# STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

# PURPOSE:

To update the Cultural Committee on the Cultural Grants Review Process.

## BACKGROUND:

Further to the discussion at the Cultural Committee meeting held 2013-MAR-06, a grant review subcommittee met to discuss potential changes to the granting process. Following this, Staff met with Melinda Mollineaux on 2013-JUL-12. Melinda has been a member of the Canada Council for the Arts Grant Review Committee. Melinda provided some comments and suggestions for consideration. Based on this feedback, some suggested changes to the grant forms have been made. These changes were approved by the Cultural Committee on 2013-SEP-04.

The grant review subcommittee met following the September meeting to confirm the process. At that time, it was determined to proceed with an external review of the grant process and a project scope of work was finalized.

Staff met with two potential service providers with Melinda Mollineaux selected to lead the process.

# DISCUSSION:

Staff procured the services of Melinda Mollineaux to conduct the Cultural Grants Process Review beginning in November 2013 with a final report to be delivered mid-February, 2014.

As an arts funding program officer with over thirteen years experience in the management and review of national arts funding programs at the Canada Council for the Arts, Melinda brings relevant expertise and a solid foundation in public funding, strategic planning and cultural policy management. She has created and launched an international residencies program that spans five

countries; participated in the review, national consultations and launch of a major program of support for independent visual artists as well as a national Capacity Building program for arts organizations across all disciplines. Melinda has an excellent understanding of arts funding program policies and their relationship to organizational strategic objectives.

Currently, Melinda is an MBA candidate at Vancouver Island University in the completion stage of her studies. During her tenure in Nanaimo, Melinda has become familiar and engaged with the arts and business communities and has a good understanding of the local context.

Melinda will conduct an independent review of the City's cultural funding programs to align them with the new Cultural Plan and the City's stated strategic goals. Furthermore, streamlined and transparent assessment criteria and evaluation processes will be proposed. A final consultation step with key community stakeholders will facilitate feedback and a smooth transition to the launch of the renewed program. Recommendations for the renewed program will advance the impact of the City's investment in the arts and cultural sector; provide built-in mechanisms for accountability and articulate performance measures for future program evaluation.

# STRATEGIC PLAN CONSIDERATIONS:

<u>Taking Responsibility:</u> Ensure that the cultural grants review process is in accordance with any provincial or municipal governance policies, structures and processes and that the process for allocating funds are fair, equitable and based on sound assessment criteria and grant review process.

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# Canada Day 2013 - Grant Summary

The Canada Day event went as planned, even though it was the warmest day of the summer. The crowds seemed to find shade and enjoyed watching the celebration of flags and opening ceremonies. Our entertainment was excellent and well received by the crowd. We had more interactive booths than in previous years and were surprised by the number of people calling a few days before the event wanting to place a food cart in the park. Our interactive booths provide free activities for families to enjoy.

Back this year was activity demonstrations by community groups including; Miss Nanaimo Welcome Centre, Taoist Tai Chi Nanaimo, Arts Alive, Chinese Professional Women Association of Vancouver Island, Council of Canadians, CJ Martial Arts, RCMP Community Policing, Nanaimo Astronomy, World Tae Kwon Do, Nanaimo Organization of the Vision impaired, Steve Marshall Ford, Team Water Smart (RDN), Central Vancouver Island Multicultural Society, The Nanaimo Fire Department, Nanaimo Recycling Exchange, Nanaimo Canoe and Kayak Club, Pacific Sport, African Heritage Society, Chinese Cultural Society, The Parks, Recreation and Culture Fun Zone, Nanaimo Downtown Farmers Group, Bouncy Castle and Giant Slide, Nanaimo Science and Sustainability Society.

Promotional initiatives – We created a photo shoot for the local free press. The photo shoot and article outlining the day's events were placed into the paper 2 days prior to Canada Day. The City of Nanaimo's marketing department created a poster which was distributed to local shops, malls and libraries. A smaller version of the poster was posted to the City of Nanaimo web site and Harbour City Living electronic newsletter. The committee received sponsorship from The Wave & Wolf radio stations. Several ads ran on both stations leading up to the event and The Wave was on site on July 1<sup>st</sup>.

Challenges encountered – Our event offers a variety of free activities for families. We work closely with city staff to secure the park and equipment as well as the services of their youth leadership program known as LIT and Quest. We had 60 volunteers assisting us with everything from event set up, crafts, face painting garbage pickup and clean up. We could not operate this event without the volume of volunteers supplied to us.

The format for the day appears to work well. Spectators enjoy the variety from opening ceremonies, musical acts, roving entertainment, free interactive booths and multi cultural food kiosks. The cost to operate the event remains our largest challenge.

## TheatreOne: Final Report to the Cultural Committee on the 2012-2013 Season

TheatreOne was awarded \$28,000 from the City of Nanaimo Cultural Grant Fund for the 2012-2013 season. This grant was used for the following programs:

# MAINSTAGE: 29th Season

TheatreOne was delighted to present "Ride the Cyclone" in April 2013. With a cast of of 12 it was the largest show that we have presented since our early days in the 80's of presenting Shakespearian works. Written by Jacob Richmond with help from Brooke Maxwell (Music) and Treena Stubel (Choreography), Ride the Cyclone features six young choir members from Uranium, Saskatchewan who perish while on an amusement park ride. A strange fortune-telling machine named Karnak offers a chance to return to life, but only for the one of the six who is most deserving. The nation-wide tour included Theatre Pass Muraille (Toronto), Manitoba Theatre Centre (Winnipeg), Citadel Theatre (Edmonton), Persephone Theatre (Saskatoon), The Arts Club (Vancouver) AND TheatreOne (Nanaimo). The show was a hit with Nanaimo audiences and we were very proud to be working alongside some of the biggest theatre companies nation-wide to bring the talents of this young and talented Victoria cast to the forefront of Canadian theatre.

## **EMERGING VOICES: 7th Season**

Emerging Voices: November 28, 29, & 30<sup>th</sup>, 2013 The Ginger Goodwin Story by Michael Stephen.

The play is about a coal miner, pacifist and hero of the BC labour movement, killed by Dominion Police near Cumberland as he fled from Conscription in 1918. After a very intensive and successful development workshop for three days, we held a public reading of the (almost complete) first draft of The Ginger Goodwin Story at The Nanaimo Museum. We are very grateful to The Vancouver Foundation for financial support; and to the Nanaimo Museum for the use of their program room. The process was intense, and the five professional actors involved (Adrian Hough,

Russell Kilde, Jessica Lowry, Joelle Rabu, and Matthew Walker) worked very hard, contributing many helpful insights to Michael's developing script. On board as an intern was Nanaimo film-maker, Jeanette de Santis, who has followed the Emerging Voices process for a few years now. There were at least 60 people who attended the public reading on Friday evening, and many stayed to give feedback. All in all, we felt the workshop, and development process has been very successful resulting in the achievement of a viable first draft which will help Michael set a course for the future of this play. This is our second workshop of the piece based on the story of Albert "Ginger" Goodwin.

## Playwright Michael Stephen's email:

I'm just home and settling in so I'm not quite ready to respond to everything that happened the last few days in detail, but I do want to say how enormously grateful I am to you not only for your faith in the project, your wonderful management of the process, and your support to myself personally. This experience has been something of a lifechanger for me! I'll email you some thoughts about the project soon, but I think I need a few days to recuperate and consider where to go next.

# EMERGING VOICES: January 16<sup>th</sup>, 2013 Flow\_by Robert Garfat.

In the play, artistic inspiration, integrity and the balance between commerce and art are examined by a painter as she creates work for her career-capping international show. The play is a complex piece, the process was intense, and all involved (Norma Bowen, Catherine Caines, Adrian Hough, and Paul Tedeschini as cast, and Jessica Lowry as assistant director) contributed many suggestions and insights in response to Robert's intriguing script. Nanaimo film-maker, Jeanette de Santis, was again on board for the day. There were about 40 people who attended the reading almost all of whom stayed to give feedback. It was a very fruitful workshop for Robert who has expressed his gratitude for the opportunity. Here's a bit of what Robert had to say after the workshop in a couple of emails he sent: "The notes are wonderful, much food for thought. I find that I am turning over in my mind much of the input I received, both from the audience, yourself and the actors. Thanks again for this wonderful program and for inviting me to participate. # EMERGING VOICES: February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2013 I Have Seen Beautiful Jim Key by Janet Munsil.

In the early years of the 20th century, William "Doc" Key taught his horse, Beautiful Jim Key, to read, write, and calculate. They quickly rose to fame and Jim Key became the poster-horse for the earliest days of the humane and literacy movements. Millions of schoolchildren signed the Jim Key Pledge, promising always to be kind to animals, and the equine wonder became an inspiring role-model for children learning their letters and numbers. It was a pleasure to welcome Janet to Emerging Voices for the first time. Janet is the Artistic Director of Intrepid Theatre in Victoria, producers of the Victoria Fringe Festival and the UNO Festival, and a recognized dramaturge and playwright. Her adaptation of Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* will be staged by Theatre Calgary and the National Arts Centre this fall. This was a lovely piece to work on for our last EV of the season; the play was very often a riff on the theme of learning, and relationships between people and each other, and with animals, and how much good the simple tenets of Patience and Kindness could bring to the world. Equity actors, Jessica Lowry and Samantha Currie did a great job of the reading, and Nicolle Nattrass as assistant director, offered some valuable insight to the process. Nanaimo film-

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maker, Jeanette de Santis, was also sitting in for the day. About 30 people attended the reading and all of them stayed to give feedback. Janet Munsil has been working on the piece for a number of years, and had this to say: "Thanks for the great day with Doc and Jim yesterday, I really appreciate the work and commitment you, Sam and Jess gave the script, (and the respect you gave my crazy line breaks!) I thought it was really useful and the feedback encouraged me to get this project rolling at last. Thanks so much for inviting me and for all the work you've put into Theatre One..."

# JUST KIDDING CHILDREN'S ENTERTAINMENT SERIES: 19th Season

On November 17, 2012 TheatreOne presented the Vancouver Opera's Production of Naomi's Road Composed by Ramona Luengen, Libretto by Ann Hodges and based on the novel Naomi's Road by Joy Kogawa, Naomi's Road, detailed a young Japanese-Canadian girl's experiences as her family is interned during World War 11. The story is, at the same time, compelling, emotional and instructive; it is taken from one of our country's most painful and complex social periods, a time that for many years was not discussed in our schools. This touching, instructive opera, set during World War II told the dramatic story of nine-year old Naomi's journey, with her Japanese Canadian family, from Vancouver to an internment camp in the interior of B.C.

TheatreOne continued the series on February 2<sup>nd</sup> with Rick Scott's *The Great Gazzoon*. The Great Gazzoon was cowritten, produced and adapted for sound recording by his longtime partner Valley Hennell. The 4 CD music audio novel was recorded and mixed in 2010-11 in their home on Protection Island. The cast of 25 actors, singers and musicians includes veterans singer/actors Joelle Rabu, Saffron Henderson and John Payne; renowned blues guitarist David Essig; Doug Edwards of CHILLIWACK on guitar and bass; Nico Rhodes on horns and piano; and human beatbox Kyle Shepard. As always, when we present Rick Scott, the show sold out and the children were dancing in the aisles! Email from a patron after the show:

I have just dropped your name in my email to the Canada Council for the Arts. FYI:

Having just seen Rick Scott's amazing 'The Great Gazoon' and having purchased the CD production, I noted the role The Canada Council for the Arts has played in making this wonderful experience possible. It was a joy to see how Rick connects to children, returning them to their land of pretend and sounds and carefree expression (We 70 years-old folk loved the trip as well). Rick noted to us in the audience how important the Canada Council and Theatre One in Nanaimo is as it brings us "live" productions. I thank you both for the work you have done here.

The last show in our Just Kidding series was **Erewhon Theatre's** production of **The Velveteen Rabbit**. The beautiful tale by Margery Williams is a modern children's classic, in which a stuffed toy rabbit learns what it means to be REAL. This presentation, with its lovely masks, puppets and props was an excellent introduction to the world of theatre. **Ten** children played the parts of toys in the show. They were pre-selected and rehearsed their roles during the half hour before the performance began. They were delightful!

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# FRINGE FLICKS: 14th Season

Fringe Flicks continues to enthrall our Nanaimo/Lantzville/Gabriola/Parksville/Qualicum Beach/Ladysmith audience. We have a loyal audience base of over 6000 patrons annually and presented 10 films with four screenings each in 12/13.

#### **FUNDRAISING:**

This past season has found the Board of Directors working very hard at fundraising for TheatreOne, to much success. Along with the ever popular Bite of Nanaimo presented in October we also presented "Christmas Wonderland FEATURING THE TIDESMEN BARBERSHOP CHORUS and their quartets, with special guests Joëlle Rabu and Shine. Joining the forces of music and theatre, Christmas Wonderland was an evening of powerful voices joining to celebrate the beauty of the season. The show was presented in Nanaimo & Parksville. Ending off the season this year, TheatreOne partnered with the Rotary Club North to present "Same Time Next Year" directed by Board member Leonie Gardner. This event was truly a Board fundraiser with the Board taking on all the aspects of producing and presenting a play.

#### SUMMARY:

We are very pleased with all of our results this year and look forward to our 13/14 season in which we will present 3 Mainstage shows! This will be the first time since the 1999/2000 season that we will have presented 3 Mainstage shows. The end of our 12/13 season saw the retirement of Gary Davey, our Artistic Director. We are grateful for Garry's commitment to the company over many years. We welcome David Mann, our new Artistic Director. David comes to us from Vancouver where he is also the Program Manager at the Evergreen Cultural Centre. David brings with him 40 years of experience in professional theatre and was also our Artistic Director from 2000-2004. He is very connected to the community and we are delighted to have him return!

TheatreOne is pleased to inform the Cultural Committee that we have ended the 12/13 season with a surplus of \$10,167.93.

1. Question - Did you think there was sufficient publicity for the event (i.e. posters, radio, display ads, etc.).

This year we brought in junior and juvenile top competitors (as seen on Dancing with the Stars TV shows) to appeal to the younger members of the audience. The only unforeseen problem was the unexpected cancelations of many of our overseas championship level competitors.
- 5. Question STAFF/VOLUNTEERS How many staff and/or volunteers were used to make your event successful? Did you have enough?
  - Answer Our event is only requires two or three City Staff workers but requires 55 60 NBDS volunteer participants. Due to the complexity of our set up most of the duties are carried out by Society members. In total over 5000 volunteer hours are required for the event including 300 400 volunteer hours each by Vicki Linfitt and Nelson Wong.
- 6. Question FUNDS Were there sufficient funds? If not, in what area were funds lacking and by how much?
  - Answer Yes there were sufficient funds this year resulting in a cash surplus of \$ 2,335 due to the last minute cancellations of guest dancers (reducing the cost of competitor support). If we had not had these savings our revenues and expenses would have been about the same. The grant from the City to reduce venue costs and provide competitor support is very important to us.
  - Surplus funds are invested by NBDS and provide liquidity to future IFB operating budgets, to pay for competitor support to local dancers and to invest in equipment to enhance both future competitions and social dancing in Nanaimo.
  - These retained earnings would also be employed in the event of losses to Nanaimo Ballroom Dance Society that resulted from an unexpected cancellation of the event (for example Loss of Venue or cancellation of ferry service from the Mainland).
- 7. Question FACILITY Was the facility appropriate for the event? If not, what were the problems? If your event was held on City property do you have any recommendations to improve that area for special events?
  - Answer The facility is very appropriate to host a Ballroom Dance Competition. The presence of large washrooms containing many cubicles is extremely important to the competitors and audience.

Each year we notice the chairs are worn and some are in need of repair. The chair backs often come loose during the event and the sharp ends of screws do cause a hazard

We also still had some issues with the heat in the practice rooms 19 – 21. Not being able to have staff adjust heating and air conditioning as needed continues to be a challenge to overcome.

8. Question - SERVICES - Were the services provided by Parks & Recreation, Public Works, Police, Fire, and any other City Department adequate? If not, how could they be improved?

Answer – The services provided by Parks & Recreation are generally adequate. A major challenge is to create the most advantageous air flow in the building. This does require assistance from the appropriate City staff members and each year must be arranged prior to the event.

#### 9. Question - EVENT STRENGTHS/WEAKNESSES

Answer - Strengths - The IFB is a very prestigious event that enhances the Cultural Climate in Nanaimo. It is an internationally acknowledged DanceSport Ballroom Dance Competition and is one of only a handful of Canadian Ballroom dance competitions. Our event hosts the Provincial Championships and every year attracts one or more international Champions and some of the top Canadian dancers.

However our event doesn't just cater to world class competitors it also provides many events for juvenile youth, adult and senior participants and allows beginning dancers to experience competition without travelling to the Mainland. It also allows the people of Vancouver Island an opportunity to view some of the best Ballroom Dancers in the World.

Answer – Weaknesses – Viewing the competition from the second and third row tables is only allows limited viewing of the entire floor. More risers seating would solve the viewing problem and also allow more seats. One identifiable weakness continues to be overhead lighting in the Auditorium.

We also have the ongoing problem of overcoming the misconception that we are a senior's only dance competition.

- 10. Question FUTURE Please out line your plans for continuing your event next year and beyond.
  Answer The planning is already well underway for the 2014 Island Fantasy Ball. We expect this event to continue into the future as long as Nanaimo Ballroom Dance Society has the volunteers and the financial resources to make this possible and a suitable venue with a Dance Sport BC approved floor is available...

# CRIMSON COAST DANCE SOCIETY - EVENT GRANT 2013 - REPORT

The original intention was to present our four day InFrinGinG DanceFestival on dates and venues shared with Nanaimo Dragon Boat Festival ("Dancing in the Belly of the Dragon"), followed by a number of InFrinGinG Increments in August and September, as part of the Fringetastic Festival and Gabriola Poetry festival respectively. Because of the reduced amount of grant funding which was available, we were unable to proceed with the InFrinGinG Increments slated for September. However, with some minor adjustments from artists availability and to enable us to proceed within the available funds, the other elements of the Festival went ahead as planned.

# 13<sup>th</sup> Annual InFrinGinG Festival

**July 4 to 8 – DANCING IN THE BELLY OF THE DRAGON** in partnership with Nanaimo Dragon Boat Festival.

We presented our proposed programming and added an indoor show: *VooDoo Dave and Friends* in a celebration of African and Gypsy Dance. We were also able to produce three, rather than one, ticketed events. Crimson Coast Dance Society's InFrinGinG Dance Festival was the only programming taking place on the two outdoor stages over this shared weekend.

This experiment proved to be a soaring success with rave reviews from the Dragon Boat Society as well as our artists and most importantly our community. The cultural dance genres we presented were the perfect choice for outdoor daylight shows.

Dragon Boat Festival Society learned the demands of dance presentation and the joy of audience members in the witnessing of it. We learned the difference in coming to agreements with professional companies vs. volunteer (which Dragon Boast Society is) and what that requires of us in the future as regards planning stages and authority for 'final say' in agreements. Though we both experienced bumps from misunderstandings, our professional crew acted quickly and any issues were not noticed by the public.

We were particularly thrilled to run our classes and Audience to Artist public dialogues from the main stage. This worked surprisingly well with the one lesson learned that, in Nanaimo, there is an expectation that events in our parks 'should be' free. Suggestions to pay for classes as audience stepped onto stage resulted in people frozen in motion and a wall of silence. It was immediately clear at the first workshop that we must ask for donations and invite anyone and everyone to participate.

Holding these two iconic Nanaimo festivals in a shared space and time was a fantastic partnership where the sharing of resources and effort was notable and produced an experience far beyond expectation for those wandering into the park for either InFrinGinG Dance Festival or The Dragon Boat Festival. We look forward to developing our relationship with Dragon Boat Society in Nanaimo.

These shows and Audience to Artist interactions were deeply touching. Unfortunately, the performance dates offered, a Monday night, and a 9pm show on the last night of the Fringe, affected our attendance.

We are pleased with the calibre of performances overall in both festivals. Fringetastic learned the requirements for the production of dance performances and the importance of discussing shortfalls or limitations in advance. They will be in a much better position to make decisions regarding producing dance or informing artists and collaborators in the future.

#### IMPACT

## on dance as an art form,

Our partnership with these two groups offered opportunities to share the protocol and requirements of presenting dance. Both organizations have a greater capacity to program dance should they choose, in a way that is satisfying and safe for the artists.

As a result of our partnerships, a broader audience was exposed to dance and had the opportunity to enjoy it as an audience as well as personally with our onstage classes or dialogues. The sheer number of audience and participants at Dragon Boat offers Crimson Coast Dance Society the possibility of an accidental audience turned ticket buyers. As our new season approaches we will watch for this impact result.

# on the art practice,

Artists had an opportunity to share their cultures deeply. Whether they presented historical, traditional, cultural dance as at *InFrinGinG Dance Festival* or their contemporary expression of their cultural heritage as at *InFrinGinG Increments*, an opportunity delve more deeply in discussion and experimentation through teaching took place alongside an opportunity to present particular dance genre to Nanaimo audiences for the very first time.

We also enjoyed presenting local artist, Genvieve Johnson in her Butoh dance, not only for its excellence and her articulate post show dialogue, also to stimulate a sense of pride and place in Nanaimo for the artists who live here.

# on CCDS and participating artists

We believe that we shared important insights into best practices for negotiating and for presenting dance with two local organizations who have not presented it in the past, yet who could benefit by the choice to do so in the future. They are aware that we are happy to be a resource, and are knowledgeable. Tremendous goodwill resulted between us and our partner organizations from our handling of these relationships, from our professionalism with regard to the technical components of dance presenting and crew and most importantly from the very successful results of a very enthusiastic and satisfied audience. This last benefit is directly related to the calibre of artist and programming.

In the short term our audiences and partner organizations benefited from the experience and recognized the benefit. In the long term, we have introduced the specialized requirements and respect for dance presenting and we have built partnership which will work in our favour and may include repeat partnerships.

# on public impact and dissemination.

This first venture working alongside other established Nanaimo Festivals presented us with opportunities to place dance as an art form before community members and visitors who might otherwise not have participated as audience members at our events. Particularly in the case of the July events at the Dragon Boat Festival, the performances at the main Festival venue in Maffeo Sutton Park created a lot of interest. We found audience members waiting for our shows to begin and participating from the beginning of the day to the end.

As a result of this and the other lessons learned in our co-operation with the Dragon Boat Festival, we are planning to repeat a similar format in 2014, and build on the successes from our 2013 Festival.



# Arts and Culture Sector

To ensure a successful event, a **Festival Sub-Committee** was formed, which was comprised of eight volunteers who met on a regular basis the several months before this event.



# **MEDIA COVERAGE 2013**

The kick-off to our campaign started with a press release distributed to all of the Francophone Associations in British Columbia, all of our members as well as our community partners. This included an initial post on the **Facebook Group Page** for the Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable. http://www.facebook.com/groups/15644317138/).

Three hundred and fifty copies of the **2013 Festival poster** were hand-delivered to Vancouver Island communities from Victoria to Campbell River and to all Francophone/French immersion schools in the Greater Nanaimo region. The poster was displayed in local grocery stores, shopping centres, and coffee shops, as well as in local recreational facilities.

We accessed free community announcement media to promote the Festival:

HarbourLiving.ca, www.eventful.com, Radio-Canada C-B Yukon (television), CHEK TV on Vancouver Island, Société radio communautaire de Victoria, and CHLY. Interviews were broadcast by Shaw TV Central Vancouver Island, The Wave, The Beach, and the Nanaimo Daily News.

Through the generous sponsorship of the *Nanaimo Daily News*, we published our **Festival Souvenir Program**, which was distributed to more than 33,000 households throughout Vancouver Island.

The Festival purchased several advertisements in the *Nanaimo Daily News*, half-page ads were published January 17<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>, several eighth-page ads January 21<sup>st</sup>, 26<sup>th</sup>, February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 14<sup>th</sup>, two ads in the *Harbour City Star* February 8<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>, as well as 4 additional ads in the Nanaimo Bulletin February 7<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>.

Throughout the month of February, the Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable was highlighted on the front page of Whats on Digest with an article that continued inside the publication.

Our Festival sponsors and community partners were acknowledged in a post-Festival quarter-page advertisement in the **Nanaimo News Bulletin in March** 2013.

Island Radio - our Anglophone radio sponsor, enthusiastically broadcasted promos of the Festival on *The Wave*, *The Wolf*, *The Beach* and *The Lounge*. Each radio station promoted the Festival on its Community Calendar and website. *The Wave* and *The Wolf* repeated one live-liner multiple times per day on from February 4<sup>th</sup> to the 15<sup>th</sup>, Six live-liners per day were presented from February 4<sup>th</sup> through the 6<sup>th</sup>, February 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> each station presented 8 per day. Daily contests, giving listeners the opportunity to win tickets to the Festival, took place from February 7<sup>th</sup> to the 14<sup>th</sup>. *The Beach* and *The Lounge* broadcasted thirty live-liners from February 4<sup>th</sup> to the 16<sup>th</sup>, three daily promos were also broadcasted on these dates. Deejays from *The Beach* and *The Lounge* also interviewed the Festival's Communications Coordinator about the event and Francophone Culture on Vancouver Island.

CHEK NEWS developed a 30-second commercial about the Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable. This spot aired for 30 days prior to the event. A week-long listing on the *What's In Store* calendar with Gordie Tupper promoted the 2013 Festival. A news clip about the Festival was broadcasted during the Festival.







"Radio-Canada" - Our Francophone radio sponsor, produced and diffused a 15 second radio commercial as well as the production and broadcasting of a 30 second television commercial released January 25<sup>th</sup> through February 15<sup>th</sup>. Daily contests were held to give listeners the chance to win tickets to the Festival. Radio Canada joined us at the Festival this year with a Kiosk in our community market.

The 2013 Festival was promoted in the following tourist publication and website: *Van Dop Arts and Cultural Guide to British Columbia* and <u>www.art-bc.com</u>

Three 4' x 8' signs were strategically placed on the Ministry Highways at key intersections in Nanaimo.

New this year, L'Association des francophones de Nanaimo held a kiosk at Woodgrove Centre to promote the Festival.

For 2 weeks from February 4<sup>th</sup> to the 17<sup>th</sup> an announcement was published in our local publication of Coffee News.
