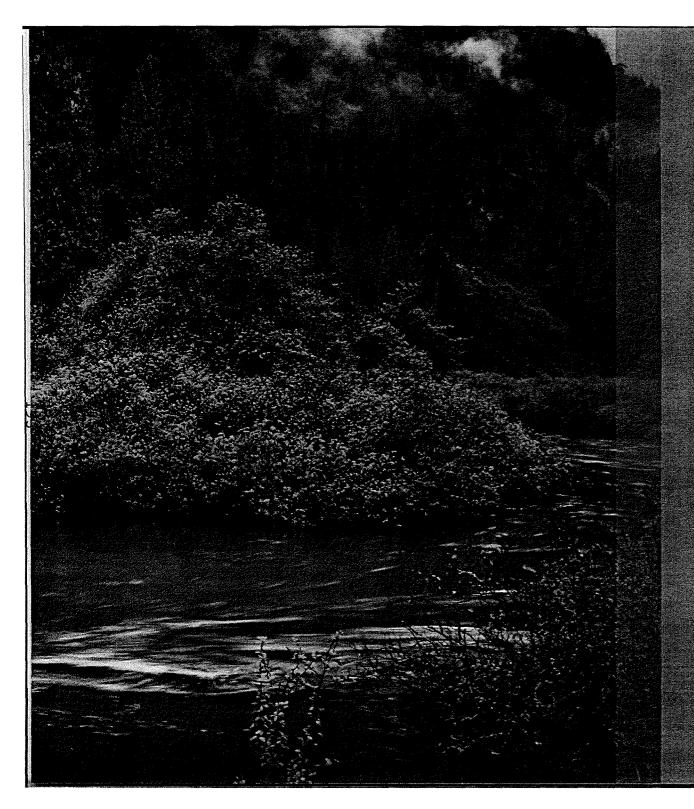
Approximately 6% of the land base in BC is privately owned. This may seem like a small amount of land but there is a disproportionate number of species and ecosystems at risk in the low elevation areas such as valley bottoms and coastal lowlands where most of the private land is located. Perhaps not surprising because this is where most of the people live.

This is where The Nature Trust plays a significant role to acquire and manage private land for conservation. We work in partnership with other conservation organizations and various levels of government to put together land assemblages that will conserve functioning ecosystems and ecological processes.

The priority regions (or biogeoclimatic ecosystem classification zones) for The Nature Trust and where we proactively identify candidate properties to secure are:

- O Coastal Douglas-fir-ranked exceptional/high
- O Bunchgrass ranked high
- O Ponderosa Pine ranked high
- O Interior Douglas-fir-ranked high/medium



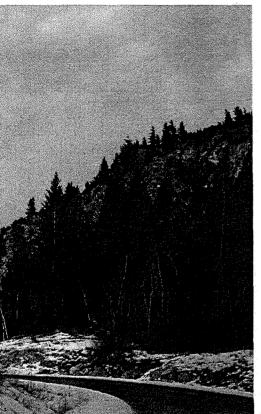

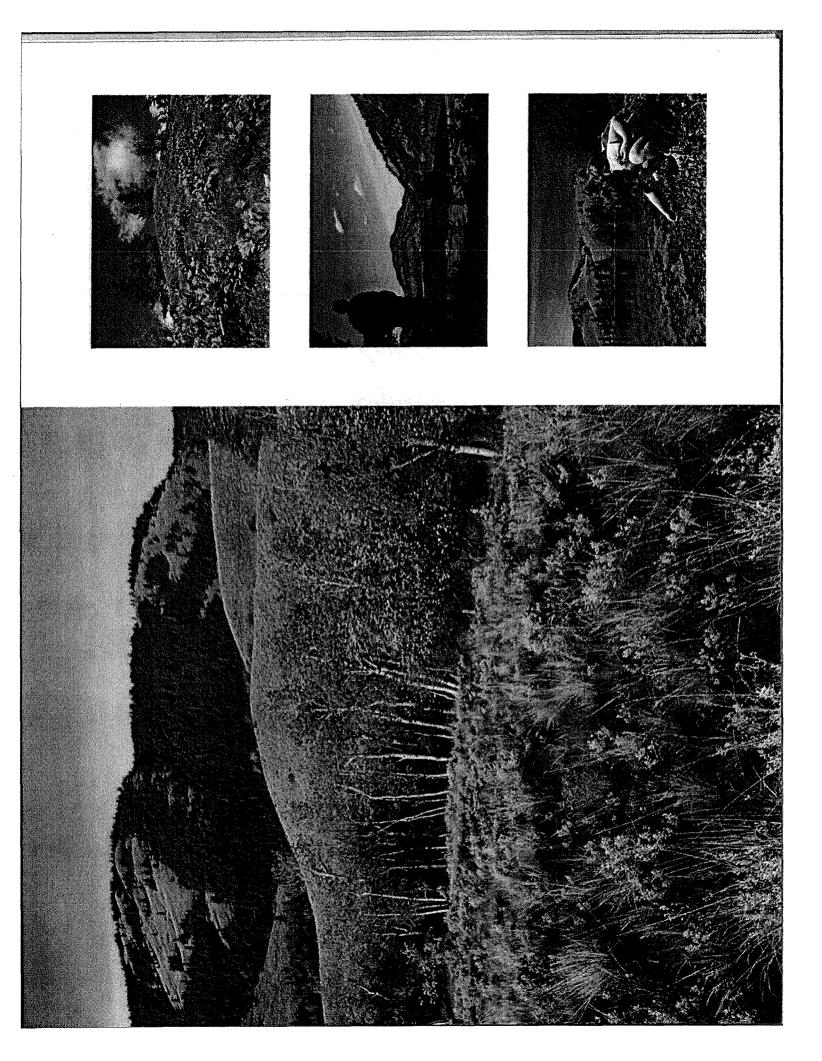


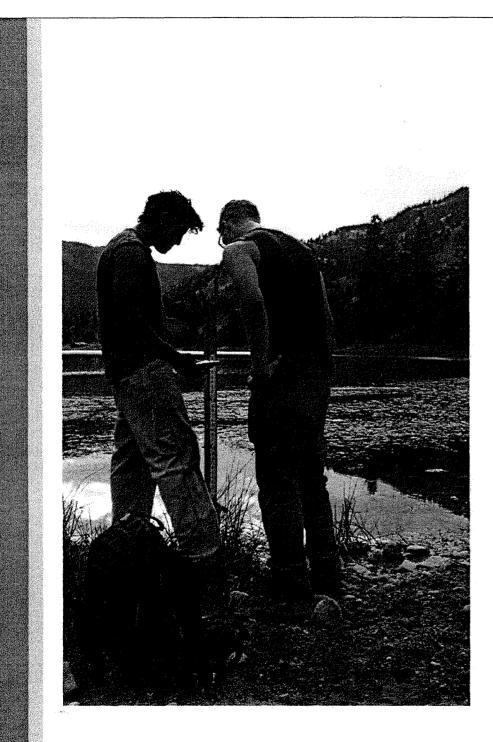
# **Twin Lakes Ranch Conservation Area**

## Land Management

Since 1971 The Nature Trust of BC has secured over 70,000 hectares (170,000 acres) of land across the province. While land acquisition has been a tremendous success, an equally important accomplishment has been the management of these conservation properties. We need to ensure that the integrity of habitat values identified in long term management objectives for a particular property is maintained or achieved. To meet these objectives, The Nature Trust of BC has regional land managers on Vancouver Island, in the South Okanagan and the East Kootenay. This team identifies what needs to be done and coordinates field work with the assistance of Conservation Youth Crews and volunteers such as naturalist and stewardship groups.

Most of the on-the-ground land management activities are completed by the Conservation Youth Crews each summer. In 2012, crew members worked on 80 properties across the province. Tasks included:

- O Habitat restoration
- O Fence construction to protect habitat values
- O Wildlife research and habitat monitoring
- O Trail and infrastructure maintenance and inspection
- O Community outreach
- O Rubbish removal

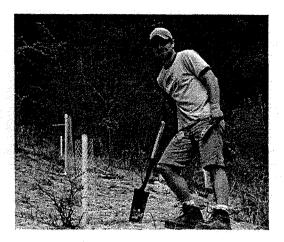

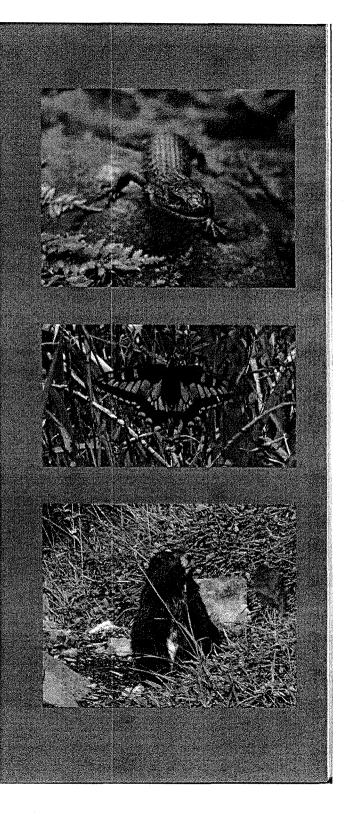


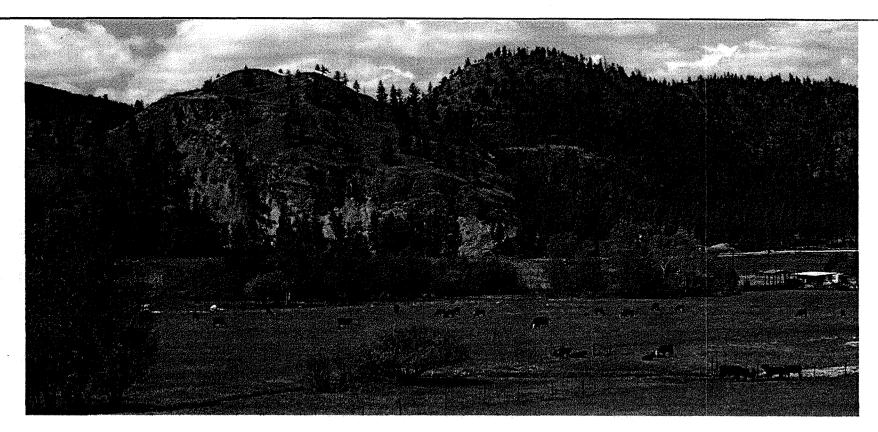

## **Okanagan Falls Biodiversity Ranch**

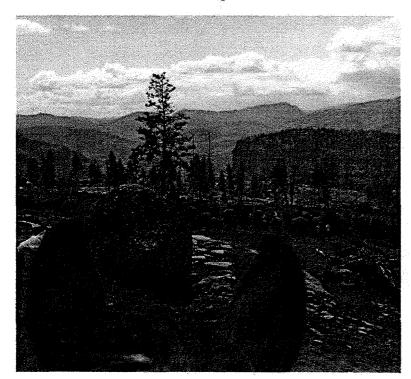
In the 1990s and 2000s, The Nature Trust of British Columbia acquired two active ranch operations at Okanagan Falls as part of its program to conserve the sensitive grassland ecosystems of the South Okanagan (one of the most threatened ecosystems in Canada) and demonstrate innovative conservation land management strategies. This complex of conservation lands totals 111,000 acres (44,914 hectares) under varying tenures, including private land, leased land, and Crown land grazing license.

Our primary goal is to maintain and restore to as natural a state as possible the grassland and associated habitats. Our premise is that a healthy, unfragmented landscape will support a diverse, thriving community of native plant and animal species as well as a viable domestic livestock ranching enterprise. We accomplish this through partnerships, scientific research, and practical knowledge in management planning.

Given the unconventional nature of this conservation project, it requires the participation of open-minded, enthusiastic, ranching partners such as Ryan and Erin Culligan who took over the ranch in 2009. The Culligans were originally from Saskatchewan and they wanted to start their own cattle ranching business. Ryan grew up on a working ranch and brought valuable experience and knowledge while Erin is a trained veterinarian and has worked with animals all her life. Their plan is to build from 250 head of cattle to 500 over five years.

- Erin: I think it's really neat how The Nature Trust purchases land for the sake of conservation and how we can intertwine with them as a ranching family. And so we can work in the cattle business and be conservationists at the same time. We can partake in the conservation part as far as the rangeland is concerned with the proper management of our cows and pastures accordingly and just looking after our grass. And taking into account the wildlife that runs here and moving our cows accordingly to their patterns.
- Ryan: I think any rancher wants to see his grasslands healthy and his crops grow. You need to for your livelihood. And healthy grasslands make better production off the land with your livestock and that's our living.

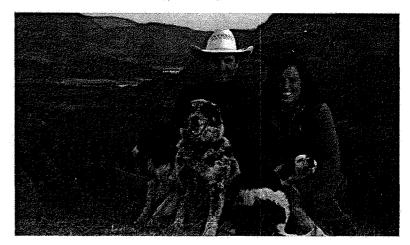
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- Exin: Ranching in this day and age, especially for a young couple like Ryan and I, is very difficult. It's hard to get into. It's hard to stay afloat. Because of this opportunity with The Nature Trust I think we stand a pretty good chance. Every day is a challenge. We're happy to face every day.
- Ryan: It's a great feeling to see what you've planted or you've built grow. That's probably the best part of it.

The Culligans plan to ranch here for at least the next 25 years and hope to pass the job onto their children. In the meantime, they'll work with The Nature Trust to preserve and protect the biodiversity of the Okanagan Valley.



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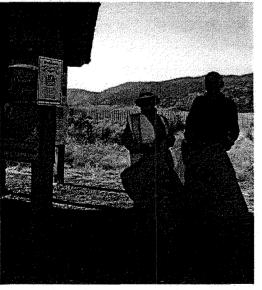

## **Our Business**

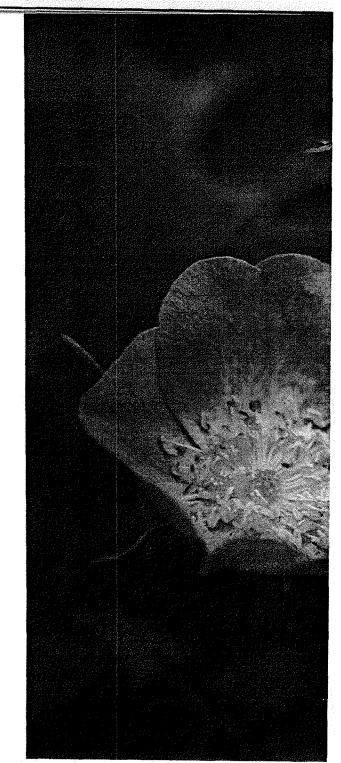

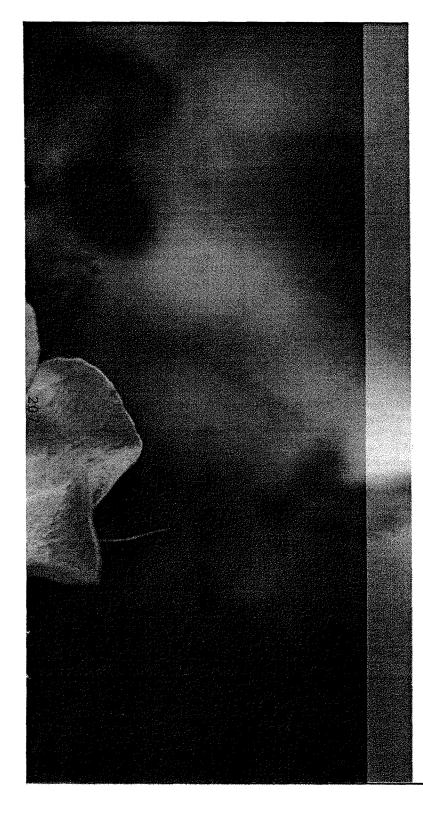

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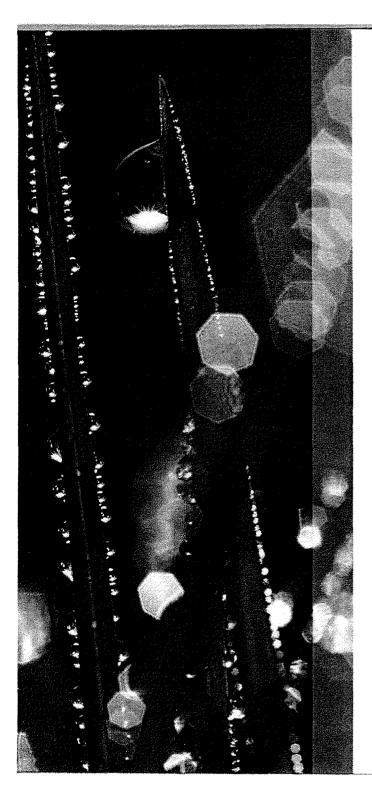
