1. CALL THE OPEN MEETING TO ODDER:

The Regular Meeting was called to order at 6:58 p.m.

#### 2. INTRODUCTION OF LATE NEMS:

#### 3. ADOPTION OF AGENDA:

It was moved and seconded that the amended Agenda be adopted. The motion can ed unanimously.

#### 4. <u>ADOPTION OF MINUTES:</u>

(a) Minutes of the Regular Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission Meeting held Wednesday, 2011-OCT-26, at 7:00 p.m., in the Bowen Park Complex Conference Room.

It was moved and seconded that the Minutes be adopted as circulated. The motion carried unanimously.

#### 5. PRESENTATIONS:

(a) Staff Presentation – Weight Rooms and Grade 5 Active Passes – Tara Fedosoff.

Weight Rooms – at NAC and Beban. Hand out provided to Commission. Previously managed by Aquatic Staff until May 2010. Now has own cost centre and own budget area. Scanners added at cash centres and can track attendance to space. Looking at a "Super Circuit" for the New Year – this will provide a training circuit session in less than one hour. Familiarization is being provided for teenagers. All the PRC trainers have either Can Fit Pro or BCRPA accreditation, as well as First Aid training. A telephone has also been installed in the Beban Gym. A handout was provided to Commission.

Grade 5 & 6 Active Pass – Delivery is done mostly through the schools. There was an average of 8.5 visits per child that had the pass. This wear, the Grade 6 Stay Active pass was launched on 2011-OCT-01. 25% of eligible tidents are using it. Marketing to schools is continuing through Facebook and e-mail. The many students are in Grade 5? There are about 900 in Grade 5 and it the high 900's in Grade 6. A handout was provided to Commission.

It was moved and seconded that the presentation be received. The motion carried unanimously.

#### 6. **DELEGATIONS**:

It was moved and seconded that the Delegations be permitted to address the Commission. The motion carried unanthously.

(a) Jim Delorme, Norasea Park Committee, 5626 Oceanview Terrace, Nanaimo, B.C., V9V 089, equesting that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission provide IIP funding to assist in the installation of a playground, open played and picnic area, and shaded trail at Norasea Park located 5651 Norasea Read.

Mr. Delorine advised that the Committee would like to have this park underway in the spring 2012, and provided an outline of what needs to be done with the landscape to prepare it for a playground, as well as the safety measures they intend to put interplace to prevent accidents and injuries. The Committee would also like to put in a viewing area at the end of Norasea Road. They would like to have a larger playground that will be inclusive for the 2-12 year old group. Intention is to make it as cost effective as possible. Commissioner Pattje asked how many funds have been raised. Mr. Delorme advised that, none yet, but they have a large portion of the neighbourhood who are willing to donate material time and labour — construction and equipment operators and paving for supply of materials and labour (verbal commitments). This is the first VIP request for 2012 - \$100,000 is being proposed in the 2012 Capital Budget.

It was moved and seconded that the Delegation be received. The motion carried unanimously.

(b) Ms. Margot Holmes, Executive Director, Vancouver Island Symphony, 150 Commercial Street, Nanaimo, B.C., V9R 5L9, regarding 2012 and beyond funding for the Symphony and to answer any questions the Commission may have regarding the Staff Report, Item 9.(a), of the Agenda.

Ms. Holmes introduced the Vancouver Island Symphony Board members in attendance - Joyce Clarke, Secretary, Judy Fraser, Co-Chair, Marianne Turley, VIS Ambassador, Eveline O'Rourke, Co-Chair, and Eric Kuehnel, Director at Large, and provided a handout to Commission, "Request for Investment Funds", which provides a number of options for review. She then provided some history of the line item funding previously requested. The Symphony is requesting that they be scheduled as a budget line item for \$85,000. The Symphony provides 8-10 concerts at the Port Theatre per year. An economic impact study was done two years and was previously submitted. The Symphony receives very little government function the Province; and now their gaming funding of \$85,000 is in question. A number of programs have already been cut and if they do not receive the admitional \$25,000 requested, they would need to cut additional programs. They still follaborating with the School District (Grades 3-5) to provide an education program. Patrons attending the Symphony performances are from the Duncan to Campbell River catchment area. There are approx. 5-6 of 38 musicans to play in the Symphony live in Nanaimo, the remainder come to Nanaimo – resulting in a positive economic impact for the City of Nanaimo.

It was moved and seconded that the Degation be received. The motion carried unanimously.

(c) Mr. Ed Poli, Manager, and Mr. Ian Niamath, President, of Nanaimo Art Gallery, 150 Commercial Street, Nanaimo, B.C. V9R 5L9, regarding funding for the Art Gallery and to answer any questions the Commission may have regarding the Staff Report, Item 9.(b), of the Agenda.

Mr. Niamath introduced Mr. Pau Fudge, Vice-President, Nanaimo Art Gallery to the Commission. Mr. Fudge stressed the importance of the Nanaimo Art Gallery to the City of Nanaimo emmunity. He advised that the Gallery is in a critical position financially and that their support of \$60,000 from the City has not varied since 1999. The City provides approximately 15% of the Nanaimo Art Gallery budget and they would like o receive 18%.



#### 1. CALL THE OPEN MEETING TO ORDER:

The meeting of the Cultural Committee was called to order at 3:34 p.m.

#### 2. GRANT INTERVIEWS

#### a) EMPIRE DAYS EVENT

- The Empire Days Society was represented by Sheila Thompson, Scott Thompson, and Elena Knappett.
- Could you explain the Society's expenditure of funds, in terms of how money is raised and how funds are spent? The Society receives funds from the City, the Bingo Hall and the Great Canadian Casino. They receive less from the Bingo Hall than in the past. In 2010, they received and spent \$30,000. In 2011, they received and spent \$28,000. The events include selecting a May Queen, the May Queen Pageant, the Parade and visiting other cities for certain events. Insurance is now up to \$8,000, due to several increases over the past few years. Storage costs are now \$2,400 a year. No paid staff but costs for facility use for meetings every month. This year, the Society found a space for free at St. John's Ambulance. Other expenses include jackets, crests, office expenses and a post office box. Every year, the society outfits the May King and Queen.
- The Nanaimo event is the oldest May Queen festival in Canada, dating back to 1874.

- Do you have a sponsor for the fireworks display? The fireworks display is the biggest expense of the event. The Casino gives money and occasionally the Legion gives money. No specific sponsor.
- Does the Society do anything on the day of the parade to raise money? In the past, they have looked into food vendors but it would require special licensing. The Society recently held a Beer & Burger Event and it brought in \$2,500. Commissioner Avis said it would be nice to see food vendors at the event. Sheila Thompson would like to see the event remain family-oriented and for that reason would like to not see a Beer Garden. Food vending would be fine.
- Does the Lions Club raise money for the Society as they are listed as board members? They are listed as board members because they are responsible for parade set up and they provide prizes for events.
- Research around the event brought up the issue that small protests had arisen around the concept of an Empire Days weekend. How does the organization position itself in the contemporary context? The Multicultural Society wanted their funds. Not everyone loves it but it is an important part of our history.
- How many members do you have? Currently have 40 volunteers with 25 regularly attending meetings.

#### b) BALLROOM DANCE SOCIETY

- The Ballroom Dance Society was represented by Stephen Gower, Treasurer.
- Has the Society ever conducted an economic study on how much revenue is generated around the Island Fantasy Ball event? The economic spinoff is huge. People from all around the world come to the event, Nanaimo's event is renowned.
- Are you a registered society as it did not come through on the application?
   Yes, we are, there was a problem with the document when we transferred it to a different program.
- Asking for \$1000 for the operating grant and \$5000 for the event grant. The
  Bowen Auditorium is very important to the society. It is where they get their
  new clients after they have taken their first classes with PRC. They invite the
  class attendees to the monthly dances. The convenience and central
  location of the auditorium make it accessible to new dancers. After that,
  dance becomes part of their life.
- Why are you applying for the operating grant this year? The venue cost has gone up to \$330. Monthly dances are operating at a loss to keep them affordable. The food and decorations are all subsidized by organizers. The workshops are made affordable by only paying instructors \$75. The Bowen venue is at the top of what they pay, but Bowen is the best place to have it.

- How much are the membership fees? Membership costs \$20. They currently have 175 Members, with a 20% attrition rate a year. Demographics are fascinating, all ages.
- Have the day camps been successful? Summer camps were cancelled this
  year due to low registration. The ones in the Spring were successful.

#### c) FESTIVAL OF BANNERS

- The Festival of Banners was represented by Chris Kuderle, Administrative Director of the Nanaimo Art Gallery.
- How long has the Festival of Banners been running? This year is the 25th anniversary.
- Do you have a strong volunteer base? We work with Volunteer Nanaimo to recruit volunteers and use the artists who paint at the gallery.
- Who is responsible for coordinating volunteers? We have a paid coordinator.
- Do you have professional painters helping out? Professional painters paint some of the banners. Looking to have professional painters demonstrate how to do it and what to do in the future. They hope to expand this. Pay the artists to do that.
- We are hoping to bring it out into the street to attract more people. Have it
  downtown, where's there a lot of traffic. Banners are attached to spans,
  move the spans outside with the supplies to make it as public as possible.
- Have you considered a space on Commercial Street? Do you mean for the outside painting? We are looking into it and are in negotiations.
- Are you going to sell the banners again? It costs \$100 to produce the banner. We only charge \$25 for the banner. Some of the banners are used by Thrifty's to give the banner as a gift to underprivileged kids.
- How do you account for the huge difference in operating costs? It becomes more difficult to produce the festival. Numbers have varied from 160 banners to 450. Extra money would help them expand to try and attract more people.
- How much would you pay the professional artists? We would like to pay \$25 an hour, which is the standard rate for the workshops we run.

#### d) WOMEN'S RESOURCE SOCIETY

No representatives attended.

#### e) NANAIMO BLUES FESTIVAL SOCIETY

- The Blues Society was represented by Keith Davenport, President.
- How was the new venue at Maffeo Sutton this year? It was remarkable.
   Moved from Diana Krall Plaza and because of that had to do ticketing for the very first time this past year. Magical weekend, because of the great venue.

- What happens in inclement weather? Not much we can do. The main contingency plan is a lot of tents to provide cover. Downside in not having the whole park, some folks sitting outside the fence and getting it for free.
- What is the cost of daily admission? Daily was \$40, three-day was \$95.
   Early bird promotions were as low as \$75.
- Would you consider doing a different rate for the night? We have decided that
  the last act would be its own fee. It is a fine line so you do not upset the daily
  customers.
- Ms. Hofman asked if she could paint this year. Yes, she is definitely invited to paint.
- You are asking for event grant that is three times more than last year, why? The event is based all on volunteers who pushed themselves really hard to pull off event. These extra costs listed would help improve the event. Insurance costs a lot. Social media: possibly needing a new webmaster and we may have to pay someone to do it. Whatever help we could get is critical. Almost broke even last year. The Beer Gardens saved them, the added revenue that made the difference.
- Is this grant narrative from last year? Do you have dates and performers confirmed? Yes, narrative is from last year. Dates are set. Trying to book performers now, trying to book two international stars. Maximum of two that will repeat from last year, both mid-island based. Dates are August 24, 25, and 26, 2012. Narrative was transferrable.
- Are you looking at doing a Children's stage? We are looking to have something for youth, still in discussion.
- How much of operating grant would go to production of the festival? Majority of the funding is to make it happen again. The objective is to have a couple of dances. Create a connection to the youth.

#### f) SCHMOOZE PRODUCTIONS

- Schmooze Productions was represented by Dean Chadwick, Artistic Producer, and Diane Chadwick, Business Manager.
- How much of your attendance is from within the City? Based at Nanaimo Centre Stage, getting more people from South Nanaimo. Attendance is actually City of Nanaimo numbers, not regional district, error in wording in the document.
- Is this a Season you are applying for? Should it not be an operating grant? Yes it is the season we are applying for. B. Kuhn commented it would be more feasible as a operating grant rather than a festival grant.
- Do you run workshops during your season? Yes, we do.
- Are you a registered non-profit? Not a registered non-profit. Looking into that for the future.
- What is your structure? Family company, based on married couple with a team of support. Based on a family vision.

- How do you handle accountability? How does your money get handled?
   Operated similar to a private business.
- Are you incorporated? The name is incorporated.
- Do you use any evaluation tools for workshops, etc? Word of mouth, schmoozing
- How do you like the Centre Stage venue? Great venue, love it there, warm and welcoming.
- Do you have an independent review of your finances? No.

#### g) <u>AFRICAN HERITAGE SOCIETY</u>

- The African Heritage Society was represented by Shalema Gantt, Executive Director and Devlon Wyatt, Production Manager.
- You are asking for just about double the grant this year. Why? Our budget gets greater each year, ask for a bit more because last year was not adequate. It is a month-long celebration.
- Looking at your event's application, could you give us a brief description of the events for February? Events run February 1 – 26, 2012, group of events, gospel concert, events at the museum from black contributors, programs at the library, book display, Black History Month, concerts and then the finale, entire community is invited. Ballet Nacional de Cuba has been confirmed. Entertainers are confirmed. Most dates are confirmed except the Gospel concert will move to the Sunday possibly. Currently booked on the Monday at the Port Theatre.
- Commissioner Pattje commented that the gospel concert at Brechin United was great. Atmosphere will not be the same at the Port Theatre.
- Yes, we agree. The date was not available at the Brechin venue. It is important to us to have the Christianity behind it and would like to return to the Brechin venue in future. We will see how the Port goes this year.
- What is the operating grant for? Office expenses. Have to employ someone sometimes to operate the office. We are hoping it would offset our office costs. We have never asked before. It would cover a lot of our overhead costs, utilities, etc.
- The Society has received \$30,000 in government grants. Can you foresee any fundraising activities to fund events? Fundraising goes on during the month of February. Looking at maybe doing fundraising on culturally significant days throughout the year.
- How are the sales going for the Ballet? The Port Theatre is taking control of ticket sales so we do not receive any funds from that event.
- How was the summer event? We were pleased it did not rain. We had lots
  of viewers. For the first year it was very successful. We only charged
  vendors a small fee for the rental. Budget was not very high for it.
- What is the projection for memberships? Your application seems to list only 15 members. That number is based on projected funds. Currently have 100

- members. Paid members are less, because not everyone has paid. We are having an AGM soon so hopefully we will settle up then.
- Mr. Wyatt asked the committee what is your feedback about how the African Heritage Society stands in the community? Ms. Bevan says it would be nice to have more information about your events, especially online.

#### h) <u>CRIMSON COAST DANCE SOCIETY</u>

- The Crimson Coast Dance Society was represented by Holly Bright, Artistic Director and Michael Wright, General Manager.
- Where is Wen Wei Wong from? He is from China. He defected when his company was here.
- Dynastic sounds like a wonderful event. It is shaping up to be a great event.
  The Chinese Cultural Society connected them with a group of Chinese
  International students who are getting involved. Sharing their cultural aspects
  in the event including a Chinese Tea Ceremony.
- Is the grant money strictly for February? Festival grant is for February. February is a much more community-focused event.
- How does it differ from event in March? Bodytalk is run by a group of youth. It is easy to get funding for this as it is for youth.
- The May event: 4 Quartets, is new since the grant application went in.
  Events are poetry based on T.S. Elliot's quartets. Not sure if a weekend
  event will be successful. Hope everyone shows up. Success for the Society
  is turnout and the buzz created by the event.
- So the \$18,000 grant is for operating costs? Operating grant is crucial. It would be covering production costs.
- Is the contemporary dance audience growing? Contemporary dance is a challenging art form. We do well in engaging our audience. Find ways to help people understand the work and enjoy it. It is interpreted it in different ways.
- Could you elaborate on the 4 Quartets event? Plan is based on T.S. Elliot's four quartets. Deborah Dunn started with the first quartet and then created a work that she speaks the four quartets while dancing. Create workshops about integrating movement with poetry. Engage other local poets for reading.

#### i) NANAIMO COMMUNITY CONCERT BAND

- Represented by Shari Barker.
- The group is asking for double the grant amount of last year, why? We would like to do maintenance on our instruments which is overdue. We are currently dealing with financial losses for the first time. We have had to up our ticket prices to \$15. We would like to do a bit more publicity. Never had to push marketing in the past, but now we need to.

- Do you use social media to attract younger people? We have a web designer looking at the website. We would like to get into the schools and meet with children before tackling social media.
- Do you have contacts in the schools? We have teachers in the group who have connections to schools. We would like to attract more students.
- Do you plan on raising your ticket prices? We have. \$15 is the new price. Port takes a percentage so we only gained a small amount.
- Do you use networking skills to connect students and schools? Not yet.
   Looking at doing it.
- What other fundraising activities are on the horizon? The Tidesmen are making \$8000 per performance so we intend to learn from their example. The band doesn't need a lot to stay functional.
- Age of your band is getting on, how do you attract younger members? We cannot ask members to leave, can only take so many members in total so we have to wait for folks to leave.
- Are you relying too heavily on the City funding? What would you do if you
  don't get it? We would cut back on certain things. The maintenance on
  instruments would have to wait.
- Why do the musicians not maintain their own instruments? The band owns
  most of the instruments. 30% of the instruments are owned by the band.
  Large instruments, like percussion instruments, are typically owned by bands.
  It allows members who cannot afford instruments to play.
- Do you purchase the instruments or are they donated? Bought outright for the most part, some are donated by members in legacy after they pass away.

#### j) THEATREONE

- Represented by Garry Davey, Artistic Director and Wendy Smitka, President.
- Your year looks like it is shaping out to be one main stage event, Tamarack, three actors and three workshops. Yes it is a play centered around three actors, a three-person play.
- When is it? Towards the end of April at the VIU theatre
- Were there operational problems last year? We are not sure where this perception came from. We were in deficit a few years ago, last year we paid off the deficit. We lost the gaming funding. We have an accountant working one day a week. We received BC Arts Council and Canada Council funding this year. We workshop plays by Canadian playwrights. Funding from Canada Council is hard to get. Second time applying we were successful.
- How is Fringe Flicks going? People are not planning in advance. Subscriptions not selling but single seats are selling out.
- Why are you applying for a grant for three years at \$34,000 a year? It is what
  we used to receive. We are asking that much because of the loss of gaming
  funding.

- Why is there such a discrepancy in municipal funding? Very hard to sustain at a low level of funding. Everything costs more.
- Did you do a BC Arts Application this year? We just received funding for Tamarack, and applications for next year go in the spring.
- Are you getting BC Arts Council operating funding? You have to have a season of at least three plays. We are just receiving project funding right now. Film series is a revenue generator for us. Emerging Voices have been running for a few years now.
- Have you ever given thought to a Summer Festival? We used to do it. We
  may decide to do it again. A lot of competition in the summer with other
  events going on. Nice to be in the park in the summer. It is in discussion.
  We are doing a production in June.

- (a) Notes of the Special Grant Review Meeting of the Cultural Committee held on Thursday, 2011-NOV-10, commencing at 3:07 p.m., in the Bowen Park Complex Conference Room.
- (b) Notes of the Special Grant Interview Meeting of the Cultural Committee held on Thursday, 2011-NOV-17, commencing at 3:34 p.m., in the Bowen Park Complex Conference Room.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting notes of 2011-NOV-10 and 2011-NOV-17 be adopted as circulated. The motion carried unanimously.

#### 5. GRANT INTERVIEWS:

(a) 3:00 Vancouver Island Symphony (combined operating & event grants)

#### Margot Holmes, Executive Director.

- Provided a handout "Symphony Starter Pack" to the Committee members.
- Requested less this year for Festival grants than over the past three years.
- Did not have a "Concert in the Park" this past summer as it would have put their season at risk financially. Ticket sales for the first time were down. First two concerts for next year are sold out. Are doing some community days and community outreach.
- How did the program for families go? It went well there were 200+ children
  in attendance. There were between 450 and 550 in the audience. It was
  held on Election Day so they were pleased with outcome.
- Requesting \$85,000 next year which is \$24,700 more than last year. Why is this? For many years have asked to be a line item on the budget and would like parity with other arts groups. They receive \$85k from BC Gaming; however, have not yet heard the outcome for this next year. They don't know if they will be approved.
- VIS has requested their funding be as a budget line item and different options are being considered – possibly \$25,000 as a line item with the other \$60,000 coming out of the Cultural Operating Grants fund, or to provide the entire \$85,000 from the Cultural funds.
- Commission has recommended that Council approve VIS as a budget line item request for \$85,000; however, it may be some time before budget discussions commence.
- Could you elaborate on the Seniors Outreach program? The majority of the audience is seniors-based with a range in age from 50-90. There are "rush" seats that they can participate in for \$20, volunteer opportunities, an ambassador program, and also community days there are two events per year are free to the public.
- What if they don't get the \$85K? They will have to cut the free community programs.
- (b) 3:15 Nanaimo Conservatory of Music (combined operating & event grants)

#### Kathleen Darby, Executive Director & Gordon Bidman, Treasurer.

- Festival grants asking for \$1500 for the first time, why? It is a new festival
  and they feel that \$1500 will help to market the event, and believe that it
  could grow to be a tourism draw. Last year they asked for special
  consideration in order to make application to the Department of Canadian
  Heritage and have been approved for \$3400, have also made application to
  the BC Arts Council.
- At their meeting held on 2011-MAR-23, the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission approved the allocation of \$500 from the 2012 Arts, Cultural, and Festival Events Grants Funds to the Nanaimo Conservatory of Music in order that they could make application to the Department of Canadian Heritage under the "Building Communities Through Arts and Heritage" Program, for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Vancouver Island Chamber Music Festival.

- Planning to undertake advertising on mall posters at Woodgrove Mall with support from Pattison Outdoor as a sponsor. They will pay for the production of the advertising, but will only pay about 10% of the regular costs of posting.
- New magazine directed to parents about the Conservatory. The also provide
  a bursary for students that are unable to cover their own costs. They charge
  very low group program fees. Would like to work with the community more
  and also with the aboriginal community more for children who are interested
  and/or exceptional. They would like to be able to provide music lessons to as
  many children as possible.
- You received \$7,400 last year and this year are asking for \$20,000 why?
   Due to huge reduction from BC Gaming funds.
- Did Nanaimo Foundation provide support? Yes, two years ago for their renovations.
- If you don't get the full amount what will be the outcome? It could mean they will suffer a significant deficit at the end of the year.
- Is there a pro bono or decreased salary for children who can't afford lessons?
   Not at this time, perhaps they should approach the musicians and even set up a specific program for funding.
- They had a wonderful fund raising concert with "Sacabuche" at St. Paul's Anglican Church on 2011-NOV-27. The Director is originally from Yellowpoint. They think that they realized approximately \$2500 in revenue.

#### (c) 3:30 Pacific Coast Stage Co. (combined operating & event grants)

#### Jeremy Banks, Artistic Producer.

- Requested \$2,000 in 2011 and are asking for \$14,000 for 2012. Last year had a season of theatre about 16 days attendance of over 1100. The administration cost and networking are not shown in the budget. The shows have used international artists, but while they look forward to having them back, they are not sustainable financially yet. House theatre series has a low cost and is free to market, but still requires administration. Plus they are putting on an improvisational series. All programs that require people to administer and operate them and they have a growing interest in them; however, it is not cost effective.
- Want to partner with youth groups and schools have they been in touch with SD 68? Not yet, but have started volunteering in elementary schools, have taken it to the Boys and Girls Club and would like to propose to the School District in October 2012 with a proposed program in 2013.
- What kind of administration costs are they thinking of adding? Part time administration salaries for two people - \$14,000 - two part-time administrators, and \$4,000 to take one of them to full-time for the summer fringe series.
- Under the Societies Act, Directors cannot benefit from the society. Appears
  to be a grey area current prospective board directors cannot benefit;
  however, they can be paid for services provided. The matter is to be brought
  up at the AGM and it may mean that Jeremy would become a non-voting
  board member.
- Festival \$2,482 in 2011 and now asking for \$7,500 for 2012 was it not successful? It was very successful - they are looking to double the days and

- make the Port Theatre a venue which will increase costs, but, also attendance.
- Electro musical show in November sold out. Has been working with the Cowichan Arts District and Cumberland – looking to bring fringe to those areas as well. Would like to have a tour – Victoria all the way north to Campbell River.
- While they don't have a long track record, it has been extremely successful.
- What is your out of town audience? For fringe, relatively small most have been Nanaimo residents. Connecting with other arts organizations in Nanaimo to provide opportunities for them as well. Just connected with a group of script writers that have met since 1993.
- Who takes care of the finances? Mostly Jeremy; however, they need someone for administration development. The finances will be reviewed by Rob Mowbray and then an independent bookkeeper.
- Are you planning on any future fundraising? Yes, all events are geared that way – but they really need to continue building their audience.
- (d) 3:45 Vancouver Island University Foundation Festival of Trees (event grant)

## Renee Bohun, Special Events Coordinator, & Dave Forrester, Manager, Alumni Development.

- First year they have applied, why? New relationship with the Vancouver Island Conference Centre and the event is there this year.
- How did your crowd compare to that at VIU? Gala numbers were up by 120 people. Santa Claus arrival and parade crowds were exceptional over 1000 people came through the door.
- Using funds to hire entertainers will they be local? For family days they will have a lot of local entertainment – mostly free. They would like to stay with the Nanaimo market.
- What kind of assistance from DNBIA? All of their materials had the events, but not on the DNBIA materials.
- The event wrapped up found free entertainers would like grants for next year's event. The trees are still up at the Shaw Auditorium.
- What happens to the money that is raised? Funds pay for event coordinator and the rest goes back to matching dollars for scholarships and bursaries and equipment for students.
- Will trees stay up over the Inaugural Council Meeting? It is up to the Conference Centre but they will look into it.
- (e) 4:00 Francophone Association (combined operating & event grants)

#### Valery Prevost, Interim Coordinator, & Nicole Champagne, President.

- Projected \$16,000 for salaries and promotional materials not shown as a cost for 2011, can you elaborate? Salary for professional staff graphic design, and other key positions.
- Do you have a membership fee? Yes, there are about 130 members and the fee is \$15, as well, there are student and senior discounts.
- Over the past 4-5 years there has been a peak and a valley, explain? Their attendance went down in 2010 but were competing with the Olympics and

still had over 3000 people attend, last year there were organizational changes and they only put on a one-day event. Have been receiving many calls requesting that the Maple Sugar Festival be reinstated.

- \$3,000 for marketing previously asking \$65,000 for 2012, why? 2011 was a one-day event and for 2012 they want to put on a full event.
- BC Gaming grants received \$2,700 in 2011 projecting \$15,000 for 2012. They have received this grant.
- Canadian Heritage \$6,000 last year, \$30,000 this year. Have received.
- In 2012 the festival will be three days \$43,000 for performers and contributors who are they? Have most of the names but the contracts are not yet signed and there will be a non-disclosure agreement names can be provided on Friday once the contracts are signed.
- Last year \$2500, asking for \$12,000 this year. It was compared to the 2010 festival when they decided to ask for funds. Cannot have the traditional activities in the schools due to the current difficulties with contract negotiations.
- This year will be in the Beban auditorium due to inclement weather in the past which may have affected attendance.
- What is the name of the artist who performed in 2010 at the Centennial Building? It was probably Edith Butler.

#### (f) 4:15 The Nanaimo Arts Council (combined operating & event grants)

#### Anne Carlson, Manager.

- Not a huge difference in 2011 and 2012 request. Because she was new to the position, she didn't have a good sense of the year, and Odette has left her with the impression that there may be \$10,000 available through gaming. Has left it at status quo.
- What type of impact does the Council make on the local economy? Return
  basically the monies earned back to the community. Large part goes straight
  to the artists mostly through the payout to artist from gallery sales and
  bursaries and pay professional fees for a variety of activities.
- Faithful following for film festival? Yes, sold out.
- Changed maximum film length from 10 to 12 minutes, why? Many requests
  were received and the credits are included this will allow the films to be 10
  minutes allowing 2 minutes for the credits.
- Do not pay rent? They pay some rent based on their sales 10% of sales go to rent which is about \$55,000.
- Community building? Does Board trainings professionally and did that with them and then an assessment on what needs to be done with prioritization following that – top three were community building, fund raising, and health and succession planning.
- Still have downtown facility? No was let go.
- Last year received \$1,900, now requesting \$3000. Used some of the gaming revenue to subsidize the film festival and do not have those funds this year.
- How many people go through the gallery per day? Minimum would be 15 people, today there were 40, but it does vary according to the season. They have started tracking it.

#### (g) 4:30 Western Edge Theatre Society (operating grant)

#### Frank Moher, Artistic producer.

- Last received funds in 2010. Next year will be a make or break year partly because he will be moving on, but will work with successor during the transition. The Theatre needs secure funding of at least \$15,000 in order to continue beyond 2012. Hopeful that gaming funding will be restored. Now in a position to apply for assistance from the BC Arts Council. Has been involved for 10 years it is time for someone else to work as the Artistic Producer will continue to assist as able.
- \$24,000 from box office this year? They have proper financials for 2010/11 which have been sent to Bob for distribution.
- 2010/11 did fund raising events due to gaming cuts. Strong box office and subscription campaign.
- How is Nanaimo Centre Stage as a venue? Lovely. Perfect size for Western Edge and is very well equipped for the most part.
- Tell us something about "Moonbound"? An adaptation musical based on an HG Wells novel. Clash of culture and civilizations fantasy musical for family attendance. Co-composer is from Gabriola.
- To the extent that their future hangs in the balance he proposes that the
  health of other theatre groups does as well. It seems that Nanaimo should
  have a resident, professional theatre company and they feel that they are
  essential to the community.
- Ever had any discussions with TheatreOne? Only in the distant past. They have taken a new form and should really be called a "festival". Unaware of any motivation on their behalf to collaborate with Western Edge. They are not an equity company although they do hire and pay equity actors. Would be happy to talk with them. They don't do much theatre anymore.

#### (h) 4:45 Gallery Row Public Art Committee (event grant)

#### Kim Smythe, Committee Member, George Ewing, Property Owner/Site Liaison.

- Don't see fees for artists? Artists have been asked to donate their work for one year. The art is then put on website and posted for sale for them without commission. Promoting the art and the artist. Have asked if they are able to contribute 10% back to the Gallery.
- How does weather affect the pieces? Generally they have done very well and there is only one piece that needs to be brought in for repair. Only one piece missing from vandalism.
- Has any money been received from DNBIA and the Old City Quarter association? No, not yet.
- What is your structure? A community committee of artistically interested volunteers. Want to leverage public art week a bit more. Two pieces were purchased for display on the property.
- How are finances handled? The business oversees, and there are two individuals required for signing authority on the bank account.
- Is there a plan to form a board of directors? If it seems to need to go in that direction for structure then it will be reviewed and will depend on the willingness of the group.
- What is the website? www.GalleryRow.ca

- Any ideas of expanding it around the Old City Quarter? Around Gallery Row, yes.
- This type of art placement does it increase the business? Yes, does provide some incentive to make it work, but have not seen direct increase in the business quite a few people go through the Gallery.
- A lot of the pieces would do just as well inside do not need to be in a public place – there is an opportunity to work with artists to make site-specific art.
   As they are in their first year, there has been a lot of work going into the building of the art and the group.
- How will they prevent future thefts? At this rate, they may consider it as acceptable loss.
- Is Gallery Row lit at night? Yes, not brightly, but, it is lit.
- How do they intend to use the requested funds? Hope to create another event and this will cover administration and the event. Also generate funds from T-shirts and metal sculpture stake sales which go back to the Gallery.

#### (i) 5:30 Nanaimo Children's Literature Roundtable (event grant)

#### Paige Fisher & Deidre Bjornson, Co-Chairs.

- Your request has doubled from last year, why? Because they moved from VIU venue to downtown and have added to costs, also, a lot of additional funding has come from Service Clubs and they are not able to give as much as they have in the past. Some local businesses have assisted in-kind which has helped. Our experience last year is that it was successful downtown. Use of Diana Krall has brought many people downtown as well as the people off the cruise ships. The VIU is still a great supporter but they wanted to widen their profile in the community. They hosted the dinner inside the Museum for their volunteers. Last year they had the "Kerplunks".
- Do you anticipate having the authors there for book signing again this year?
  Yes, there is a list and they have a line up by July and try to have a range of
  authors for the different generations. This year this is a graphic novelist. As
  well, this year they have a student Marimba Band from Parksville they
  range in age from 14-18.
- Not having an auction? They raised \$1300 from donated art work at the
  auction and the art was also presented in two galleries. They won't be having
  an auction this year, but will have some art work and may raffle it to raise
  some funds. They are not a not-for-profit society or a charitable organization.
  It is an issue that they will need to address at some point.
- June 2011 financial report amount of \$2540.88 what was this for? For a group of young people who come in and work in support of the authors, on the Friday evening all authors and illustrators get together for a potluck, they provide authors with lunch on the Saturday, a wine and cheese, and then a dinner for all authors and volunteers. Also costs were higher as there were two giant cakes in the plaza for the public to celebrate their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary.
- Rental costs? Art Gallery didn't charge, Port Theatre did charge.

#### (j) 5:45 Cambodian Canadian Support Group Society (event grant)

#### Den Neang, President, and Veasna Chhim, Event Setup Director.

- Asked for \$1200 which is about 50% of total budget. Will probably go for individual and business donations. Some of the money goes towards the equipment and facility, labour is volunteer.
- What would be the value of your donated time? For organizing at a booth or selling at concessions multi-cultural southeast Asian based food. It could be for selling or donation.
- If you had to pay your volunteers what would it be worth? The concession would be worth maybe \$13 / hour, setting up equipment might be \$25 / hour, some people have the skills and may set up for free.
- Location have you confirmed anything? They have been waiting to see if they get funding first and the amount and intend to choose a location based on the amount received.
- Mission Statement want to preserve Cambodian Culture and Traditions, but also assist Cambodian Families, what do you need? Would assist in translation services or finding accommodation or reading documents.
- Are you connected to Nanaimo Multicultural Society? Assists as their translator but is not connected to them.
- How many Cambodians are in the community? About 20 families representing about 100 people.
- Who is the event organizer and what kind of success have you had in the past? Gen Yan and others. In the past they have rented halls and organized dances, and have organized religious content and help organize those events.
- You mentioned \$500 for cash donations, where from? Expected to receive from individuals. There will also be a booth for donations. There will be a website for comments and feedback – a web designer is volunteering.
- Canada Day has some great Multi-cultural Booths have you ever thought of setting up a booth there? Not really, no. Their booth is fairly simple, preprepared food and tables – no kitchens. Businesses could advertise on the booth.
- Insurance? Coast Capital advised that it could cost up to \$800 as it is open to the public neglected to add to his application.

#### (k) 6:00 Performing Arts BC – Provincial Festival (event grant)

### Nicole Cederberg, Fundraising Chair, Bob Rowledge, Treasurer, & Michael Sloan, Liaison to Performing Arts BC,

- Asking for \$7,500 what is total budget? The budget is attached at the back of their application. \$44,500 is the total fund raising budget. Request was compared to the 2011 requests and grants sum was represented as approximately 1/3 of that amount as it encompasses most of the arts groups within the community. They are asking ½ the amount they are seeking from corporate sponsors. This is the first time in decades that the Nanaimo community will be showcased in this event.
- Have they applied previously? Quite some time ago about 60 years. Since the mid-90's the festival has had its funding curtailed and have needed to go

- to the provincial locations. The idea is to have the provincial festival move around the province to showcase different communities.
- How many people do they expect? Attached to their application. Would like
  to promote the Nanaimo businesses through advertising. Media plan will be
  print, radio and television as well as web opportunities. Will seek local
  groups to show that they support the arts.
- Final page shows various areas in BC with representation at the performing arts festival.
- Local festival starts the last week of February and continues on until the end of April. The budget pays dues to be included in the festival. All money raised goes back into the community through sponsorship and bursaries.
- Many churches are hosting by providing space for events.
- Nanaimo Theatre Group will be hosting the local festival, but for the provincials there is a scheduling conflict for space.

#### (I) 6:15 Nanaimo Women's Resources Society (event grant)

## <u>Lesley Clarke, Executive Director, Darcie Davidson, Coordinator, & Laurie Vosters, Public Relations</u>

- Can you elaborate on the public forum and expand and provide more details? The public forum piece in the agency they deal with a lot of complex issues and use art and culture as a healing practice would be an opportunity for people to get together over more positive issues. A large scale event would allow people to come forward and have an opportunity to speak about arts and cultural and what it means to people and what public involvement means. Have a lot of public support. There is a committee that meets every week theatre, visual artists, all interested in acting as mentors and providing theatre workshops for youth and adult women. Centre Stage is booked. The Midlsland Coop has come forward with a large donation. A lot of effort is very much coming from the participants themselves.
- Will mentors be compensated? There may be some people that will receive an honorarium to cover some costs. Most people are willing to volunteer their time.
- Runs for a year and has a travelling exhibition? There may be a
  documentary involved in the process. The idea is to get it all in place and
  then have intense workshops over a couple of weeks and then exhibit it and
  document it in a documentary and perhaps a small book. A writer, that would
  like to have a writing workshop, is involved. They hope to be a leader in this
  community around these issues.
- To what extent does this venture depend of what they receive from the Committee? It will definitely affect the scale of what they can accomplish. They have received a lot of in-kind donations, Mid-Island Coop has given \$1000, and a group of musicians is willing to put on an event at the Queen's at no cost.
- Has it ever happened before anywhere else? There have been other versions and they have been successful.
- How many participants are expected? 15 people participating in each theatre, writing, and other, workshop. Then there will be the attendees. 2 shows in the theatre which could result in 150/show plus the matinees.

- What kind of male benefit is there to the shows? A deeper understanding.
   Obviously coming at it from the perspective of working with female at risk youth. It is their intention to build on that and then in a year look at working with male at risk youth.
- Provincial grants available? They are looking at every grant possibility they can find.
- What kind of supplies are they looking for? Canvas, paints, anyone that can go out and assist with photography.
- They want to build the community and provide a lasting legacy.

10. <u>Cambodian Canadian Support Group Society</u> – while the concept is good, it is felt that, given the time frame remaining, there is a serious lack of preparation and planning; therefore, this group will be removed from the process this year, but with some level of support on process and planning, and encouragement to be provided by staff for a future application.

It was moved and seconded that the Cambodian Canadian Society be removed from the grant process. The motion carried unanimously.

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Report to Parks Recreation and Culture Commission November/December 2011

Submitted Dec 8, 2011 by Debbie Trueman

### Administration/Revenue:

- > Numbers/Revenue projected to year end visitor numbers (including shop, events and programs) continue to increase now up almost 30% from 2010. Year to date comparison has gift shop sales up almost 50%, venue rental (net) 27% and program revenue over 70%. Reasons for the increase include now being open six days a week in the winter, Serious Coffee customers, and steadily increasing traffic downtown and in December-Santa's Workshop. Program revenue is up due to increase in charges and some new programs being offered.
- > The partnership with Downtown Business Improvement Association has been great! Our December numbers will be way up over last year. It has been fun watching kids and Santa.
- > BC Arts Council This application was submitted, we should hear in January.
- With less than two months to go in our year, revenues are above budget as planned in anticipation of a gaming reduction next year.

### **Exhibit Programming:**

- Permanent Exhibit Development Step 1 involves space reorganization in the gallery including an update to the oldest section of the permanent gallery, the Harbour, to make way for the last major addition of the gallery looking at Retail, downtown and service development. Current stage is moving the Schoolroom.
- > 2012 exhibits include a bird watching/bird exhibit from the Museum of Nature in Ottawa, the Snoopy/Nasa Moon Landing exhibit and a community driven textile art exhibit.
- We will be doing a fabric/textile art and a toy exhibit next fall.
- We are currently booking and planning feature exhibits for 2013.

### **Programs and Events:**

> Venue Rental - included Tourism Tuesday (the final one), Young Professionals of Nanaimo events, VIHA training sessions, a book launch, Tiger Lily Event/Crimson Coast fundraiser.

- > Ivan Sayers presented two more sold out workshops for the Belle Epoch exhibit.
- ➤ School programming the K/1 Christmas program is up and running and completely booked. We are looking at ways to expand access next year by adding stations and volunteers to be able to accommodate two classes at once. We have had to turn classes away this year.
- > Brownie Sleepover was again very successful!
- Princess Royal Day took place at the Bastion with lunch at museum.
- Family Christmas is 2011-DEC-10 together with Santa! Should be a big day this year.

### **Community Partnerships:**

- ➤ Military Museum/Old Space We have worked out separate security arrangements for sharing that space I hope it works in practice as well as theory! I have met with Roger and Brian to assist with grant planning as well.
- > Toured Executive from the former Costume Museum in Vancouver as they are looking at new space.
- ➤ BC Museum Association is having a one day session in Vancouver on 2011-DEC—09, with a plenary session on working with municipalities and I am on the panel. I will be giving glowing reports about working with my municipal government!
- > Met with volunteers from the Ladysmith museum hoping to develop a museum.
- ➤ Black History Society I continue to work with this group for a February exhibit again this year.
- ➤ New partnerships with several people and groups in the community are forming around planning for the Bird/Bird Watching exhibit from the Canadian Museum of Nature opening in February.

#### Administration/Revenue:

- Numbers/Revenue actual yearend visitor numbers (including our own and rental events and programs) up 40% from 2010 (not including Bastion numbers). Yearend gift shop, programs and venue rental sales are up 37% over 2010. I am looking for new suppliers for the shop to continue to grow revenue as part of our initiative to increase earned revenue to cover projected bingo shortfalls.
- BC Arts Council This application was submitted, no word yet.
- Gaming application deadline is 2012-MAY-31; submission will be in March when we have audited statements ready. We are still anticipating and budgeting for a 50% cut.
- Yearend is in progress. We are projecting a larger than planned surplus due to the delay of construction (due to required remodelling of schoolroom and harbour) on retail section. The surplus will be designated to this project.

### **Exhibit Programming:**

- Permanent Exhibit Development space reorganization in the gallery is complete. Exhibit design for the last major addition of the gallery looking at Retail, downtown and service development is in progress with construction to begin late spring.
- > 2012 first feature exhibit from the Museum of Nature in Ottawa.
- We are currently booking and planning feature exhibits for 2013 and 2014 which include a large feature exhibit from the Canadian Museum of Civilization Expedition: Arctic which looks at the triumphs and tragedies of the Canadian Arctic Expedition of 1913-18. It includes over 85 outstanding artifacts including many on display for the first time.

### **Programs and Events:**

- Venue Rental was much quieter in December/January and included Nanaimo Executives Association, NDP event, and booking for regular meetings of the MS society and a six-week Elder College course.
- School programming the K/1 Christmas program is up and running and completely booked. We are looking at ways to expand access next year by adding stations and volunteers to be able to accommodate two classes at once. We have had to turn classes away this year.
- Family Christmas was December 10th together with Santa resulted in a Visitor day!
- The partnership with Downtown Business Improvement Association has been great! We have already met to discuss next year's collaboration.
- In December, admission to the gallery was by donation to the food bank and we collected \$1192 and several bags of food.

### **Community Partnerships:**

- We are playing a small role in assisting the VIU/Snuneymuxw FN collaborative Douglas treaty conference in May.
- Military Museum / Old Space new security systems division is in place and we continue to work together to share the building.
- Black History Society I continue to try work with this group for a February exhibit again this year.
- New partnerships with several people and groups in the community are forming around planning for the Bird/Bird Watching exhibit from the Canadian Museum of Nature opening in February to put together some school and family programming.
- Fall Exhibit we are collaborating with a local textile artist and with textile experts among our "Team Textile" volunteers for a fabric art exhibit for this fall.



### A travelling exhibit from the Canadian Museum of Nature

On a recent December Saturday afternoon I was working in the backyard and heard a buzzing sound. I'd already seen one large insect buzz by but, this was louder and more persistent. Hovering above me was a forlorn Anna's hummingbird. "What are you doing here?" I asked. I always thought these small birds holed-up in a protected area when it was near freezing. Perhaps I was too hasty in packing away the feeder for the winter.

Bird watching is growing as a popular outdoor and indoor sport. More than 400 species of birds have been identified in BC, more than any other province in Canada. Have you thought about what, beyond having feathers and eating seed, makes a bird a bird? Answering these questions and many more is an integral part of *Our Feathered Friends*, a travelling exhibition from Ottawa's Canadian Museum of Nature.

Whether you are an indoor or outdoor birdwatcher you will find something of interest in this travelling exhibit.

Using photos, specimens and video, the exhibit explains what makes birds special, how they soar and glide and how to identify them. Come along to the workshops and demonstrations, try your hand at the oriental art of Origami and even learn to prepare a meal for your favourite backyard bird. Novice birders, the primary audience for the exhibit, will learn about what make birds special, how they soar and glide and how to identify them.

### Museum Hosts National Stitch-In Public Day


The Japanese tourists were intrigued, they stopped to smile as they examined the hand embroidery displayed in the museum lobby. It was National Stitch-In Public Day, September 27th and three museum textile volunteers along with members of the Island Stitchery Guild were enjoying a day of hand work.

Margaret, Merle and Roberta, along with Brenda and José, are members of the Island Stitchery Guild. They worked on their various projects, with pulled work, canvas work, cross stitch and Hardanger stitching on display.

José, Nicola and Brenda, volunteer in the museum's textile department. They demonstrated restoration techniques where the maxim of "do nothing that is irreversible" is the over-riding principle. The goal is always to protect the piece and perhaps allow it to be strong enough to be displayed. Fine net, held in place with tiny silk stitches, is used to stabilize weak areas of a garment. José and Nicola were working on a beautiful dress bedazzled with beads. The gauze fabric had torn in many places but by the time the day was over they had a plan and the dress was basted back into one piece, ready to be stitched.

It was fun to see the pieces progress stitch by stitch. National Stitch-In Public Day was a great success. It is gratifying to know that hand stitching is not a lost art as there are still people in our community who enjoy stitching and they are eager to learn more every day. I am sure the Japanese ladies agree.

### Lunar New Year at the Nanaimo Museum



Come and Celebrate the Year of the Dragon

In the year of the Dragon, Lunar New Year Celebrations will take place at the Nanaimo Museum, with the Nanaimo Chinese Cultural Society and the Central Vancouver Island Multicultural Society, on Saturday, January 21, 2012 from 1:00 to 3:00 pm.

Celebrations for this annual event, now in its 20th year, feature the stunning Chinese Lion Dance at 1:10 pm and 2:50 pm, as well as Chinese dancers and musicians and cultural games. There will be ongoing activities including: calligraphy, with your name written in Chinese characters; Mahjong, a traditional Chinese game; children's activities (paper cutting), and refreshments of Chinese tea and fortune cookies. Everyone welcome - admission is by donation.


The Lunar New Year is traditionally a family time. For Chinese families, the New Year lasts for 15 days starting with the second New Moon after the winter solstice. As part of the celebrations a religious ceremony is given in honour of Heaven and Earth, the gods of the household and the family ancestors. The Chinese community invites everyone to join in the celebrations.

The Lunar calendar has a cycle of about 29.5 days and they insert an extra month in once every few years (seven years out of a cycle of 19). This is why the Chinese New Year falls on a different date each year.

The Dragon is the mightiest of the signs in the Chinese Zodiac. Dragons symbolize such character traits as dominance and ambition. Dragons prefer to live by their own rules and if left on their own, are usually successful. They are driven, unafraid of challenges, and willing to take risks. They are passionate in all they do and they do things in grand fashion.

While Dragons frequently help others, rarely will they ask for help. Others are attracted to Dragons, especially their colorful personalities, but deep down, Dragons prefer to be alone. Perhaps that is because they are most successful when working alone. Dragons have tempers that can flare fast!

### José Hope

**The Kiwanis Sunrisers:** The Kiwanis Sunrisers very kindly gave us a donation of \$500, which will be put towards our educational programming.



\$1,000 Level Adopted Artifacts: Dance Dress and Dance Shoes


### Heritage Week - Feb 20 to 26

### **Literary Luminaries**



### Snoopy Exhibit

### To the Moon: Snoopy Soars with NASA

Our first international travelling exhibit arrives from the Charles M. Schulz Museum in Santa Rosa, CA and will be on from June to September 2012. The exhibit celebrates the role of Snoopy and Charlie Brown in NASA's Manned Flight Program beginning with the Apollo 10 mission. It was the practice run for the lunar landing in July 1969.

### <u>Adopt an Artifact</u>

The Trader's Bank Building, one of the early skyscrapers in Toronto, is one of North America's few surviving skyscrapers from the early 20th century. Construction began in 1905 at 67 Yonge Street and the building stands at 15 storeys (198 feet). It was the tallest building in Toronto and the British Commonwealth until the CPR Building was completed in 1913.

The building was innovative in its leasing arrangements. It was the first major Toronto building to introduce the New York system of leasing by the square foot. The building was completed by early December 1906.

The building's height was controversial at the time. Many of the city's intellectuals and architects expressed dismay at the prospect of skyscrapers. It would overload the property values and shade the streets, trapping the disease-causing miasma that still lurked in the public imagination. The Toronto Globe complained that "in the next ten or fifteen years...the chief retail thoroughfare will then look like a Colorado canyon".

Our cast metal bank artifact was developed by an inspector at Toronto's Trader's Bank and was modeled on the architecture of the bank's head office. It was distributed to savers who inserted coins in the appropriate slots. The bank's rural savers were encouraged to deposit spare coins in slots that could be designated for specific purposes. From time to time, the bank would be unlocked and emptied by a bank employee and the money deposited to the saver's account.



REPORT TO: THE PARKS, RECREATION AND CULTURE COMMISSION

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission support an additional one year (January - December 2012) extension to the existing pilot agreement Parks, Recreation & Culture has with the Downtown Nanaimo Business Improvement Association (DNBIA) to program the Diana Krall Plaza and Olympic Live Site.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

In May of 2011, City of Nanaimo Council supported the pilot project that had DNBIA program the Diana Krall Plaza and Olympic Live Site.

The Parks, Recreation and Culture Department have been working in partnership with the DNBIA to program and maintain the Diana Krall Plaza and Olympic Live Site during this pilot project. DNBIA has been responsible for the programming of the Diana Krall Plaza and Live Site screen and the Parks, Recreation & Culture Department continues to maintain the plaza and screen.

The primary goal of the pilot program was to create a more inviting, active environment in and around the Plaza area to help enhance the downtown experience. To date the programming of the plaza and screen has been a very positive and successful experience for the DNBIA and downtown merchants. However, the pilot project has only been in operation since July 2011, which has not allowed either party enough time to evaluate the success of the partnership. Early signs indicate that the DNBIA has held several very successful events in and around the Diana Krall Plaza. An additional one year extension of the pilot program would give both parties an opportunity to better evaluate the success of the partnership. The extension would continue to have DNBIA responsible for allocation of the Diana Krall Plaza and Olympic Live Site to all interested groups, and the Parks, Recreation & Culture Department responsible for the maintenance of the plaza and screen.

RE: BEBAN SOCIAL CENTER AUDITORIUM FLOOR

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Beban Auditorium flooring replacement project be postponed and a comprehensive maintenance plan to extend the life of the existing parquet floor be developed.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

In a multi use facility such as the Beban Social Centre Auditorium there is no single flooring type that meets the needs of every user. Typical annual use of this space is:

- Blood Donor Clinics 44 days per year;
- Trade / Craft Shows 43 days per year;
- Banquets, Socials and Receptions 39 days per year;
- Shows, Performances & Practices 28 days per year;
- Workshops, Meetings & Conferences 25 days per year; and,
- PR&C Programs several daily most days as the schedule allows.

The existing 35 year old parquet floor, which is glued directly on to the concrete slab, has served users well but in recent years has required regular repair due mainly to damage caused by moisture or use of adhesives on the floor. Moisture comes into contact with the floor in a variety of ways such as hot tubs, fountains, vehicle and horticultural displays and also portable bars, banquet warming trays, portable hand washing stations, etc. Tape of all sorts is used on the floor to safely secure power cords, carpets, etc., to prevent them from becoming tripping hazards. All of this is typical within this facility.

In the five (5) year Capital Plan the 11,000 square foot Beban Social Centre Auditorium flooring replacement was scheduled for 2011. The Capital Plan regularly includes facility improvements such as this to ensure our recreation centres remain safe, modern, meet user needs and are cost effective to operate.

In consultation with an interior designer, staff investigated a number of flooring solutions. Recommended was a commercial-grade vinyl flooring to replace the existing 35 year old parquet floor. The vinyl flooring was deemed to meet the needs of the majority of users and, for some users, is a better choice. These groups would include home shows and garden shows, and food, wine and beer festivals.

The Nanaimo Ballroom Dance Society (NBDA) is one group for whom vinyl flooring is not satisfactory because the governing body for competitive ballroom dance requires a wood dancing surface of at least 2800 square feet. NBDA hosts the annual two (2) day Island Fantasy Ball which has earned an excellent reputation in the circle of competitive ballroom dancers. Due to the concerns raised by the NBDA the project was postponed so further investigation could be completed.

Based on the variety of users at the Social Centre and current limitations of other facilities within the City to facilitate Ballroom Dance Competitions, staff recommends that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission provides staff direction to cancel the Beban Auditorium flooring replacement project and to develop a comprehensive maintenance plan to extend the life of the existing parquet floor.

Options for replacement of the Auditorium floor include:

# 1. No change or replacement at this time - Extend Life of Floor

#### Pros:

- All groups would carry on as usual.
- Annual refinishing, daily custodial maintenance and necessary floor repairs would continue as before.

#### Cons:

- Not a long term solution. Eventually repairs on the floor will start to impact operations.
- The service life of this floor will depend on use. We have seen an increase in demand
  for this facility in recent years and there is no indication the present volume of use will
  change in any substantial way in the near future.

# 2. Replace with Commercial Grade Vinyl - 2012

# <u>Pros</u>:

- Would meet the needs of the majority of users and better meet the needs of those users whose activity are at risk of causing damage to the existing parquet floor.
- Groups who are responsible for causing floor damage are required to pay the cost of repair. These charges would become less frequent.
- Would no longer require a 5 day facility shut down for floor refinishing.
- Cost effective product to purchase and install (\$5-7 per square foot)
- Groups requiring a wood dance floor would have the option to rent or own a portable floor, readily available from a number of suppliers. Costs associated with this can be expensive depending on quality; rental costs range from \$8-10,000 per event, and to purchase such a floor can range from \$18-140,000 for 2800 square feet.

#### Cons:

- Does not meet the requirements of competitive ballroom dancers
- Does not have the aesthetic look or feel of wood.

#### 3. Replace with a New Wood Floor – when funds available

#### Pros:

- All groups would carry on as usual.
- Annual refinishing and daily custodial maintenance would continue as before.
- With proper care it could last for the next 35 years.

# Cons:

- Risk of moisture and adhesive damage would remain unchanged.
- Cost for product and install would be more than double than that of vinyl depending on product chosen (\$11-16 per square foot) with additional costs to install of a sub floor.

RE: MONTHLY REPORT - NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2011 - PARKS OPERATIONS

The following highlights are the park initiatives for November and December, 2011.

# PARK PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

- The Harewood Centennial Park plan continues to move forward. Stakeholder discussions
  planned with community planning, the community schools, and VIU Good Neighbours
  program have been set up for early February. Public input sessions will be held again in the
  spring.
- Survey work is being collected for 150 Cliff Street the new parkland at Maffeo Sutton Park. This data will be used in the upcoming park improvement plan update.
- Staff are working closely with the RCMP to help reduce transportation and use conflicts at Long Lake and Loudon Park in anticipation of a busy summer at the lake.
- Design work is moving forward on a boathouse at Loudon Park as part of the Loudon Park Improvement Plan.
- The 2012 Temporary Art RFP has closed for artists. A selection committee is evaluating applications and will choose the 2012 winners for February. New art pieces will be installed in May and old art pieces will be auctioned off in late April.
- The 2012 Street Banner contest has been posted. Submissions for this year's banners are being accepted until 2012-FEB-15. The winning design will be on display by the May long weekend.
- Staff are working on improvement concepts for the Italian Fountain and surrounding green space. The improvements will meet current codes and better fit the adjacent site changes at Port Place Mall. The RCMP have been giving input into this high profile location.
- Staff are updating the Horticulture Strategy and Irrigation Design Standards to reflect current practices and future directions.
- Staff are putting a package of changes together for the Engineering Standards Manual (irrigation, planting, trails, structural soils, and tree root grids). Changes will be adopted into the spring addition of the manual.
- Preparation for 2012 dog off leash park pilot sites is beginning. Trail and safety improvement work in the School Board property near May Richards Bennett Park will begin in March and should be complete by 2012-MAY-01. Public open houses will be scheduled for February or March to obtain public input into 2012 pilot sites.

# **VOLUNTEERS IN PARKS**

- The Forest Drive neighbourhood are planning and fundraising for their spring 2012 park improvements. Staff mailed out an update letter to the neighbourhood and met with "The Willow" Apartment Strata Association to make sure that the adjacent apartment residents were aware of upcoming changes to the park. The playground design RFP will be posted in February.
- Residents near May Richards Bennett Park held several work parties over December and January to help thin the forest. The Dover Bay Environmental Club and residents have been key volunteers in this project.

- The Applegreen playground was installed in November 2011. Landscaping will happen in April 2012.
- Residents around Norasea Park are moving ahead with their VIP playground fundraising.
- The Nanaimo Old City Association and Pawson Park residents are fundraising for Phase 2 of their park improvements.

# MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION

- Renovations to the Animal Shelter's main office were completed. This included all new commercial grade cabinets, counters, flooring and painting.
- The old oil furnaces were replaced with high efficiency heat pumps at the Westwood Lake Caretaker residence, the Parks Operations Yard and the Kin Hut. These were completed through Sustainability Funds.
- A Building Envelope Condition Assessment was completed on the Centre Stage building at 25 Victoria Road. The assessment was performed by a consulting engineer.
- The exterior doors of the main buildings at Beban Park have been re-keyed to a new high security master key system. There are now limited access doors into the facilities with sub master keys for the complex, pool and arenas. Before the new key system was installed, many of the doors and hardware had to be replaced.
- The RFP for new retractable and fixed bleachers at the NAC was advertised with a closing date of 2012-JAN-31. The installation date will be no later than 2012-JUN-01.

# **PARKS UTILITY**

- New ball hockey nets were fabricated for Morningside Tennis Courts.
- Christmas lights at Beban and Bowen were installed and repaired for the season. The LED lights that were installed two years ago have been failing at a rate of 40%. Parks staff are looking into alternative lighting for next season.
- Two Urimat Waterless urinals were installed in the Maffeo Sutton Washroom on a trial basis. The urinals were supplied and installed by West Bay Mechanical.
- A new post and sleeve was installed at the back of the NIC to prevent vehicles from driving behind the building. There has been quite a lot of vandalism and graffiti done in prior months in this area.
- New gutters complete with leaf guards were installed on the Bowen Complex. The old gutters were rusted out in spots and were continuously being blocked with leaves and needles from the nearby trees. The leaf guards will reduce the amount of maintenance required to keep them flowing.
- New black steel garbage receptacles were installed on Diana Krall Plaza. These now match the ones at the Conference Centre and downtown.
- New accessible picnic table tops were installed on the tables in front of the NAC.

# **FACILITY OPERATIONS**

- Repairs were required at the pools; including heating circulation pump seals, seals on the chemical loop pump and replacing a broken union on a heat recovery loop.
- The hot water tank in the Beban Social Centre was replaced.
- Staff repaired a broken PVC brine line at the NIC.
- Two safety valves were replaced as well as the auto bleed lines on the compressor at NAC.
   All were rusted through.
- New panic hardware was installed on the rear double doors at the NAC.

- A new security gate was fabricated and installed for the stairwell leading to the upper mechanical room at the Beban Park Social Centre.
- A new cage for the chain operator of the rollup door at Beban Centennial Building was fabricated and installed.
- The chlorine scales at NAC were rebuilt. There was a broken internal piece that was causing the scales to malfunction.

# **TURF AND PARKS:**

- Staff worked on 2012 Performance planning.
- Staff worked on snow and ice removal during the late November snow storm.

# TRAILS:

- Staff installed the final phase of the Linley Valley trail which included a bridge over Cottle Creek and a board walk on the other end close to Rock City Road.
- Staff finished up the parking lot in Bowen Park.

# HORTICULTURE:

- Staff installed seasonal displays at several locations throughout the community.
- A new rain garden was installed in Bowen Park.
- A new native garden was designed and planted at McGirr Park.
- Staff have been making mulch for the parks by cutting leaves and applying them to flower beds.
- Winter hanging baskets have been added to Diana Krall Plaza.
- Staff are working on a restoration report/study for a natural restoration project at Jordan Park.

# **URBAN FORESTRY:**

- Street and boulevard tree inspections were done.
- Staff worked on cleanup from several storms, including responding to seventy-three calls regarding storm related tree concerns.
- Staff worked with the GIS Department on the Tree Inventory Program.

# PARKS AND OUTDOOR RECREATION PROGRAMMING:

- West Coast Storm Watching Tour ran at 100% capacity.
- Tree Pruning Program ran at 83% capacity.
- Winter Walkers Program ran at 70% capacity.
- The document created last fall "Invasive Species Removal Strategy" has been accepted
  as a working document to support the new Horticultural Strategy for the attack on invasive
  plants.
- Finale 2011 Entertainers are hired, marketing has begun, staff have been hired, and food vendors have been chosen. Planning is progressing along very well!

# **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

Four Thursday Special Events had an average attendance of approximately 82 participants. 98 tickets were sold to the Christmas Lunch at Bowen Park. There were almost 1,700 seniors registered in department programs.

With the exception of 19 program cancellations, the majority of City South programs/preschool programs that did run showed very strong registration, with most being full.

Monthly Preschool Programs: Registration for all Beban registered monthly preschool programs is at capacity for January, and also for most programs during the remainder of 2012.

Pottery classes: New for spring will be a program for 11-14 year olds combining hand building and learning the wheel. One school and one home-school group had bookings in the studio in December. In 2011, 783 people dropped in to the studio.

Two Beban-based day camps ran over the Christmas break, Christmas Chill Camp and XploreSportZ Camp (in partnership with Pacific Sport), both at, or almost at, capacity.

Fall dance programs wrapped up with a Ballet and Musical Theatre Dance Recital. All the programs had an opportunity to showcase their newly acquired skills to friends and family. The event was very well received and plans are in place to do it again for the winter programs.

There were 763 participants enrolled in lessons at Beban Pool and NAC in November compared to 718 in 2010. In December 494 enrolled in lessons at Beban and compared to 367 participants in 2009.

827 patrons took part in drop-in programs at Oliver Woods in November, and 559 during December.

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Aquatics: The Aquatics Supervisor met with the White Rapids regarding the BCSSA Provincials taking place at NAC in August of 2012. All parties met at VIU and toured some of the venues they have to offer to the White Rapids. The White Rapids are committed to running a first class event and to setting the bar for any future events in the province. Staff also met with Nancy Ryan from the Ebbtides Masters swim team to discuss their swim meet that was taking place on 2011-DEC-03 at NAC. Ebbtides have been running this event for a while, and are very prepared and organized. They included water slide races as part of their meet this year just to change things up a little. On Wednesday mornings, the NAC will be set up as two 25 metre tanks to accommodate all users. After more than 30 years of service to the City and the Regional District, Helen Walker has retired. Van handicapped parking spaces and accessible picnic tables were installed at NAC in 2011 to accommodate some of the special needs clients that use the Aquatic Centre. This project was dedicated to Norm Helmstreet by Access Nanaimo in a dedication ceremony in December. Norm, who died after a cardiac incident at NAC in 2010, was an advocate for handicapped van parking and a long time user of the Aquatic Centre.

Arena: Attendance at public drop-in sessions was up to 9,809 compared to 9143 in 2010. Parent and tot sessions had a significant increase with 408 attending compared to 231 in 2010 – an increase of 77%. Special events in the arenas during November included two "Glow in the Dark" public skates and seven Nanaimo Clippers home games. Nanaimo Ice Centre hosted the Old-timers Coal Diggers Tournament and NMH Pee Wee House Tournament. In December there were three hockey tournaments at NIC: Bantam House; Pee Wee House; and, Initiation/Novice Hockey. Winter Wonderland was very successful with 4,959 attending. Sponsorship revenue totaled \$14,896. Twenty of the Arena staff team participated in Operation Red Nose on 2011-DEC-10 and raised \$1,010.77 transporting 98 people and 22 dogs home safely. Zamboni Operators at Beban and NIC Arenas participated in "Movember" and raised over \$2,000 for the cause.

**Fitness Gyms:** Staff purchased several new pieces of equipment for the weight rooms including more mirrors, ballet bars, squat machine, replacement dumbbells with rack, functional trainer, power rack, stretching posters and more. The new functional trainer will accommodate all exercises, including the exercises that the removed equipment provided.

**PRCC Awards Night:** Staff coordinated the 2011-NOV-09 Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission awards night where local athletes and performers were honored for their achievements.

**Handicap Parking Video:** Staff have created an educational video on handicap parking. The production of a video was a great learning experience but a challenge. Staff will work with the Accessibility Committee on a distribution plan.

**Electric Car Charging Stations at Beban:** Plans for two electric car charging stations at Beban are underway. The stations have been ordered, location chosen and signage designed. Installation is slated for February. Capital costs for this project were approved by Council after a recommendation from the Transportation Advisory Committee.

**Departure Bay/Kin Hut Programs:** One season after seeking feedback from the Departure Bay neighborhood, staff have achieved moderate success with new programs at Kin Hut and poor success with new programs at the Departure Bay Activity Centre. They are reevaluating continuing with many of the new programs. They also met with their managers to discuss the future of these facilities.

**Arts Alive:** The monthly meeting was held on 2011-DEC-12. Arts Alive have hired Impact Communications to create and maintain their new website and establish a presence on Facebook. A new venue for summer programs is being investigated.

Community Events: Significant community events in the Social Centre, Centennial Building and Beban grounds in November and December included: four blood Donor Clinics, Nanaimo Professional Craft Fair, Nanaimo Pottery Co-op Sale, All Candidates Meeting, Cystic Fibrosis Fundraiser, PRC Christmas Market, Kids International Development Society Fundraiser, Pacific Salmon Foundation Fundraiser, Kiwanis Sunrisers Children's Christmas Party, Kennel Club Obedience Trials and Kennel Club Sanction Match, Aboriginal Signing Ceremony, PRC Teen Dance, Nanaimo Concert Band Christmas Concert, Ballroom Dance Society Dinner and Dance, and New Year's Eve Finale.

**Coho Run:** Staff report that few Coho are returning to the Millstream this season which is disappointing for the Harbour City River Stewards' organization. As a result only one educational workshop was held, with the focus being to seek volunteers for the spring Salmon Fry Release program.

**Diabetes Triathlon:** Staff attended the first meeting a Diabetes Association. Representative arranged to gauge support for a Diabetes Fundraiser Triathlon.




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# Summary of Recreation And Culture Services - October 2011




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

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission receives this Report.

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Historically, the City of Nanaimo operated a number of buses and vans for a variety of programs including summer camps, youth trips and seniors' trips. Over the past few years, Parks, Recreation and Culture made a conscious decision to get out of the transportation business and focus on the delivery of parks and recreation programs.

Over the past year the City has maintained 1 twenty passenger bus which was used approximately 6 times per month for 12 months of the year by Nanaimo Harbour City Seniors trips. In July and August it was used by the special needs camp, and on occasion it was used for other department programs. Since 2009 this pay for use service has seen a steady decline. The Nanaimo Harbour City Seniors Board has been aware of the decline and is in support of the discontinuation of the city bus transportation service. The last Department owned and operated bus was returned to the city yard at the end of the year, and will be disposed of through auction. The programs that have historically required busing will continue with the use of local bus tour companies who have agreed to partner with us in providing the trips for seniors.

# BACKGROUND:

Prior to September 2010 the city owned and operated a fleet of buses. Following an evaluation it was determined that the vehicles sat idle most of the year and were not financially viable at this time, therefore all but one vehicle was sold. The private afterschool care provider operator purchased their own vehicles and summer programs operated on site and also used public transit. One bus remained to operate trips for seniors, other department trips and the special needs camp in July and August. Other than the average of 72 seniors' trips per year and the special needs camp the bus is used less than ten times per year. The bus sat idle for most days each week.

Trips that the department offered to seniors have been popular because they have been unique and responsive to the needs of seniors, and included the option of door to door service. Many who take part in the trips do not drive and found this to be a very convenient added service that commercial companies cannot provide. Seniors will now need to make alternate arrangements to get to and from the center from where the bus leaves.

Report to PRCC – Changes To Ti, Delivery Of The Departments Seniors Bus Trips 2012-JAN-25 Page 2 of 2

The Department is in the recreation and culture business, not the transportation business. The public transportation business is highly regulated and operators require special public transportation licenses, special insurance and qualified drivers. The Department is also ill equipped to handle break downs. When the bus breaks down it is very costly to have it towed, repaired and brought back to Nanaimo. There is also the difficult challenge of finding alternate transportation for a bus load of seniors back to Nanaimo.

As of January 2012 the city no longer owns and operates a public transportation bus and will no longer subsidize vehicle trips. We are still offering trips through private companies who will assume all financial responsibility, licensing, insurance and safety, vehicle breakdowns, booking of venues, admissions and planning. Registration and marketing will continue through the newsletter, and patron registration and payments will continue through the front desk.

- ETA Bus Tours offer ticketed theatre trips ticketed trips to Vancouver and Victoria, contract is in place.
- Tracks Outdoor Adventures INC. offer active senior trips such as hiking, snowshoeing and wine trips, activities are planned contract is in progress.
- The current driver is also investigating the possible purchase of a bus and offering trips.

It is not the Departments' intention to discontinue trips but rather to offer trips in partnership with local bus tour companies. Due to these changes, trips may cost more with a commercial provider, and participants will need to arrange their own rides through handi-dart, taxi or friends.




