  - A) The annual fair held the third weekend of August at Beban Park.
  - B) Annual 3-day Watchtower convention held at Beban Park. his is a family oriented Christian gathering. 3,000 in attendance.
  - C) Equestrian and Dog events are held on the Equestrian grounds which is our leased portion of Beban Park.
  - D) Beban Park, VIEX grounds, or NEA grounds.
  - E) We host a 3 (now 4) day dog show on the Fathers Day weekend each year. It is for conformation and obedience. People bring 1-10 dogs to show for the event.

The animals cannot be left unattended in unlocked stalls. The Park is not completely fenced and it would be potentially disastrous if animals were deliberately released or escaped from their stalls. Conversely, stalls cannot be locked or left unattended in the event of a fire or other form of vandalism. The concerns about vandalism and theft extend to the expensive tack and riding/driving equipment that is used in shows. If camping is eliminated, out of town participants simply will not come.
  - D) Que to multiple dog entries often the preferred option, not practical to camp at campsite, would need to leave 5 or 530 am, which disrupts other campers at commercial sites.
  - E) Yes! While campsites have expressed desire to have business there are not many that wish the dog volume/noise. The show is outdoors gives more shelter! Animal events cannot be compared to regular camping situations.

Although we do provide 'paid' hourly security, all vendors insist on staying on site with their trailers and due to the early morning starts and 12-16 hour

days, it is more convenient for track officials and less costly for out of town volunteers to stay on-site.

   We use to charge \$20. This year \$25 - for power only - we believe this is fair. - Anything above would start to harm our entry counts. Four years ago we moved to Brannen Lake Campsite due to a data conflict. While Brannen Lake did their best it was not a good fit! We unique campers - similar to VIEX horse events! F) \*\*Note: Our club absorbs this cost for our volunteers. 9. Are there any changes to the Overnight Camping Policy you would recommend? A) That it be limited to special events only. B) No. C) Eliminate any in-animal related camping. Include the ability to offer power within the limits of the existing infrastructure. This may increase our ability to host events in the cooler months if participants have the ability to heat their campers. E) Please continue it! Decrease the cost – we will lose money at present! No. 10. For Beban Park events only, would you be in favour of all camping being confined to a


- A) If camping is taken away from our special event it will have a serious financial impact on us.
- B) Thank you for including us in your discussion.
- C) Participants in our events are not camping for recreation. They are camping to be able to care for and protect their animals and equipment. Eliminating camping on the grounds will negatively affect our ability to host even a one day event as often out of town participants come the night before to be ready for an early start or to accommodate ferry schedules. There are no commercial facilities available to replace on site camping and it is neither practical nor possible to billed out 30 40 horses. Other City's allow camping on their city owned Equestrian grounds during Equestrian events. (Courtenay, Port Alberni, Sooke).

D) No reply.

E) JR handling finals – This year we have the entire Province IR obedience show handling finals. Being able to camp makes this more inclusive for all the kids and their pooches.

Power is a huge issue for us, and while I always mought this was because of grooming and comfort, this year it became apparent we have a new issue. Six campers were travelling with nighttime Nasal CPAP machines! These are medically prescribed and need power!

\* NKC has a concern re: areas that should be paid to the city n the past we paid \$ only VIEX for any rigs behind the barns in VIEX or horse areas \* we also have to pay VIEX \$5/night per rig for VIEX power. The city is really only providing LAND if we have to pay city and VIEX the cost becomes too HIGH!

Actual numbers yet to be confirmed.

Economic Impact is determined by using the Canada Sport Tourism Assessment Model (STEAM) economic calculator. Data is based on either projected numbers provided at the beginning of the grant application process or on final event evaluation numbers. Grant recipients have 60 days to submit their evaluations.

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

That the Recreation Committee recommends that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission:

1. approve the revised Parks, Recreation and Culture Overnight Camping in the Parks Policy, Schedule B, as attached; and,

2. approve a 25% per night camping fee increase in 2013 and a further 5% increase in each subsequent year until 2016 as follows:

### **PURPOSE**:

To review and update the Camping in the Parks Policy first established in 1999 and amended in 2000, as per community feedback received throughout the summer and fall of 2012.

### BACKGROUND:

At the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission meeting held on 2012-JUN-27, Staff recommended that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission refer the issue of Overnight Camping in the parks to the Recreation Committee for review and report back with recommendations for updating.

### **DISCUSSION:**

The City has received community feedback expressing concern over camping being allowed at City parks while participating in special events. It has been requested that the City of Nanaimo discontinue overnight camping as it results in a potential loss of clientele and revenue for local campground operators and gives the campers a poor impression of Nanaimo. The one noted exception is those events involving large animals.

In 2012, fourteen events received approval for camping in City Parks. This number is slightly higher than an average year due to several provincial and regional events that rotate communities and were awarded to Nanaimo in 2012. All but one of these fourteen events was held at Beban Park. The number of campers at these events ranged from 0 to 70 units with an average of 20 per night. A survey of the organizations (Schedule A, as attached) that have been permitted camping under the existing policy shows that;

- Percentage of participants camping at events involving large/farm animals ranges from 25-95%.
- Percentage of participants camping at events involving dogs ranges from 5-50%.
- Percentage of participants camping at events where no animals are involved ranges from 3-5%.
- The majority of campers who opt to camp in the park do so for convenience and proximity to the event. The camping fee is a minor factor.
- Dog show participants can be travelling with up to 10 dogs and while dogs are allowed at most campsites those with multiple dogs can cause disruption to other campers due to the extra space required, noise and early starts to the day.
- The majority of campers who opt to camp in the park would no longer participate in the event if camping ceased to be an option. A few would opt to camp elsewhere or stav in a hotel or motel.
- The majority of campers who opt to camp in the park would be prepared to pay a camping fee of \$20-\$29 per night. (A survey of local campsites shows camping fees for no service sites ranges from \$25-31 per night however this fee would include washrooms, picnic tables and other basic camping amenities.)

Based on the survey results and 2012 event camping statistics it is apparent that discontinuing camping could have a significant negative impact on events involving animals. It would also impact those events not involving animals but to a lesser degree. Any impact on the success of an event has a subsequent impact on local tourism. For this reason it is recommended that the option for overnight camping be maintained but that the criteria as to when camping will be allowed be clarified. Further, that the conditions of camping be identified in the policy.

It is further recommended that camping fees be increased by 25% in 2013 and an additional 5% per year until 2016, to be more competitive with commercial camping rates. This would take the fees from \$20 per night to \$25 in 2013, \$26.25 in 2014, \$27.50 in 2015 and \$28.75 in 2016.

The proposed policy would require 100% of these fees to be remitted to the City whereas in the past Licence holders at Beban Park have retained the fees collected for camping on their licenced property. This practice has resulted in poor controls and record keeping.

This revised Camping in the Park Policy would revoke any historical privileges individual groups or events have had to camping and would require every organization to make a separate application for each event to be considered on its own merit.

Nanaimo is an agriculture city and this is a unique facility within the city! We value this we need to keep up family oriented animal events within the city! F) Security.
- 6. Is it necessary for participants at your event(s) to have the option to camp and, if so, why?
  - A) For the protection of property and animals. To provide security.
  - B) See #5. Some with health issues appreciate being close to the facility.
  - C) In addition to Participants needing to be close to their animals to care for them, the Park is not secured at night and has had problems with vandalism in the past. The animals cannot be left unattended in unlocked stalls. The Park is not completely fenced and it would be potentially disastrous if animals were deliberately released or escaped from their stalls. Conversely, stalls cannot be locked or left unattended in the event of a fire or other form of vandalism. The concerns about vandalism and theft extend to the expensive tack and riding/driving equipment that is used in shows. If camping is eliminated, out of town participants simply will not come.
  - D) Due to multiple dog entries often the preferred option, not practical to camp at campsite, would need to leave 5 or 530 am, which disrupts other campers at commercial sites.
  - E) Yes! While campsites have expressed desire to have business there are not many that wish the dog volume/noise. The show is outdoors – gives more shelter! Animal events cannot be compared to regular camping situations.
  - F) Yes however, the camping is more fun for vendors, track officials & volunteers. In order to accommodate the volume of people attending our event, we have portable toilets on site; extra waste bins; portable signage; trailers with bikes & parts; lighting equipment; computers; ATM; and additional miscellaneous equipment required to run the event. Although we do provide 'paid' hourly security, all vendors insist on staying on site with their trailers and due to the

early morning starts and 12-16 hour days, it is more convenient for track officials and less costly for out of town volunteers to stay on-site.

- E) We use to charge \$20. This year \$25 for power only we believe this is fair. Anything above would start to harm our entry counts. Four years ago we moved to Brannen Lake Campsite due to a date conflict. While Brannen Lake did their best it was not a good fit! We are unique campers similar to VIEX horse events!
- F) \*\*Note: Our club absorbs this cost for our volunteers.
- 9. Are there any changes to the Overnight Camping Policy you would recommend?
  - A) That it be limited to special events only.
  - B) No.
  - C) Eliminate any non-animal related camping. Include the ability to offer power within the limits of the existing infrastructure. This may increase our ability to host events in the cooler months if participants have the ability to heat their campers.
  - D) No.
  - E) Please continue it! Decrease the cost we will lose money at present!
  - F) No.
- 10. For Beban Park events only, would you be in favour of all camping being confined to a single, consistent area?
  - A) No, depends what the event is, for example VIEX would need to have 4-H in one area, security in another, and Vendors.
  - B) That is what we do now.
  - C) Nanaimo Equestrian Association would encourage camping in a designated area that was within the Equestrian leased area. i.e. still close to the barns but not right next to them for safety's sake. We suggest the grassy area adjacent to the barns 3 and 4.
  - D) No reply.
  - E) It depends on the area. We rely on being close to the event not down the back somewhere?
  - F) No.

#### 11. Other comments:

- A) If camping is taken away from our special event it will have a serious financial impact on us.
- B) Thank you for including us in your discussion.
- C) Participants in our events are not camping for recreation. They are camping to be able to care for and protect their animals and equipment. Eliminating camping on the grounds will negatively affect our ability to host even a one day event as often out of town participants come the night before to be ready for an early start or to accommodate ferry schedules. There are no commercial facilities available to replace on site camping and it is neither practical nor possible to billet out 30-40 horses. Other City's allow camping on their city owned Equestrian grounds during Equestrian events. (Courtenay, Port Alberni, Sooke).
- D) No reply.
- E) JR handling finals This year we have the entire Province JR obedience show handling finals. Being able to camp makes this more inclusive for all the kids and their pooches.

Power is a huge issue for us, and while I always thought this was because of grooming and comfort, this year it became apparent we have a new issue. Six campers were travelling with nighttime Nasal CPAP machines! These are medically prescribed and need power!

\* NKC has a concern re: areas that should be paid to the city n the past we paid \$ only VIEX for any rigs behind the barns in VIEX or horse areas \* we also have to pay VIEX \$5/night per rig for VIEX power. The city is really only providing LAND if we have to pay city and VIEX the cost becomes too HIGH!

### **SCHEDULE B**

# PROPOSED PARKS, RECREATION AND CULTURE COMMISSION POLICY

### **OVERNIGHT CAMPING IN THE PARKS**

Overnight camping in City Parks is prohibited under Bylaw #7073 (a Bylaw to Regulate Parks in the Municipality). Authorization to provide exemptions from the Bylaw is granted to the Director of Parks, Recreation and Culture through the issuance of a Facility Use Permit pursuant to the Bylaw. Facility Use Permits for overnight camping in parks are infrequent and on exceptional occasions. The Parks, Recreation and Culture Department do not have the staff to operate or monitor camping in city parks. There are also no adequate facilities or services located in city parks to accommodate camping as an ongoing use.

Facility Use Permits for overnight camping will be considered only when;

- 1. Groups such as dog obedience/agility clubs, equestrian organizations or agricultural organizations are hosting events where animals are involved, or
- 2. The event has significant tourism potential and the option for onsite camping is a factor in securing the event to Nanaimo, or
- 3. There is a demonstrated lack of available accommodations within the community to have adequate capacity for the event, or
- 4. Onsite security is required for major events and sporting activities.

All Facility Use Permits issued will be subject to the following conditions;

- 1. A predetermined maximum number of units will be allowed on site per night. A corresponding number of permit tags will be provided to the event organizer by the City. The event organizer will ensure these tags are clearly visible in each camping unit for the duration of the event.
- 2. Event organizers will provide the City with a list of distributed permit tags and corresponding vehicles holding them for the event.
- 3. Camping to be permitted for event competitors/registrants/officials only, not to the general public or spectators.
- 4. All camping units must be self contained RVs. No tenting allowed.
- 5. No services will be provided by the City including power, water, sani/sewer, washrooms, or garbage pick-up.
- 6. Fees levied for overnight camping will be in accordance with the current Fees and Facility Rentals Bylaw. All fees, regardless of where camping occurs in a park, will be remitted to the City of Nanaimo. It is the responsibility of the event organizer to collect the fees and remit them to the City.
- 7. Event organizer is responsible to monitor campers and to ensure adherence to this Policy and reasonable steps will be taken to prevent unlawful activity from taking place.
- 8. The City is not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged property.
