

2012 TEMPORARY PUBLIC ART SELECTIONS.

<u>Staff's Recommendation:</u> That the Cultural Committee recommend that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission recommend that Council approve the 2012 Temporary Public Art Selections.

The Committee reviewed submissions from 17 artists. There were quite a few in the large scale submissions – which were more difficult to choose from than the small scale There were fewer submissions in the small scale. The honorarium to artists is \$4,000.00 for large scale pieces, and \$1,000 for small scale pieces.

David Moench, Yvonne VanderKooi and Nadine Wiepning will be approached regarding scaling down their pieces. The Committee liked their submissions, but would like to approach them to ask if they would be interested in scaling down and be part of the small scale submissions. With the original scale the Committee considered implementation issues, track record of the artist, and the possibility of the pieces being unsalable due to their sizes. Also, to have added them in at full price it would have been an extra \$9,000. If the work is scaled down, what does it do to the work? Gerda Hofman advised that as an artist, it is just part of doing business and the content of the work is not impacted. Julie Bevan advised that the content of the work is not changing. The level of detail will be the same. Next year if Temporary Public Art is again approved, the guidelines will be tightened up to make the parameters clearer. The material used for the Gates of Opportunity piece is chrome plated and oxidized steel. All pieces would all be in place for one year, from the second week in May to end of April, 2013. Existing pieces will be auctioned off at the end of April, 2012.

NANAIMO'S CULTURAL PLAN

Plan Purpose and Goals

The City of Nanaimo established a Cultural Strategy in 2009. This Strategy has been largely ineffective due to a perceived lack of public input and support. The City of Nanaimo is beginning a Cultural Planning process to reassess cultural assets and improve upon our strengths and weaknesses for the future.

The purposes of the Cultural Plan are:

- To work with culture managers, organizations, and residents to determine a cultural vision and priorities in Nanaimo.
- To establish a practical framework for guiding efforts and resources to the maintenance and development of arts and culture in Nanaimo.
- To engage the community and the City in enhancing awareness and understanding of the role of arts and culture in Nanaimo's ongoing evolution as an urban centre.
- To support and encourage community wellness, cultural awareness, and active living.

Plan Development Process

The City of Nanaimo will lead the planning process for the Culture Plan with key guidance from a Cultural Technical Team established by professional cultural managers from the Nanaimo District Museum, Nanaimo Art Gallery, Port Theatre, Vancouver Island Symphony, Theatre One, and Crimson Coast Dance Society.

The chart on the reverse outlines the activities associated with the plan development process. All open houses and public engagement opportunities will be well advertised in the newspaper, in the cultural and recreational facilities, on local radio and social media.

Parks, Recreation and Culture Master Plan

The City of Nanaimo's Parks, Recreation and Culture Master Plan was updated in 2005. This process surveyed residents about their park satisfaction and desires. The plan is a ten-year policy guide for the Parks, Recreation and Culture Department. Following the last Master Plan, a need for additional cultural policies has been expressed and has resulted in the desire to develop this Cultural Plan.

First, let us say thank you to the Commission for granting us the \$530. We certainly appreciated your contribution.

Our anniversary celebrations are now complete, and this letter serves as our post-event report to you.

Our 15th anniversary concert, entitled *Celebration of Song* was held at The Port Theatre on Saturday, May 5, 2012.

- The concert was promoted through the choir's website, The Port's website, Facebook, and HarbourLiving.ca. We issued two press releases to newspapers in Nanaimo, Lantzville, Ladysmith and Parksville, as well as Shaw TV and all Island Radio radio stations; one was to promote the concert guests; the other, to promote the choir and the concert. We placed a display ad in the *Nanaimo Daily News* and *Oceanside Star*, and distributed posters and flyers throughout the community. We also arranged to have Shaw TV film us at an open rehearsal at *Origin at Longwood*, and run spots in *The Daily Show* for the week leading up to the show.
- We recruited Mac Dallman of The Tidesmen Barbershop Chorus as the Master of Ceremonies. For his compensation, Mac asked that we provide a complimentary ticket to the concert for his wife, and complimentary tickets for him and his wife to the post-reception at *The Bistro at Westwood Lake*. He also asked that, if we made a profit, we were to make a charitable donation of \$100 to Nanaimo Child Development Centre on his behalf, which we have done.
- The stage crew included spouses and friends of the choir. The Stage Manager declined any monetary compensation, and we gave him a bottle of wine and a thank-you card in recognition of an exceptionally well-done job.
- Throughout the performance, slideshows were displayed on The Port's projector screen behind the choir. One slideshow displayed images of the choir over the years, in formal, informal and candid settings, along with a selection of our past concert programs, and was shown during the celebratory set of the concert. The rest of the slideshows were complementary to the sets of music being sung; images in these were mostly from Google Images, although a few were from personal photo libraries, so that there were no related expenses. A slideshow was also created to acknowledge our sponsors, which played in the theatre before the concert and on TV monitors in the lobby throughout the evening.
- The design and layout of the poster, flyer and concert program was done at no charge by a choir member; printing was handled by Kowality Business Forms. The slideshows were developed by that same choir member, also at no charge to the choir.
- Appreciation gifts were presented to our current Artistic Director and accompanist; the cost of these gifts was offset by a voluntary collection received from current choir members.

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- Sinclair Singers and Patrick Courtin Trio performed as guests, each receiving \$200.
- Immediately following the concert, there was an informal reception in The Port's lobby for the performers and audience, in keeping with our long-standing tradition. Two anniversary cakes purchased from Costco were served, along with homemade goodies provided by the choir members. Coffee and tea were provided, and a cash bar was available.
- The following day, we held a reception for current and former choir members, accompanists and Artistic Directors at *The Bistro at Westwood Lake*.

To acknowledge the City's support, the City's logo was included in the choir's website, the newspaper ads, the poster and flyer, and the concert program (a copy of the program is enclosed). The logo was also part of a sponsor-acknowledgement slideshow that played on the lobby monitors and in the theatre before the performance. The City's support was also acknowledged in the concert press release and in a live on-stage acknowledgement during the concert.

Once we received the City's grant, we realized we needed to raise additional funds to support the concert. For the first time in the choir's history, we developed a three-tier sponsorship program, and undertook a campaign to find sponsors from business owners in Nanaimo:

- For \$300, Gold sponsors each received 3 free vouchers for the concert and post-concert reception in the lobby; a ½-page full-colour ad and acknowledgement on the sponsor page in the concert program; having their logo in print ads, the poster and flyer, the choir's website (with a link to their own website) and slideshows on the lobby monitors and in the theatre prior to the concert; access to display their promotional materials in The Port's lobby on concert night; and live on-stage acknowledgement during the concert.
- For \$200, Silver sponsors each received 2 free vouchers for the concert and post-concert reception in the lobby; a ¼-page full-colour ad plus acknowledgement on the sponsor page in the concert program; having their logo on the choir's website (with a link to their own website) and in slideshows on the lobby monitors and in the theatre prior to the concert; and live on-stage acknowledgement during the concert.
- For \$100, Bronze sponsors each received 1 free voucher for the concert and post-concert reception in the lobby; a ¼-page full-colour ad plus acknowledgement on the sponsor page in the concert program; having their logo on the choir's website (with a link to their own website) and in slideshows on the lobby monitors and in the theatre prior to the concert; and live on-stage acknowledgement during the concert.

When we approached Michael Gill of Michael Gill Wealth Management, he wanted to sponsor us for more than just the anniversary celebrations, and became our first season sponsor for \$600 (50% has been recorded as prepaid revenue and will be transferred to current income in our next fiscal year starting June 1, 2012). Mr. Gill did his own due diligence to come to this decision, and was very impressed with the results of the concert and the way we manage our choir.

Companies who didn't want to become full sponsors were given the opportunity to place print ads in the concert program; six companies accepted this offer. We offered Balloons & Bears Florist a ¼-page ad in return for a reduced cost to provide balloons as stage decorations, which they accepted.

We obtained a grant from Mid Island Co-op and utilized the Thrifty Foods Smile Card program to raise funds for our new risers and wardrobe items. We also self-published and sold a cookbook with recipes of the goodies we provide at our post-concert receptions, to raise additional funds.

As stated in our application, three measurable results were established:

1. Overall ticket sales and audience size — Our budget is based on selling 300 tickets to the concert, and to push ourselves, we are creating a game for 500. We will consider the event a success with sales of 300.

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- 2. Bottom-line financial profit Our concerts are the choir's major fundraising event each term, and income from concerts is used to offset operating expenses.
- 3. Connection with past choir members We want to connect with at least 50% of our past members, even if it is only to hear that they cannot attend.

Results were as follows:

- Overall ticket sales and audience size The Port Ticket Centre sold 217 tickets at \$18 each, printed 16 tickets for redeemed vouchers, and distributed 28 complimentary tickets to Theatre Angel agencies, for a total audience of 261. While we didn't reach the goal of 300 sold tickets, sales were higher than the past three years' Spring concerts which are typically more difficult to fill than Christmas concerts.
- 2. Bottom-line financial profit As you will see from the attached financial report for the event, our revenues exceeded our expenses, despite the low ticket sales. This was due in large part to the sponsor program and fundraising that we undertook.
- 3. Connection with past choir members We made a concerted effort to contact our former choir members, directors and accompanists. We went through all our records to identify names and find contact information, and checked it against Canada411.ca. We then published a list of people for whom we have no current contact data on the choir's website, and received some updated info from our current and former members.

Of the 125 names currently in our member database, 28 are current members, which means there are 97 former members. Of these:

- 1 died in February 2011.
- 58 have an email address on file and were contacted by email.
 - 1 responded, asking to be removed from the mailing list and did not participate in the anniversary.
 - -28 responded, to say whether they would attend or not.
- 23 have a mailing address but no email address on file. For these, we mailed invitations. Four of these women responded: 2 sang in the concert and 2 attended.
- 15 continue to have no current mailing address or email address on file. For 3, alumnae members advised us that they moved off the Island years ago. For another 3, mailings sent through Canada Post were returned as *moved*, *address unknown*.

While we did not reach our 50% target, we now have a consolidated database of our membership which we intend to maintain.



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L'Association des francophones de Nanaimo (AFN) continues to adhere thoroughly to the Global Development Plan of the Francophone Community of British Columbia 2009-2014. The objectives of our program of activities for 2011-2012 described in the Plan, address the following major activity sectors:

- Arts and Culture
- Communications
- Community Development •
- Economic Development .
- Social and Health Services
- Political, Judicial, and Community Recognition .
- Education and Development •
- Support

Arts and Culture Sector:

St-Jean Baptiste Celebration, June 24-25thth, 2011. Every year this event takes place at a different location; this celebration has a traditional bonfire, cake and live music which has always been a great success. This year L'AFN hired a French performer to come to a local primary school "l'école Océane" and give students the opportunity to experience some traditional French-Canadian music. L'AFN also partnered with the Downtown Nanaimo Business Improvement Association, the Old City Quarter Association, Headliners School of Performing Arts and the VIU International Education Department by sponsoring a French performer to entertain at their Multicultural Festival where we invited our members and held an information booth.

Canada Day Celebration, July 1st, 2011. L'AFN's participated once again in the annual Canada Day celebration at Maffeo Sutton Park and joined the parade of flags. L'AFN hosted an informative community kiosk, answering questions about the French culture and its roots in the community creating additional awareness of the Francophone population in our community. During this activity L'AFN provided many children with coloring pages of "Toffy", our Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable mascot.

Corn Roast, September 10th 2011. This year L'AFN held a Corn Roast picnic at the Bowen Park lower picnic shelter. This was a great family event open to the whole community. There were over 40 participants who enjoyed live French music all afternoon, face painting and corn on the cob.

Book and Art Fair, November 28th-29,-30th, 2011. This annual event invites the community of Central Vancouver Island to stock up on French literature and films. We combined our book fair with an art showcase. Several artists delighted the public with their work. Styles were diverse and artists interacted with patrons giving the community a glimpse of their talent. The event lasted three whole days and was held at L'AFN's community center.

Christmas Celebration, December 10th, 2011. Year after year this event is a great success and was held last year in the gymnasium of the Océane Francophone School. Celebrate the holidays while enjoying a little French culture. An afternoon of crafts and games, a magician doing tricks, a visit by Santa Claus and a succulent traditional French dinner is all you need to sample what the French culture has to offer. More than 80 participants attended and about 6 volunteers from NDSS as well as L'AFN's board of directors and some members helped with the celebration.

The Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable made a happy return, February 10th-11,-12th, 2012. Throughout two and half days, a continuous stream of talented musicians, dancers and performers regaled the crowds at this unique bilingual cultural event. The Festival was held at a new location this year, the "Beban Social Center". The sub-committee of the festival received multiple praises on the new location. Traditional foods were served as well as our mouth-watering toffee on snow available all weekend long. New to the Festival this year was a visual Exhibit Hall where displays of stunning paintings and crafts were showcased and an Artists' Lounge where performers signed autographs and interacted with the audience. Dan Richer, a well-known local wood carver, enchanted arriving visitors with striking carvings of local wildlife. As part of our ongoing sustainability goals, the Festival included composting bins from the City of Nanaimo's Green Bin Program. Our enthusiastic volunteers demonstrated due diligence as they sorted recycling, waste, and compostable materials. L'AFN was blessed this year with over 202 volunteers. More than 100 Festival Partners and collaborators were involved with the festival this year and The Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre

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d'Érable was once again considered very successful this year, thanks in part to the city of Nanaimo and our other government partners.

Communications Sector:

The majority of **L'AFN's** communication was made through our Electronic Newsletters sent to our members and the Francophone/Francophile population on a regular basis. L'AFN continued to maintain our Website throughout the year by extraordinary volunteer work. L'AFN also continues to promote activities via telephone, through schools, local newspapers, French/English radio, Shaw television, flyers and the Harbour Living website. We purchased 2 ads in early January of this year in the Nanaimo News Bulletin to promote French classes and a "Food Safe" workshop presented in French. We were also included in an ad published in "The Star" local paper on the 7th of April promoting the presentation of a French movie at the Avalon cinema in partnership with "Les rendez-vous du cinema Québécois". A very intense media campaign also took place prior and during the Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable to cover the event.

We provided volunteers for set-up, clean-up and assisting in kitchen duties. We also brought our mascot to dance with the children and held a coloring contest.

Social Services and Health Sector:

L'AFN continues to offer translation services to people requiring them; the demand for these services is ongoing.

L'AFN continues to distribute our Newcomers Guide which offers vital information to ease integration into our community and the F.F.C.B annual French directory.

L'AFN continues to distribute multiple provincial and federal help guides such as the French version of the BC Health Guide and so many others to numerous to list here.

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Education and Development Sector:

L'AFN holds the Mini-Franco Fun program on a weekly basis at the Océane Francophone School. Parents gather with their little ones 0-5 years and introduce them to French, a second language for some of them. They learn the language through play, songs and partake in arts & crafts and take the first step towards discovering a different culture.

L'AFN holds French courses on an ongoing basis at L'AFN, and refers students unable to participate in our French courses to V.I.U.

L'AFN has also helped parents throughout the year find French tutors for their children.

Several workshops were offered to the community this year at L'AFN's community center such as: "Web site design" and a children's "3D animation" workshop. A new project started called "J'écris ma vie en français" which is an autobiographie writing workshop in partnership with the Campbell River association

Financing generated by AFN activities:

L'AFN continues to sell cultural products (French greeting cards) as well as Maple Sugar products.

Memberships and activity fees such as French Courses also contribute to our finances.

In 2012, we accumulated a total of \$123,549.00 in gifts in kind through our Maple Sugar Festival du Sucre d'Érable event and through the general programming of L'AFN.

Volunteer Appreciation Night, March 31st, 2012.

This community event commemorates the special moments of the year and the great community spirit of the city of Nanaimo and its region. A diner was served by the board of directors of L'AFN and a performing French artist delighted the guests. Door prizes were drawn. Each volunteer was provided with a thank you letter as well as a record of their volunteered hours worked throughout the year at the Maple Sugar Festival and at other events so that students can apply those hours towards graduation requirements.
