Please accept this Plaque of Appreciation as a token of our deep appreciation for your continued support to the Friends of Nanaimo Jazz Society. The following documentation is our final report for the Arts and Cultural Events Grant.

- 1. Name of the Event the event is called ""A Jazz Affair".
- 2. <u>Times and dates of the Event</u> The 2-day event was held Thursday May 29th (all day clinics) and Friday May 30th, 2008 (all days clinics and practices, evening performance).
- 3. <u>Location</u> The clinics and master classes took place at Vancouver Island University. The evening performance, dining and fun activities were held at the Beban Park Auditorium.
- 4. <u>Ages of Participants</u> The performers and students ranged in age from 13 to 17, college students, local professional musicians and the guest musicians. The audience for "A Jazz Affair" ranged in age from early 20s to early 80s.
- 1. The Event The grant of \$2520 generously donated by the Commission helped support the Friends of Nanaimo's third annual "A Jazz Affair". The feature portion of the "Jazz Affair" was an evening performance headlined by Gerald Clayton, Phil Dwyer, Ken Lister and Adam Cormier. Their attendance was made possible through the City of Nanaimo grant. Each musician held multiple student clinics and master classes on Thursday May 29th and Friday May 30th, 2008. At the evening performance, the four musicians played a 45-minute set and later joined the Grade 11 and 12 students during their respective sets and combo performances, adding another dimension to the learning experience. A combo from Nanaimo District Secondary School opened the event and the students stayed for the evening. Decadence, a 10-piece local band, also participated.

A local catering company, Masters Touch Catering, owned and operated by Lisa Garvie, supplied a selection of meals and appetizers. Pacific Produce donated desserts and condiments which were served by the Wellington Secondary Home Economics Class for community service hours and work experience. Pepsi Bottling Co. provided various beverages and The Galley at Frank Crane provided free coffee and tea to guests. The different products were well received by our attendees and all donors indicated that they enjoyed the event and the profile it offered their businesses.

We received increased support from the community in the form of silent and public auction items, advertising and gifts in kind.

3. <u>Location</u> - The clinics were held at Vancouver Island University Music Department Building. This allowed the musicians to break out into small rooms for master classes on their respective instruments. In addition, university music students were able to join the clinics more easily than in

the previous year. We rented two sections and a leisure room at the Beban Social Centre for the evening performances, food sales, and silent auction. Leisure Room 8 was used as a warm-up room and storage area for instruments and equipment.

4. Where were the participants from and how many attended? The audience was largely from the Nanaimo Regional District – Nanaimo, Lantzville, Nanoose, Ladysmith, Qualicum and Parksville - as well as Campbell River, Vancouver, Richmond and as far west as Langley BC. Close to 280 people attended the "Jazz Affair". In addition, students from one elementary and three secondary schools participated in the clinics: 120 from Wellington Secondary, with a delegation of 15 students from Kwalikum Secondary. Invitations to attend the clinics were forwarded to all local high schools with a band program. A total of 30 university students also joined the clinics.

We received broad community support from over 100 businesses, large and small, who contributed silent auction items, advertisement dollars, gifts in kind or scholarship funding. Appendix "A" includes a copy of the thank you list submitted to the local papers. Donors received a Certificate of Appreciation and/or plaques depending on the extent of their support.

5. What did the Arts and Culture Commission funds do for our organization? The grant was used to bring in the musicians for the "Jazz Affair." This year, we were able to include Gerald Clayton (up and coming 24-year old New York jazz pianist and member of the Roy Hargrove Quintet), Phil Dwyer (2008 Juno Saxophonist of the Year), Ken Lister (Canadian award winning bass player and member of the acclaimed Vancouver Ensemble for Jazz Improvisation), and Adam Cormier (alumni of the Wellington Jazz Academy and currently attending the McGill University Schulich School of Music on a 4-year scholarship). The stellar performance by these professional musicians was but a small part of their contribution to the two-day event. They conducted a number of clinics and master classes before a group of elementary, high school and college students. They also jammed with students as they performed during the "Jazz Affair," slipping in without fanfare and building the students confidence as musicians capable of playing beside a professional.

The student enjoyed working with the professionals both in the clinics and on the stage. Some were inspired to extend their musical studies into the summer in the form of Jazz Camps and for graduating students, music at the university level. Four junior students received awards to attend the Vancouver Island University "Malaspina Summer Jazz Academy" while two senior students received bursaries to attend the "by invitation only" Phil Dwyer Academy of Music and Culinary Arts. We used some of our net proceeds to fund scholarships for students in the 2007-2008 school year and have set aside addition scholarship funds for the 2008 -2009 year. Finally, the organization earmarked funds to organize more clinics and workshops for Nanaimo young musicians.

This year, the Society played a big role in organizing the successful "Capturing the Music – School Jazz Programs," a component of the Cultural Capital project of the City of Nanaimo. Selected students from the Nanaimo/Ladysmith School District #68 and Vancouver Island University worked closely with Carmella Luvisotto, Steve Jones, Bryan Stovell to prepare for their performance as the 2008 Cultural Capital Rep Band. They were an integral part of the finale Concert with Hugh Fraser and the Vancouver Ensemble for Jazz Improvisation (VEJI) held April 22 at the Port Theatre to a large audience. Students in the district and at the University also benefitted from a clinic with Fraser and members of his big band.

Funding from the Commission also enabled us to provide the community with affordable entertainment by well-known and internationally acclaimed professional artists without the need to travel to Vancouver or Victoria to watch a great show. Bringing in musicians with international calibre allows our students to come face-to-face with their role models. Learning from the real 'pros' is, for many students, a once in a life-time experience that has influenced them in a positive way.

This event reflects the continued growth of the Friends of Nanaimo Jazz and their endeavours to extend the jazz training of young musicians in the Nanaimo area. Our organization hopes to continue to increase such opportunities and to look for meaningful partnerships to expand the "Jazz

Affair" experience into a local jazz festival with students as a key focus and benefactor of the community-based event.

- 6. How did we acknowledge your contribution? Throughout the event, the City of Nanaimo and Cultural Capital logos were prominently placed on advertisements and posters. In any media coverage we received, we indicated the amount of money you provided us and how it would pay to bring in high profile jazz musicians to work with the students. Because of your early commitment, we were able to secure our musicians quickly and profile them with the community and community businesses. This helped us secure support and sponsorship from other organizations. Please see copies of an advertisement, article and poster in the appendix.
 - 7. What are the future plans for the Friends of Nanaimo Jazz Society? Some money will be reserved to seed the 4th Annual Jazz Affair on May 28-29, 2009 and the balance will fund our Music Enrichment Programs. Clinics contribute to the high level of performance our local students are capable of delivering locally, nationally and internationally. We work closely with VIU, the Port Theatre and other community arts organizations to bring in musicians to Nanaimo. Where there is a fit with local music programs, we attempt to bring in musicians already travelling to Nanaimo to conduct clinics. This enables our Society to leverage the art dollars spent in the community.

We will continue to support the 'after school' Musicians-in-Training Summer Waterfront Jazz program. Students will be playing at various community events throughout the year as they have in the past. The sole purpose of our organization is to enhance jazz music and musicianship in Nanaimo, building a musical legacy, and advancing Nanaimo as a jazz destination in the Pacific Northwest. We will begin planning our fourth Jazz Affair this fall. The location will remain the same and we plan to hold it on May 28th and 29th, 2009.

Finally, we envision the Jazz Affair growing. We hope to build it into a multi-day event, an annual Nanaimo event geared to young musicians. Our goal is a young people's festival with clinics and performances taking place over several days and at several venues. We picture the musicians we bring for clinics and the alumni of Nanaimo music programs participating in Jazz-Only Evenings at Nanaimo' pubs and lounges, and students playing at public venues. We want the Jazz Affair to celebrate Nanaimo's wealth of talent, exposing even more Nanaimoites and our tourist visitors to the talent of the young musicians in town.


A Jazz Affair 2008 Old Havana Media Report – June 2008

The Regular Meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

2. <u>INTRODUCTION OF LATE ITEMS:</u>

- (b) Community Plan for Public Art.

3. <u>ADOPTION OF AGENDA:</u>

It was moved and seconded that the Agenda be adopted as circulated. The motion carried unanimously.

4. <u>ADOPTION OF MEETING NOTES</u>

(a) Meeting Notes of the Regular Cultural Committee Meeting held Wednesday, 2008-Jul-07, at 4:00 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Bowen Park Complex.

It was moved and seconded that the Meeting Notes be adopted as circulated. The motion carried unanimously.

5. **DELEGATIONS**:

It was moved and seconded that the Delegations be permitted to address the Cultural Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

(a) Ed Poli, Executive Director, and Ian Niameth, President, Nanaimo Art Gallery, addressed the Cultural Committee regarding proposed events around the unveiling of the E.J. Hughes Mural in the Vancouver Island Conference Centre.

The Art Gallery is proposing a 10-day to two week exhibit of E.J. Hughes works after the unveiling of the mural in late March of 2009. Events would include educational workshops on the subject of E.J. Hughes. A 45 – 55 minute documentary of the restoration of the mural and E. J. Hughes' life is being created and will be released during the event. The final frame of the video will include the unveiling.

Heffels Fine Art has expressed an interest in holding an auction in conjunction with the unveiling.

This is a destination event for Nanaimo. It will be a public celebration, with a ticketed reception for sponsors/donors, etc.

6. REPORTS ON ADVISORY BODIES

- (a) Art In Public Places Project Committee.
 - (i) Port Theatre Marquee. This project is no longer going forward.
 - (ii) Diana Krall Plaza. The entry way public art piece will be installed in the fall of 2008. Staff will invite Kirsty MacDonald to the next Cultural Committee meeting for an update.

 Cultural Awards nomination form has been e-mailed to local cultural organizations. The deadline for the return of these applications is 2008-OCT-03.

The next two Snuneymuxw First Nation's portals to be unveiled will be at Jacks Point and on Newcastle Island.

The Arts of Momentum, a collaborative exhibition of professional artists from Nanaimo and the Chinese Artists Association, will be held 2008-Oct-30 to 2008-Nov-02 at the Vancouver Island Conference Centre (VICC), and from 2008-Nov-04 to 2008-Nov-16 at the Nanaimo Art Gallery (downtown).

The Living Our Culture Cabaret will be held 2009-Jan-31 at Beban Park. This event has been re-scheduled from its October, 2008, date.

- (b) <u>E.J. Hughes Mural B. Kuhn.</u> The Cultural Committee is very excited about the unveiling of the E.J. Hughes Mural at VICC. The collaboration with the Nanaimo Art Gallery on the events surrounding the unveiling will be very beneficial to both groups, as well as the City.

1. CALL THE OPEN MEETING TO ORDER:

The Regular Meeting was called to order at 4:00 p.m.

ADOPTION OF AGENDA:

It was moved and seconded that the Agenda be adopted as circulated. The motion carried unanimously.

ADOPTION OF MEETING NOTES

Meeting Notes of the Regular Cultural Committee Meeting held Wednesday, 2008-SEP-03, at 4:00 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Bowen Park Complex. Two motions were omitted from item 7(b) of Staff Reports, and should be added as follows:

It was moved and seconded that the City of Nanaimo investigate having a copyright on the E.J. Hughes Mural. The motion carried unanimously.

It was moved and seconded that images of the E.J. Hughes Mural be made and used on promotional material, to be sold by the City of Nanaimo, with proceeds going to Art in Public Places.

It was moved and seconded that the Meeting Notes be adopted as amended. The motion carried unanimously.

DELEGATIONS:

It was moved and seconded that the Delegations be permitted to address the Cultural Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

(a) Kirsty MacDonald, Parks and Open Space Planner, addressed the Cultural Committee regarding the draft Public Art Inventory, the proposal by the Lion's Society for Spirit Eagles, and Diana Krall Plaza upgrade.

Ms. MacDonald distributed a draft of Nanaimo's Public Art Inventory. This is a Cultural Capital of Canada ("CCC") project. Focus group discussions and a public open house will be held in November. All notes from these sessions will be posted on the CCC website at http://www.nanaimoculturalcapital.ca.

Ms. MacDonald presented a proposal from the Lion's Society for Spirit Eagles in the City. These are similar to the Orca and Spirit Bears. The Eagles are 7 ½ feet in height and are made of white, formed fibreglass. Artists bid on completing the artwork for the eagle. The cost per eagle is \$5,000, with \$1,000 going to the artist, and the remaining \$4,000 covering construction, transportation and the footings for the statue. The Eagle would be on display from May, 2009 until the Olympics in 2010. At that time the Eagle would be auctioned off. McGregor Park or the Port Authority at the cruise ship entrance were suggested locations. Ms. MacDonald will contact the Port Authority to see if they have considered a Spirit Eagle at their location.

The entrance art for Diana Krall Plaza is constructed and being fabricated. The grand opening of the Plaza will be held early in the new year or the spring of 2009. Improvements will be made to the entire plaza.

Questions were raised as to the signage for Diana Krall Plaza and the size of the lettering on that sign.

Ms. MacDonald will e-mail information and pictures regarding Diana Krall Plaza and the Spirit Eagles to the Cultural Committee, for discussion at their next meeting.

(b) Representatives from the Nanaimo Arts Council reported on Art in the Park 2008 and projects they are involved in.

Art in the Park was held on weekends from May to September in 2008. Artwork, jewellery, glasswork, etc. was sold. Live artists performed on four weekends. The Arts Council was in contact with the Songwriters' Guild, and received a good response to a request for artists. The Arts Council wishes to continue managing Art in the Park in the future.

The Arts Council has been involved with the Heritage Building Photography and Painting event.

The Vancouver Island Film Festival had 60 applicants, with 20 films being shown. 500 spectators were in attendance.

Nine local professional artists will be on stage at the Port Theatre. There is limited seating for this performance.

The Arts Council thanked the Cultural Committee and the City for their operational funding. They would like to move their business to a downtown location for better exposure.

It was moved and seconded that the delegation be received. The motion carried unanimously.

5. REPORTS ON ADVISORY BODIES

(a) Art In Public Places Project Committee - Diana Krall Public Art.

The Cultural Committee is concerned that the lettering on the Diana Krall Plaza sign is so large that it will become the focal point of the plaza instead of the Art In Public Places statue.

Recommendation: That the Cultural Committee recommend that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission direct staff to erect a plaque instead of the Diana Krall Plaza lettering at Diana Krall Plaza.

It was moved and seconded that the recommendation be adopted. The motion carried unanimously.

A private opening will be held 2008-Oct-30 at 6:00 p.m., with the public being welcome to attend at 7:00 p.m.

The next Snuneymuxw First Nation's portals to be unveiled will be at Jacks Point and on Newcastle Island. A Salmon Petroglyph will be transported from the old Museum site to Jack Point. There will be a private salmon ceremony at the site, with a dinner planned at a later date for all involved. The Newcastle Island portal will include a small stage theatre, which will hold 15 seats, for story telling.

(b) Art in the Park – B. Kuhn. This was relatively successful. More of a variety of artists and artwork would have enhanced the project.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Recreation Committee unanimously agreed that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission approve and recommend to Council funding the Nanaimo Bridge Club \$3,000 for their Regional Bridge Tournament through the Tourism and Festival Fund.

BACKGROUND:

Tournament and Festival Grant applications are awarded November 01 and May 01 of each calendar year. In 2008, there was \$20,150 of available funding. Unallocated 2008 funds of \$4,950 are still available for community group funding.

On 2008-Sep-05 the Nanaimo Bridge Club submitted a late funding application for \$3,000 in support of their Regional Bridge Tournament, to be held in Nanaimo from 2008-Oct-13 to 2008-Oct-19.

The late application was e-mailed to all members of the Recreation Committee, who unanimously agreed to support the Nanaimo Bridge Club's request with funding to come from the remaining 2008 allotment still available in the Tournament and Festival Fund.

RE: 2012 AND 2014 BC SUMMER AND WINTER GAMES

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission recommend to Council that:

- 1. the City apply to host the 2014 BC Summer Games and resolve that an expenditure of \$45,000 cash and \$50,000 in-kind services and facilities be committed if the Games are awarded; and, further, that
- 2. the City request that District 68 School Board resolve to support the Games application as per the bid package requirements.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Government of BC and the BC Games Society has invited communities to host the 2012 or 2014 BC Summer or Winter Games. The Games encompass four days and celebrate community and sport. The Games not only provide athletes an opportunity to compete in a multi-sport event that promotes personal excellence, physical fitness and community pride but also a stepping-stone for higher levels of competition. Nanaimo hosted the BC Summer Games in 1985 and 2002.

BACKGROUND:

Nanaimo has effectively hosted BC Games over the years. The Summer Games involve 3,600 participants and officials and will require that same number of volunteers. The Games have an estimated direct economic impact of \$1.79 to \$2.2 million dollars in the host community. The Ministry of Healthy Living and Sport, through the BC Games Society will provide approximately \$600,000 for the administration and operation of the Games.

A bid to host these games will require a formal application to be submitted prior to 2008-DEC-15. Two significant items to be included in the application are outlined below.

- 1. A resolution from City Council indicating support of the bid application. This resolution should include support for a financial contribution of at least \$45,000, and a minimum of \$50,000 in additional in-kind services and facilities.
- A resolution from the District 68 School Board stating support for the Games and a willingness to
 provide free of charge, the necessary school facilities that are required for competition and
 accommodation purposes, and the necessary school buses for transportation of participants
 during the Games.

RE: MONTHLY REPORT FOR JULY/AUGUST 2008 - PARKS OPERATIONS

The following highlights are the park initiatives for July/August 2008. Regular maintenance tasks are not listed.

PARK DEVELOPMENT AND SPECIAL PROJECTS

- Detailed design work is almost complete for the Maffeo Sutton Park Spirit Square (95%).
 These plans will be shared with key stakeholders and finalized in October. The tender package will go out to contractors this fall. The City has received an extension until June 2009 to complete the Spirit Square Project.
- Eight focus groups were held for the Community Public Art Plan. The focus groups were intended to open up discussions about public art among City Council, Staff and committees, artists, art administrators, neighbourhood associations, design professionals, and the development community. An open house will be organized in November as the next step in the process.
- The installation of the Diana Krall Plaza improvements and Songbird public art piece will be tendered to contractors in October.
- Equipment removal and site preparation has begun at Deverill Square Park. Phase 2 of the Park Improvement Plan includes development of an accessible new playground and the equipment should be installed by mid October. This project was partially funded with a grant from the Rick Hansen Society.
- Phase 1 improvements to Loudon Park are complete. A grand opening for the Loudon Park Fishing Float will be planned for October.
- The Interpretive and Wellness Trail at Oliver Woods is under construction. Fundraising for the wellness components is underway.

VOLUNTEER IN PARKS (VIP)

- The Nob Hill neighbourhood installed their playground on 2008-Sep-20 and are enjoying both the playground and the new lights in their park (Phase 1 improvements as identified in the Park Improvements Plan). Over 25 volunteers showed up for the installation day and six downtown restaurants donated food to sustain the volunteers.
- The Cosgrove Crescent neighbourhood has taken over the maintenance of a local traffic circle and had a block party in the traffic circle in early September.
- The Carmanah Park neighbours are reviewing playground designs for equipment installation at their park
- Improvements to Kinette Evergreen Park are complete and the neighbourhood is very thankful for the assistance in installing their new benches and improving their kiosk and equipment.
- New playground equipment has been installed in a number of parks that required non-CSA compliant equipment to be removed including: Parkway, Staffordshire, Theresa Terrace, Bob-O-Link, and Country Club #2 Parks.

SPORTS, TOURISM AND OUTDOOR EVENTS

Recreation Coordinator Highlights

- Sports Camps have generated \$49,000 in revenue to date. 1,025 spots were available in sports camps this summer. Of this, 790 spots were filled. This was a 77% registration rate.
- To date the Block Party kit has been booked 6 times.
- The 2008-Jul-19 Parks Day event was overall a great event. Changes will be made to next year's event to encourage higher attendance.
- 8 interpretive signs were installed on the Millstone Side Channel for Parks Day. They
 featured information about the salmon lifecycle. The final 10 interpretive signs will be
 installed in Bowen Park September 2008.
- On 2008-Jul-24, a BBQ, hockey skills stations and inter-squad game event was held during the BC Hockey Best Ever Camp.
- Planning and organization is well underway for the 2008 Terry Fox Run that will be held at Beban Park on 2008-Sep-14.
- Staff are planning a small open house for the new boat house at Brechin in early fall.

Manager of Sports Tourism and Outdoor Events Highlights

- 24 major special events were held in Maffeo Sutton Park this past summer (Jun e to September). There were no major concerns this year from event organizers. All events saw an increase in attendance as a result of the fabulous weather.
- Serauxman Field on Third Street will be upgraded to a Class 'A' field with the opening of the Rotary Field House in early October.
- The Fall/Winter User Group meeting was held on 2008-Jul-30 with all groups' needs being met.
- An e-mail was forwarded to all sports groups notifying them of the upcoming deadline (2008-Nov-01) for Tournament and Festival Grants.
- Work is starting with community groups on the possibility of Nanaimo putting in bids to host a major Lacrosse Tournament and a World Old Timers Hockey Tournament in 2010.
- Community contacts include High School Football Provincials, EJ Hughes Celebration, Bridge Tournament, Nanaimo Half Marathon, Under 17 Hockey & Destination Nanaimo.

Marketing

- The Parks, Recreation & Culture Marketing Strategy being prepared by the Howe Group is nearing completion. Department presentations are being scheduled for October.
- Hiring of the Marketing and Communications Specialist is in progress, testing is complete and interviews will commence shortly.
- The Parks, Recreation and Culture jingle used for radio promotions will be revised for the upcoming year.
- Contacts include: the Nanaimo News Bulletin; Harbour Living.ca; the Daily News; Howe Group; and, several sales people.

TRAIL DEVELOPMENT

- Stairs at Stephenson Point completed.
- · Concrete stairs at Serauxmen Sports Field installed.
- New sign posts for interpretive signs in Bowen installed.
- The Third Street Trail project was awarded to Fournier Excavating and construction begins the week of 2008-Sep-08.

MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION

- Port Theatre window replacement Phase One now completed including sealing of concrete.
- Nob Hill Playground removal complete. New playground will be installed by end of September.
- Frank Crane gondola remodelling is now complete.
- Frank Crane Clipper divider wall installed as per Minor Hockey requirements.
- Progress continues on the Rotary Field House at Serauxman Fields with opening scheduled for November. Kitchen cabinets, flooring, painting are nearing completion.

UTILITY

- Pump motor for water troughs at Swy-A-Lana Lagoon has been rebuilt.
- Pump at Italian Fountain has been replaced.
- New electrical building for Pleasant Valley Sports Field has been completed.
- New raft was installed at Colliery Dam.
- New perimeter drainage was installed at Harry Wipper Sports Field.
- New posts and sleeves were installed at Harry Wipper Sports Field entrance.
- Installation of new kitchen at Departure Bay Activity Hall continues.
- New floating aerator fountains have been ordered for the Bowen Park Duck Pond.
- New water line and sink have been installed at the new barnyard at Beban.
- Tree irrigation has been installed at Sierra Way Park.
- Irrigation extensions were installed at Cliff Street and at Bowen East.

HORTICULTURE AND SPORTS FIELDS

- Major reorganization of the Harewood Yard took place during this period.
- Blackberries removed along the bank at Georgia Park behind Tom Brown's Auto Repair building.
- Replanting of native species along the Third Street Marsh is complete.
- Page fencing has been installed between the Serauxmen baseball fields and the wildlife area.
- Re-landscaping of Lions Square Park is complete.
- Marathon Athletic has repaired the seam at Merle Logan.
- 13 loads of beach sand were brought into Westwood Lake to top up the first beach.
- Work is ongoing in Beaufort Park removing blackberries and reclaiming the park.

The following highlights are the park initiatives for September 2008. Regular maintenance tasks are not listed.

PARK DEVELOPMENT AND SPECIAL PROJECTS

- The installation of the Diana Krall Plaza improvements and Songbird public art piece will be sent out for contractor bids in October. Planning for the opening event in spring 2009 is also underway.
- Drafting of the Public Art Plan is continuing with public input scheduled for an open house in November as the next step in the process.
- Phase 1 improvements to Loudon Park are complete. A grand opening for the Loudon Park Fishing Float is planned for the morning of 2008-OCT-16. All donors to the project are invited.
- The Interpretive and Wellness trail at Oliver Woods is under construction.
 Fundraising for the wellness components is underway and staff are meeting with the three wellness equipment suppliers.
- Improvements to the Millstone Nature Trail in Bowen Park are being planned for this fall. In addition, designs for the outdoor classroom are underway.
- Rotary Field House completion underway Open House scheduled for 2008-Nov-06.

VOLUNTEER IN PARKS (VIP)

- The Carmanah Park neighbours are aiming for a fall playground install date.
- Neighborhoods are expressing interest in public art projects under VIP (including the South End Community Association, Protection Island Ratepayers Association, and Nob Hill Neighbourhood).

SPORTS, TOURISM AND OUTDOOR EVENTS

Recreation Coordinator Highlights

- 2008-SEP-14 was the annual Terry Fox Run. 200 people participated with over \$4000 raised for cancer research.
- 2008-SEP-27 was the open house for the Nanaimo Rescue Station and Community Paddling Dock. Approximately 60 people attended.
- 18 sign frames have been installed in Bowen Park and are waiting for interpretive signage to be complete.
- A presentation was made to VIU Recreation Tourism students about the Millstone Side Channel and Bowen Park. Staff are planning to host a special event for schools on Friday, 2008-NOV-14 in partnership with VIU in Bowen Park and Millstone Side Channel.

Manager of Sports Tourism and Outdoor Events Highlights

- Serauxman Field on Third Street will be upgraded to a Class 'A' field with the opening of the Rotary Field House in late October. The Rotary Field House meeting room is expected to open in early November.
- Work is starting with community groups on the possibility of Nanaimo putting in bids to host the Minto Lacrosse Tournament (2010).
- Staff worked with Old Timers Hockey on the possibility of putting in a bid on the CARHA World Hockey Challenge; the organization decided not to pursue the bid.

Marketing

- The Parks, Recreation & Culture Marketing Strategy being prepared by the Howe Group is nearing completion. Department presentations have been scheduled for 2008-NOV-04.
- Hiring of the Marketing and Communications Specialist is complete. Hannah King will start on 2008-NOV-03.
- Staff assisted with the following openings; Brechin Boat House, Loudon Park Fishing Float and Rotary Field House.
- A media event is planned for AED's in public recreation facilities.
- Promotions for the Under 17 World Hockey Tournament have started and will continue until late December.
- A time sensitive 2 for 1 coupons for out of town sport and cultural events has been developed.

TRAIL DEVELOPMENT

 The Trails staff have completed the fall trail cutting and clearing and will be repeating the process as the leaves collect on the pathways.

MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION

- The Salmon Petroglyph from the old Museum site has been returned to its original location at Jack Point. The 10 ton Petroglyph was loaded onto a barge then lifted to the site. This is the second of the three "Portals To Our Heritage" in partnership between Nanaimo Cultural Capitals and the Snuneymuxw First Nation.
- The play equipment at Parkway Park has been relocated and new equipment installed.
- Nob Hill Phase 1 has been completed. All old play equipment has been removed, new equipment installed and new lamps installed on the trail way.
- Deverill Square Park Phase 1 has started. All equipment including the water park has been removed with new play equipment being installed before the end of October.
- The kitchen in Departure Bay Activity Hall has been totally remodelled. The old cabinets were removed, new flooring installed and staff built and installed new cabinets.

UTILITY

- New sinks were installed in the Departure Bay Activity Centre.
- New irrigation was installed at Robins Park.
- A lockable water and electrical connection was installed on the new Community Paddling Dock. This is for the Canoe and Kayak Club to use for washing off boats and providing temporary power.
- Two replacement aeration pumps are being replaced at Bowen Park. The old ones had been in place for 2 years but were recently stolen.
- Winterizing of all irrigation systems is underway. The process will take 4 6 weeks to complete.

HORTICULTURE AND SPORTS FIELDS

TURF AND PARKS:

- Robins baseball diamond was realigned and built to new league specifications. This
 included moving home plate back 20 ft. and then reconstructing the infield, installing
 baselines and a skinned infield.
- Shoreline and Parkway Parks were cleaned.

HORTICULTURE:

- Horticulture staff has been scheduling work around the cruise ship season.
- Jingle Pot Marsh work continues with volunteers to continue tree planting in the marsh.
- Crews spent one day at Beban Participark and removed broom from two-thirds of the parks perimeter.
- Hanging baskets are slowly being removed with the full removal slated for 2008-October-13.
- Gardeners are beginning to remove their summer displays and replace some areas with fall/winter displays.
- Training for staff this past month: traffic safety and excavating around gas lines.

URBAN FORESTRY

- The Urban Forestry Coordinator attended the 8th Canadian Urban Forestry Conference in Sherwood Park Alberta during the week of 2008-SEP-22 to 2008-SEP-26. Information regarding Urban Forest Plans and Strategies was gathered at the conference.
- The Urban Forestry Coordinator is now a Certified Tree Risk Assessor. This course is organized and recognized by the International Society of Arboriculture and Work Safe BC.
- The draft Urban Forest Plan is in final stages of editing and will be presented to the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission for their review at their regular meeting on 2008-November 26.
- Four Tree Removal Permits were processed.
- Five Tree Management Plans are presently under review.
- Seventy-four phone calls were received resulting in site visits to thirty-seven sites to deal with concerns or complaints.

PROGRAMS

The Parks, Recreation and Culture Fall/Winter Leisure Guide was distributed on 2008-Aug-20. In the first 30 days over 9100 registrations were processed, an increase of over 2000 from 2007! Use of IREG (our online registration system) accounted for over 33 percent of registrations.

Throughout the summer, summer camp registration was strong. Each camp ran at over 95 percent full, with an average of 26 campers per week per program.

Six Concerts in the Park were held at Swy-A-Lana during July and August and averaged 188 spectators at each concert. The call for performers went out earlier in the year, and applicants provided a resume and sample of music. The program strives to present a myriad of music styles for a range of listeners.

Beban Barnyard (formerly known as Bowen Barnyard) opened 2008-Jun-30 at the Beban VIEX Barns, and operated with a 50% increase in attendance over 2007.

Aquatics at the Nanaimo Aquatic Centre, Beban Park Pool, and Westwood Lake were very busy during the summer. Nanaimo Aquatic Centre (NAC) and Beban Pool were busy on rainy days, and Westwood Lake was hopping on those hot, sunny days. 34 residents participated in a Junior Lifeguard camp and 108 swimmers enjoyed Camp S, which is an aquatics-based camp, run by the Riptides.

Beginning 2008-Sep-12, the Friday night swim from 8:30 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. will be for teens only. Beban Pool hours on these nights will be extended to 10:00 p.m. to accommodate non-teens wishing to swim.

Swimming lesson registration was up for the summer season with 955 swimmers enrolled for the summer months (compared to 778 in 2007).

1,855 Bowen Seniors Memberships have been sold to date. In mid-August the registration rate was reduced by 50%. Throughout July and August, an average of 110 members attended the weekly Thursday Special Event at Bowen Park. Bowen Seniors are fundraising toward the development of a seniors' wellness park to be located at Oliver Woods Community Centre.

BC Best Ever U17 Hockey Camp was held at Nanaimo Ice Centre 2008-Jul-20 to 2008-Jul-26, with a U17 promotional inter-squad game on 2008-Jul-24. Due to high demand, a summer hockey school held in partnership with Nanaimo Minor Hockey had a second session added. Summer skating lesson attendance was excellent and client evaluations were very positive.

450 were in attendance on 2008-Jul-17 at Departure Bay Spray Park for a Free Family Fun Night, held with a carnival theme. 250 residents attended the second Free Family Fun Night at Deverill Park. The theme for that event was "Let the Games Begin".

Playgrounds closed 2008-Aug-22. Attendance was up in July, with August on par with last year.

The Mother's Unite Garage Sale sold out with 72 tables booked.

The City of Nanaimo and Alternative Groove partnered in hosting a *Lord of the Lines* Skateboarding Event on 2008-Jul-18 at the Centennial Building. 50 youth participated. A Youth Information Resource Guide is being displayed at City facilities, identifying youth agencies and organizations in the City, and includes a 2 for 1 pass for recreation facilities.

PROJECTS

185 ticket packages have been sold to date for the U17 World Hockey Challenge.

During the regular maintenance shutdown in August for Beban Pool, the office received an ergonomic reconfiguration of the side wickets, installation of a customer information board, moving a display cabinet in the lobby and repainting of Beban Pool lobby.

Maintenance shutdowns were completed in Nanaimo Ice Centre, Beban Park Pool and Frank Crane Arena/Cliff McNabb Arena. Gondola renovations in Frank Crane were completed. Safety inspections were done in all department facilities. Chlorine evacuation procedures were finalized.

Departure Bay Hall will have a kitchen renovation completed by the second week in September.

PROGRAMS

Swimming lesson registration continues to hold its own with 745 swimmers enrolled for the month of September (compared to 670 in September 2007). 2007 numbers did not include lifesaving courses or private lessons. Beginning 2008-SEP-12, the Friday night swim began from 8:30 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. for teens only. Beban Pool hours on these nights will be extended to 10:00 p.m. to accommodate non-teens wishing to swim. The White Rapids did an excellent job of managing Kin Pool over the summer. Westwood Lake had an extension added to the wheelchair ramp that went deeper in the water, allowing better access for patrons.

1,173 people registered in Arena programs between 2008-AUG-20 and SEP-30. Staff met with lacrosse organizations to plan for seasonal floor space.

1,955 Bowen Seniors Memberships have been sold to date, this is the most memberships sold in a single year in 15 years. Bowen Seniors and staff are working together to give the Bowen Billiards Room a facelift with new light, paint, furniture and scoreboards. The Seniors Board held a general meeting on 2008-SEP-10, at which time they voted to change the name from Bowen Park Seniors to Nanaimo Harbour City Seniors.

45 preschool programs started in September with 403 participants.

A new kiln has been purchased for the Pottery Room at Bowen Park.

Over 200 attended a "Meeting the Guidelines" workshop on 2008-SEP-10 at Bowen Complex. This included school administrators, Parent Advisory Committee members, teachers and department staff. The focus was for concession and vending operators to demonstrate how they will meet the new nutritional guidelines imposed by the School District and the City.

School District 68 has offered to pay \$1,450 for the printing of the Youth Information Resource Guide. The Ministry of Child and Family Development – Child and mental Health have shown interest in supporting the third printing of the Guide.

Canadian Tire has increased funding for the Jumpstart program by \$2,000, which will make total contribution for 2008 of \$7,500.

The Mother's Unite Garage Sale sold out with 72 tables booked.

Staff are working with Community School Co-ordinators at Georgia Avenue and Fairview to offer Baby Ballet, Dance Sampler, Soccer Tots and Basketball in those schools.

Department staff, British Columbia Recreation and Parks Association, the Heart & Stroke Foundation and Sport Med BC are working together to host a full day walking seminar at Beban Park on 2008-OCT-30.

Arts' Alive has had their contract re-written with the City of Nanaimo to bring it into alignment with all non-profit organizations.

PROJECTS

Cultural Capital of Canada Projects include 10th anniversary celebrations of the Port Theatre were held during September. An Open House was held 2008-Sep-14, Evening of the Next Generation of Performers 2008-Sep-17, and the 10th Anniversary Gala, 2008-SEP-20. The next two Snuneymuxw First Nation's portals to be unveiled will be at Jacks Point and on Newcastle Island. The Arts of Momentum, a collaborative exhibition of professional artists from Nanaimo and the Chinese Artists Association, will be held 2008-Oct-30 to 2008-NOV-02 at the Vancouver Island Conference Centre (VICC), and from 2008-Nov-04 to 2008-NOV-16 at the Nanaimo Art Gallery (downtown). The Sports Hall of Fame opened 2008-SEP-20 at the VICC.

Automatic Emergency Defibrillator (AED) training has been completed by a large majority of department staff, with the AED's being available at Bowen Complex and Oliver Woods Community Centre ("OWCC") for staff and the public.

Hannah King has been hired as the department Marketing and Communications Specialist. Ms. King will start 2008-NOV-03. The Howe Group has been preparing the Parks, Recreation and Culture Marketing Strategy and it is schedule for presentation on 2008-NOV-04. Grand opening in the immediate future are for Brechin Boat House, Loudon Park Fishing Float and Rotary Field House.

Elizabeth Williams will now manage the LiveSite screen, with Tammy Toor creating slides and programs for the screen. The Information Technology department will continue to care for the technical aspects and maintenance of the LiveSite.

Final purchases for Oliver Woods Community Centre ("OWCC") are being made, which include front office signage, protective covers for score clocks, window coverings in the gym, and some additional equipment.

The U17 World Hockey Challenge was promoted at the 2008-SEP-26 Nanaimo Clipper game. 205 ticket packages have been sold to date for the U17 World Hockey Challenge. Two games take place each day on 08-DEC-29 and 2009-JAN-03. A wide range of activities is planned between games on each day.

The new Serauxmen Fieldhouse meeting room, which will be allocated in the same manner as department activity centres, will be ready for use in late October.

A. Narrative:

In addition to established programs, the NAC has began to implement the strategic plan developed in March 2008. Over the past months the NAC has:

- 5) confirmed plans for our 40th anniversary celebrations including insert in our community newspaper, the Nanaimo News Bulletin, that will focus on NAC history and contributions;

Submitted by the Nanaimo Arts Council [NAC] for the 3rd Quarter 2008

A. Narrative:

In addition to established programs, the NAC has began to implement the strategic plan developed in March 2008. Over the past months the NAC has:

- 1) Begun to exhibit work of Associate Members re: Downtown Nanaimo Partnership co project to ensure that artists experiencing financial hardship have the opportunity to show/promote their work;
- 2) continued our speaker/workshop series, entitled Creative Currents (September Drift Through Short Fiction Mel Dagg, October Rainbow Medicine Dance Angela Thurston)
- 3) celebrated our 40th anniversary celebrations including insert in our community newspaper, the Nanaimo News Bulletin, that will focus on NAC history and contributions, an afternoon of arts presentations and a dinner at the Firehouse Grill attended by Mayor Korpin etc. (see attached newsletter and Bulletin insert)
- 4) opened for the Port Theatre 'Random Acts' series with BC150 project funds received through the Assembly of BC Arts Councils Key of Three Integrating Arts: Legacies of our past portals to the future. Working with our organizational partners and local artists, we will engage in the new branch of the arts presently being fostered through the Canada Council for the Arts entitled Integrated Arts. This is defined as artistic works, practices, programming and events that combine art forms, or integrate existing art forms into a new form including interdisciplinary content, multidisciplinary content and multidisciplinary structure. We will work with three groups of three artists who practice in three different disciplines in order to develop three pieces that juxtapose their traditional disciplines in a new way and create an innovative dialogue about the potential for Integrated Arts. Performances have been booked with the Port Theatre for their Random Acts series (see program attached);
- 5) completed Art in the Park with vendors Saturdays/Sundays and holidays and entertainment opening/closing days and holidays, and reported to the Culture Committee re this and other initiatives;
- 6) launched 4th annual Vancouver Island Short Film Festival;
- 7) maintained and expanded popular seasonal and feature shows at the NAC gallery and completed season change over of art at the Port Theatre and Lighthouse Bistro;
- 8) held a successful Heritage Building painting/photography event in partnership with the Nanaimo Heritage Commission;
- 9) continued discussions re: renting office space downtown and establishing gallery / arts centre downtown.
