



# EXHIBITIONS – THE CLAIM | Nathan & Cedric Bomford

# September 20, 2013 to January 11, 2014

A multi-media exhibition, in which installation, sculpture, photography, and found-objects contest ideas of land-use, private property, and local history. With influences including carpentry, Constructivism, and Conceptualism, and using new and re-purposed wood, the Bomford's creatively "stake a claim" with a large interactive installation assembled on the exterior deck of the Gallery on the VIU campus.

With *The Claim*, Nathan and Cedric Bomford continue their collaborative exploration of Vancouver Island's history and geography, through the creation of large-scale constructions. Using found and reused materials, the brothers build installations that in the past have featured rooms, enclosed open spaces, and viewing platforms, all connected through various passageways—*The Claim* takes the form of mine pit-head. These works appear only partially finished, with designs that look both improvised and open-ended. There is a consistent play on scale in these works—reproducing in miniature whole buildings that fill to capacity gallery spaces. The results are disorientating. These are interactive works that visitors enter, rather than stand back and observe. It is this physical motion, this passage through the art that is critical to uncovering meanings. The structures determine and pace our movements, direct our eyes, confuse our sense of scale, and highlight the role of space in social interactions and experiences. In presenting spaces in this way, the Bomfords expose the relations of power that lie just beneath the surface of everyday life, and yet which determine so much of its shape.

**Nathan Bomford** (b. 1977) is currently based in Shawnigan Lake, BC. He works mainly in photography and installation, and has exhibited in solo and group exhibitions in Germany and across Canada. Much of his recent work has been completed in collaboration with his brother Cedric Bomford and his father Jim Bomford. Nathan received an MFA from the University of Victoria (2006), a BFA with a major in photography from the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design (2003), and a DipVA from Camosun College (2001).

**Cedric Bomford** (b. 1975) currently teaches at the University of Manitoba's School of Art. His installation and photographic work has been exhibited internationally and he has participated in residencies in Europe, Asia, Australia and North America. His work often focuses on the power dynamics established by constructed spaces and takes the form of large-scale rambling improvisational architectural installations. The projects follow a methodology he calls 'thinking through building' in which construction takes on an emergent quality rather than an illustrative one. Concurrent to this installation work is a rigorous photographic practice that oscillates between research for and documentation of the installation works. Cedric holds an MFA from the Malmö Art Academy (2007) and a BFA from Emily Carr University (2003).

The VIU student exhibition *Provisionally Yours* was conceived in late 2012, as a companion project to the exhibition *The Claim* | *Nathan and Cedric Bomford*. In early January 2013, in the context of a second year sculpture course (Arts 285), students were given an exciting opportunity to create sculptural works and display them in dialogue with *The Claim*. Students were encouraged to make work in response to the practices and materials used by Cedric and Nathan Bomford.

Through a series of lectures, discussions, and material experiments, students gained a greater understanding of the milieu that the Bomford brothers work in and draw inspiration from. This exploration included a field trip to the Bomford's *Deadhead* project, under construction in a large temporary studio in Vancouver. In response to this field trip, students created a large-scale temporary site-specific sculpture in April 2013 on the exterior deck of the Gallery, the very site where the Bomford's work would be installed.

This type of experiential learning allowed students to find their own connection and entry point into Bomford's work. Students were cautioned not to simply make work like the Bomford's, but work of their own making that responded and dialogued with the broader themes Cedric and Nathan explore. Similar aesthetics and material relationships to the Bomford project arose organically for the students as they explored themes of: temporary architecture, construction, power structures in the built environment, and experimentation and play in fabrication processes.

The title *Provisionally Yours* refers the experience of the students working temporarily and intensely on this theme. By definition, this dialogue between the two exhibitions is a contingent, and temporary exploration. The title also references the ephemeral nature of the temporary structures the Bomford's draw inspiration from, and ultimately construct.

The experience of being a student is a kind of provisional experience as well, as it channels creative and critical energy in the temporary context of a given course, a chosen field of study, and a physical institutional space.

## Administration/Revenue

- ▶ Numbers/Revenue total #'s Oct and slightly down from last year by 4% but YTD is still up 10%.
- Cultural Services Annual Operating Grant no word yet.
- Joint MAP application We are applying with the Multicultural Society support for a MAP grant to assist with rental costs of the Pier 1 exhibit next summer. If successful, the \$15,000 rental will cost us \$2000 plus about \$1000 in promotion.
- City Council budget review meeting- this was very interesting and I was pleased to be invited by Richard Harding in case there were questions. Council reviewed each line of the budget, including Museum. There was no direct discussion around Museum line other than things we going well-everyone seemed satisfied to maintain.

> Permissive Tax Exemption - Ii have re applied for the old museum, we are exempt already in the new space.

# **Exhibit Programming**

- Permanent Exhibit Development is progressing well-still projecting a fall opening-people are looking forward to the Chinese artifacts and images being back on display.

# RE: CREATIVE CITY SUMMIT APPLICATION

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

That the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission recommends that Council support the Creative City Summit Application and commit \$10,000 and staff resources for the City of Nanaimo to host either the 2017 or 2018 Creative City Summit.

## PURPOSE:

To obtain support from Commission and Council for the City of Nanaimo to host the 2017 or 2018 Creative City Summit bid by committing \$10,000.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Creative City Network of Canada (CCNC) is a national non-profit organization that operates as a knowledge sharing, research, public education, and professional development resource in the field of local culture policy, planning and practice. The organization hosts an annual Summit for up to 250 delegates.

Staff, working with the Vancouver Island Conference Centre and Nanaimo Economic Development Corporation (Tourism Nanaimo), submitted a Letter of Intent to the Creative City Network of Canada indicating the City's desire to host the 2017 or 2018 Creative City Summit.

The CCNC has followed up with staff and invited the City of Nanaimo to submit a bid to host either the 2017 or 2018 Creative City Summit. Hosting the Creative City Summit puts the host municipality in the spotlight that year and raises the profile of your community across Canada by encouraging people to visit and experience the community's cultural resources. The Summit can also strengthen supports for culture within the community through bringing expertise in local cultural development to the community and shining a spotlight on local achievements.

The host city is responsible to organize and fund two core-programming elements: (1) host city welcome reception and (2) local study tours. The host city will also help with the logistical coordination and additional local activities for the delegates.

An integral part of the application is to secure a financial and in-kind commitment from the host municipality.

## STRATEGIC PLAN CONSIDERATIONS:

<u>Community Building Partnerships:</u> Staff are working with our community partners, Vancouver Island Conference Centre, Tourism Nanaimo and the Nanaimo Museum on the bid preparation. If Nanaimo is chosen to host the cultural community will be called upon to assist with building a successful summit and an outstanding experience for summit delegates.

Notes from the 2014 BC Summer Games Board meeting held on 2013-NOV-12 at the Country Grocer Community meeting room. Regular board meetings will be held on the first Tuesday of each month.

- All Directorates and Chairs are in place. These 150 volunteer positions will be busy working on the games from September 2013 to July 2014. They will also be looking for 3,500 additional volunteers to assist in implementing the various activities and events occurring before and during the games.
- The Nanaimo 2014 BC Summer Games Society has been formed. The mailing address of the society is Nanaimo 2014 BC Summer Games Society, PO Box 53, Stn A, Nanaimo, BC, V9R 5K4.
- There have been several changes to the sport venues as a result of the implementation of the School District #68 10 year Facilities Plan. School closures have resulted in seeking out alternative venues for some sports. Sport venue locations should be finalized soon.
- The Summer Games had secured Dufferin School as office space for the games. Unfortunately, Dufferin School seems to be in a state of disrepair and there is also some concern around security. As a result, the Board is looking for an alternative location.

- A Sport Chair meeting was held on 2013-NOV-02 at VIU. 150 provincial sport representatives and local sport chairs attended this meeting and site visit. Sport representatives toured sport venues and will bring back suggestions to the Summer Games board.
- Lori Barlow has been hired as the Operations Manager. She started the position on 2013-NOV-01. Lori comes to the games with a wealth of multi sport management experience.
- A key volunteer rally has been planned for 2013-NOV-19 at the Beban Park Social Centre. 150 Directors and Chairs will be attending the rally.

# RE: MONTHLY REPORT FOR OCTOBER 2013 - PARKS OPERATIONS

The following highlights are the park initiatives for October. Regular maintenance tasks are not listed.

## PARK PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT:

- The playground equipment and the Phase 1 improvements materials have been ordered for Harewood Centennial Park. Work is expected to begin in spring and summer 2014.
- Staff is moving ahead with the Beban Park Master Plan and designing options for improvements and site configuration. The first draft will be reviewed by the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission, stakeholders and the public this fall to receive further input.
- Design concepts for the updated Maffeo Sutton Park Plan are being developed. Biologists have recently inventoried the 30 year old lagoon to see how the saltwater lagoon is functioning.
- Background and site inventory work for the former Greater Nanaimo Water District land on Nanaimo Lakes Road is being drafted to facilitate future planning for the property.
- The Service and Resource Centre indoor art piece "Social Mixer" by Mark Ashby will be installed mid-November. The fabrication process has experienced some delays, but it is back on track.
- Calls for next year's outdoor art and banner projects have been tendered. Non-mandatory meetings were held to allow potential applicants a chance to learn more about the submissions and process.
- Several development applications have been reviewed by staff to acquire new parks and trails.

## PARKS AND OUTDOOR SPACES SPECIAL EVENTS:

- An online survey was created for the Summer Playground Program. This should be available to the public beginning of November and in the next e-newsletter.
- Shaw TV filmed a piece regarding the return of the Coho salmon to the Millstone River. Representatives from Shaw Cable, Vancouver Island University and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans participated in the TV spot.

- A Halloween walk through the woods was held for the first time at Beban Park. Attendance was strong with eight families registered for this program. Staff is looking at building upon the event next year.
- The Great Pumpkin Event took place at Neck Point Park. This event was sponsored by Nanaimo Dive Outfitters as a fundraising event for the Kidney Foundation. The City provided the onshore games and activities for those in the park. There were lots of families and dogs in the park giving us a great opportunity to promote our programs and dog offleash parks.

# **VOLUNTEERS IN PARKS:**

- Staff have been sharing information about Nanaimo's Volunteers in Parks (VIP) Program with the City of Parksville. Parksville is potentially interested in beginning a similar program.
- Start-up VIP meetings have been scheduled for 2013-NOV-24 at Hawthorne Park and Groveland Park.
- Fern Park area residents have expressed interest in the VIP program.
- The Hummingbird Public Art project is underway at Bayview School and Deverill Square Park. Art work will be installed in Deverill Square Park in mid November.
- Nanaimo Old City Centre residents hosted several fall events in Pawson Park. They are programming the park frequently as well as utilizing their new playground and community garden.
- Installation of playground equipment at Oceanview Park is complete. Site finishing will occur over the fall with seeding and the installation of benches.
- The sport court at Crystal Brook Park has now been completed. Basketball hoops and sod were installed in October.

## MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION:

- A new trophy cabinet was built and installed at the Nanaimo Ice Centre for the Nanaimo Buccaneers.
- New bookcases were built and installed in the relocated Seniors library at Bowen Complex.
- A new egress door was built for the Scout Hut at Comox Gyro Park.
- Many park signs were updated this month.

## PARKS UTILITY:

- The winter cover for the Bastion has been put on to protect the historic structure from the winter weather.
- Seasonal maintenance and winterizing of the irrigation systems continued this month.

## TURF AND PARKS:

- Sid Clark Gyro Park field was aerated and sand was top-dressed and dragged into empty holes. The process will help with soil exchange and ultimately help with drainage of the field.
- A number of our playgrounds were topped up with wood fibre chips.
- Grass cutting is finished for the season and leaf clean-up has started.

## TRAILS:

- A new bridge was installed at Pirates Park on Protection Island.
- Many missing signs were replaced at Linley Valley Park.
- A drainage ditch and pipe were installed to alleviate flooding in the pathway to Country Club Park 1.

## HORTICULTURE:

- 8,900 spring bulbs were planted throughout city gardens.
- Two new traffic medians have been planted on Wall Street.
- St. George Ravine Park is under renovation to open sightlines into and through the park. The Trails Crew assisted with removing a berm to improve sightlines.
- Fourteen arboriculture calls for service were received. Action resulting from the calls included sixteen removals, three issues resolved with pruning, one call no tree permit required for private removal, one call to monitor health in spring to determine removal and replant, and one call regarding a BC Hydro issue.

## **URBAN FORESTRY:**

• Review of the draft Tree Management and Protection Bylaw is underway. The Bylaw is set to go before Council shortly.

RE: MONTHLY REPORT – OCTOBER 2013 RECREATION AND CULTURE SERVICES

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT:

**Aquatics:** The Riptides hosted a successful short course swim meet on 2013-OCT-26 and 27, with over 500 competitors and spectators in attendance each day at the Nanaimo Aquatic Centre (NAC).

**Arenas:** Nanaimo Buccaneers moved into their new dressing room at the Nanaimo Ice Centre (NIC). NIC hosted the Ladies Harbour City Classic Hockey Tournament.

Beban Park Master Plan: The first draft has been completed and is under review.

**Bike to School Week:** This initiative was an offshoot of Bike to Work Week (BTWW), which is held in June, making it difficult for students to participate. It was hoped that staff at educational institutions would champion this within their workgroups, but for the second year in a row, participation was disappointing. Staff have decided next year to concentrate all their resources on the June BTWW and is applying for 2014 grants to assist with funding.

BC Summer Games: The next meeting will be held 2013-NOV-12.

**Community Events - Indoor:** Fall Home Show (three days), Bite of Nanaimo, Autism Society Expo, Senior Services Network Health Fair, Wine Tasting Festival, Serauxmen Club's Halloween Party, BMX Association Year End Banquet, Blood Donor Clinic (two days).

**Community Events -- Outdoor:** Kennel Club Obedience Trials (two days), Lions' Club Garage Sale, Harbour City Football Club annual photo shoot (two days), Weekly Farmers' Market, Haunted House (VIEX Barns) and Inflatable Halloween (Agriplex). Staff attended the annual Great Pumpkin event at Neck Point, sponsored by the Nanaimo Dive Outfitters, and provided onshore games and activities for families in attendance and promoted PRC programs and parks. The first ever Beban Park Family Halloween Walk through the woods at the Beban Participark was held. Eight families enjoyed an after dark walk full of age appropriate scary surprises.

**Fitness and Health:** Approximately three years ago, the Integrated Health Network (IHN) partnered with PRC to develop a "Learn to Exercise Again" program which introduced individuals with chronic health issues to a healthier lifestyle. Initially, IHN provided funding directly to PRC to manage the program. The program is now successfully established and the

IHN have changed service model to a facility rental and they manage the program themselves. IHN staff feels the rental model is more sustainable, services more clients, and encourages clients to continue to work toward their fitness goals.

**International Day of the Girl:** This event was held at Fairview School with staff providing information about PRC program opportunities to over 50 girls in attendance.

**Meetings/Training/Professional Development:** Staff hosted the North Island Children and Youth Programmers meeting at OWCC on 2013-OCT-22. Staff from six communities met to discuss program promotion ideas, program trends and to network. Staff met with the Vice President of Learning Services for SD68 to discuss program ideas for children with special needs. She will be a good resource for finding new program instructors.

#### PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS:

Nanaimo Harbour City Seniors (NHCS) Thursday Special Event hosted an average of 94 seniors each Thursday in October. A Welcome Tea was attend by 15 new NHCS members. Over 50 members participated in a Crime Forum put on by the RCMP. Topics included fraud, and scams, including; telephone, lottery, banking, online, and dating/romance scams, as well as personal safety including; at home, while out in the community, and traveling. The Kidney Foundation did a presentation to 20 seniors in the Bowen Clubhouse, followed by a question and answer period. Topics included: What is kidney disease, how does it affect the body, the symptoms, what we can do to prevent or slow down the progression of the disease, and the role of the Kidney Foundation of Canada.

There are 21 Leaders in Training (LIT) and 10 Quest registered for the fall/winter session. The program started in early October. Participants have completed their orientations and signed up for placements. Some of them began their volunteer placements as early as late October.




