OVERVIEW

Purpose of Report

To provide an update to the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee on the public feedback regarding the request for an off-leash area at Nob Hill Park and recommendations for moving forward with park improvements.

Recommendation

That the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee:

- 1. not support the dog off-leash option at Nob Hill Park;
- 2. continue to look for downtown dog off-leash sites through new park acquisition processes; and,
- 3. approve the updated Nob Hill Park Improvement Plan for implementation.

BACKGROUND

The City of Nanaimo has received a petition and request from the residents of the Nob Hill neighborhood to create a dog off-leash park in Nob Hill Park.

There are currently twelve dog off-leash parks in Nanaimo. The current off-leash sites are geographically distributed throughout Nanaimo and are varying in character and amenities. The downtown core does not have any off leash facilities.

Most of the current off-leash sites were introduced as one-year pilot projects between 2008 and 2012. After the one year pilot period for each, a public re-assessment was completed before the current off-leash parks were made permanent by the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Public Input Session:

A public input session was held on Tuesday, 2016-JAN-19, from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. in the Vancouver Island Conference Centre to discuss the off-leash proposal. About 60 people attended over the three hour session. A summary of the input received is presented in Attachment A.



Survey:

A survey regarding the issue was available for the public to fill out at the open house and online for over two months. The survey was filled out by 178 respondents and presented 3 locations in the Park for the potential off-leash area. Full survey results are presented in Attachment B.

Responses to the dog off-leash park proposal were overall very mixed with 58.6% of respondents supporting the idea of an off-leash site at Nob Hill Park and 41.4% of respondents not supporting the idea.

Common concerns at Nob Hill Park included fencing of the site and user conflicts, maintaining the open character of the site, the potential for environmental degradation of the Park, and parking.

Overall, there was a desire to have an off-leash location in the downtown core. However, the City has very few site alternative options. Staff did contact the South End Neighbourhood Association to discuss potential off-leash use at Deverill Square Park, but the board of the South end Neighbourhood association was not supportive of this idea.

Future park acquisition along the South Nanaimo Waterfront and in the downtown area could possibly incorporate dog off-leash facilities.

Park Improvement Plans:

2008, the City of Nanaimo and the Nob Hill Neighbourhood Association conducted a park improvement process for Nob Hill Park. The improvements were intended to rejuvenate recreational use in this park. It was hoped that increased activity and improved physical structure would deter criminal activity from occurring and would contribute to a healthy and well-used green space. Some of the initial improvements were accomplished between 2008-2009, however some were not.

Desires for more park improvements have come to light through the recent open house discussions, input from staff and residents, and survey responses. Requests for additional lighting along Milford Crescent, additional summer programming and infrastructure, and Park gateways and fencing came to light through the public input.

An updated park improvement plan is attached to this report in Attachment C to reflect the desires of the community. It is being recommended that this plan be budgeted for and implemented to continue with efforts to build capacity and improve this neighborhood.



OPTIONS

- 1. Approve all of the recommendations.
 - **Budget Implication:** Future improvements will require budget allocation in the 10-year capital plan.
 - **Policy Implication:** An updated park vision and improvement plan will provide some direction and vision for future park development and future dog off-leash park programs.
 - Engagement Implication: Public engagement has already been completed and was very mixed.
 - **Strategic Plan Implication:** The park asset should meet changing community needs and demands.
- 2. Deny all of the recommendations.
 - Budget Implication: No budget impact.
 - **Engagement Implication:** Public engagement did request additional off-leash options and improvements to Nob Hill Park.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: If not improved, the park asset may not meet the changing needs of the community.
- 3. Approve some of the recommendations.
 - Budget Implication: Will vary depending on what is approved.
 - Policy Implication: Will vary depending on what is approved.
 - Engagement Implication: State implication here, otherwise delete.

SUMMARY POINTS

- Public feedback regarding the idea of an off-leash park at Nob Hill was very mixed.
- Public feedback generated many good ideas about ongoing/future park improvements at Nob Hill Park.
- Acquisition and development on an off-leash area in a suitable site in the downtown should be considered in the future to meet community needs.

- Nob Hill is a gem. Please don't destroy it






QUESTION 2:





The "Nob" provides a look-out to the Harbour and the mountains beyond, the warm rocks in the evening to sit, lounge, contemplate, provide solace, to visit, or watch the fireworks with friends and neighbours. The "Nob" contains the most biodiversity in the park, including wild flowers, ferns, shrubs, and plants courtesy of the late guerrilla gardener David Livingston to be torn up, and the area contaminated (regardless of clean-up), and the inevitable odors. The aesthetics of the park would be destroyed.

The lower area proposal, however smaller, limits the enjoyment of all by limiting the open area in the park for those to enjoy robust activities (toss a frisbee - run into a fence), or relax beneath the large fir trees, and of course, the contamination, odors, and destroyed aesthetics.

The park serves a large geographical area, as the nearest parks and playgrounds (to the best of my memory) being Milton and Haliburton Sts. (across Nichol St.), Bay View School, Gyro Comox park, and the Gyro park on Machleary St.

- 1. the park eco system of flora and fauna is fragile and unsuitable to off leash dog behaviour e.g. the moss on the rocky knoll is easily disturbed and takes a great deal of time to re-grow; e.g. the ravens, hawks and owls that frequent the park.
- 2. I believe that humans deserve to get dibs on usage of the park over dogs e.g. the neighbourhood children who play on the awesome equipment you guys installed; e.g. the boys and girls club kids who visit every week, the elders who live in the rest home below and above the park, and also the folks with developmental delays and disabilities who pick up garbage in the park.
- 3. the proposed locations are not effective e.g. on top of the knoll would allow polluted run-off to flow down to the playground; e.g. the other proposed site is on the only level ground in the park which is useful for a multitude of human activities which cannot be done on the rocky part
- 4. The fencing required to make the off leash section safe would ruin the natural beauty of this park.
- 5. Some disrespectful dog owners already use the park as an off leash site and do not follow your off leash rules, and do not clean up after nor supervise their pets, and an official off leash status designation would likely sanction and/or encourage this poor behaviour.
- 6. I have been fiercely growled at and/or been jumped up on by dogs enough times when visiting other Nanaimo parks such as Westwood Lake, Morell Bird Sanctuary and Buttertubs Marsh and I would like to have at least this little park to feel safe from dog interference while I walk, meditate, journal, draw or practice my martial art.
- 7. There are already 12 dog parks in Nanaimo for dogs and their owners to enjoy!

reserve future input

As a 50 year long resident of Nob Hill Park I am opposed to the off-leash proposal. My family is the single biggest property owner in Nob Hill with 27 properties. This is the worst and most reckless proposal for this, the oldest park in B.C. Over my lifetime, the City has neglected this park and the only improvements made to the park have been made by community groups like the Order of Purple who paid for park lighting. As far as the City is concerned, this park has "gone to the dogs" a generation or two ago. Maybe this is an attempt to make it official.

The February, 2015 proposal by Tim Findlay, of the Ashlar Masonic Lodge, for a three-stage park upgrade in collaboration with the city, the neighbourhood and the Masonic Lodge.

Area one is an example of a very precious ecosystem that is not intended to have the traffic associated with a dog off leash park. I am quite shocked that the city parks Recreation and ENVIRONMENT would even consider this space for a dog off leash park! The significant Garry oaks in this park need protection not dogs

There is one family whose home borders the park that accesses the doggie bags the city leaves in the park to clean up after her dog, in her front yard! Today (Dec.13,) at roughly 2pm she sent her kids into the park to retrieve bags she subsequently used in her own yard... 3 times! And she instructed them to bring back 6 each (two kids) and then she sent one back a second time for 10 more! Then to make matters worse, all that crap was then put in the parks garbage container! I clean up after my dog with my own bags and dispose of it at home.



By profession I am a freelance writer, life coach, counselor and educator. My partner (Christle Lowe) and I live roughly 50 meters from the park entrance and the park has been a major part of our lives in our 18 years living at 510 Hecate. I have lived in this part of Nanaimo since moving here to attend the Theatre program at Malaspina College in 1990 and as I said, we have lived in our home for the last 18 years.

My partner and I are both adamantly opposed to having this highly sensitive and beautiful green space turned into a pocket mud pit for dogs. The "mud pit" part is a foregone conclusion once the activity of the dogs strips the fragile covering moss and shallow rooted grasses off of the knoll. As the proposed spot on the upper portion of the park comprises almost 1/3rd of the park area there are a number of community and environmental concerns that prevent this plan from any degree of practical or community oriented viability. As there was an earlier plan to build an outdoor performance space below the rocks the lower area is equally impractical. The upper area of the park, bounded on one side by the play area and by Selby St. and Milford Crescent on the other two sides includes the rocky areas of the park and many of the trees that make the park such a lovely addition to our neighborhood. The trees and rocky areas are a primary play area that is regularly used by a number of local children and by children from the Boys and Girls Club at the south end of Hecate St. As safe play areas are rare in the south end of Nanaimo, turning this one into a dog park is highly questionable from a community stand point.

In addition to my initial concerns regarding this decision I have some equally important concerns about the changes in access to the park that would be required if it were turned into an off leash park.

Currently the park can, with relative safety, be accessed from all sides. Fencing the proposed upper area will result in limited access to the play area by compelling people to walk around the perimeter of the area along Milford Crescent and then up and across the park and around the rocks. This route would be challenging for strollers, toddlers and moms due to the difficulty of the ground and the absence of any kind of a path. The other option for access along Milford Crescent is to follow it north to Robarts St., where there is no side

walk on the park side of the street, and come in the bottom or north side entrance, and then up the entire length of the park to reach the play area. This is an equally challenging route for strollers, toddlers and moms. Once the suggested upper area is fenced the only other option to access the park is to come along Selby St. past the rocks to the north entrance or along the side walk on the south side of Selby. There is currently no crosswalk at the crest of Selby St.

As the local residents know, Selby is a major, high speed "short cut" between Albert St. on the west and Old Victoria Rd. on the east. Further complicating things is the "blind" crest of Selby St. and the recent increase in spill over parking from downtown. Cars parking on Selby and Hecate Streets limit visibility at the intersection and make crossing the street to reach the park problematic for grownups sometimes. When irresponsible drivers speed in either direction anyone entering or leaving the park would be at risk as a result of the fencing. And as an off leash park needs to be effectively and responsibly contained a gate in that corner is equally questionable as we can't count on everyone to be responsible.

This area of the park is also used by local residents for drum circles, yoga classes, martial arts practice & instruction, family and community gatherings, weddings and a host of equally important community, resident driven activities. My partner and I were married under the large oak in the south east corner of the park in August of 2002.

Once turned into an off leash dog park these areas of the park will no longer be available to the general public for current or future use. An obvious and existing lack of responsibility on the part of some dog owners will lead to clean up issues that will be further complicated by the proposed location being up slope from the play area. As we receive a great deal of winter rain here on Vancouver Island and there is very little soil at the top of the park dog feces and urine will inevitably accumulate and flow towards the play area. Undeniably this accumulation would take time, but, in all honesty, what right do we have to hand our problem to the future. On a more personal level, for a number of years I have studied and taught the martial art of aikido. I have used the rocky outcrop near the pine trees as a meditation and practice area for my continuing study since moving to this neighbourhood. I currently use the large open area to the east of the play area for





group practice with my fellow students. For a number of reasons, many of them connected to irresponsible ownership of animals, I will no longer be able to pursue these activities with my friends in those areas of the park. I would imagine that there are a number of community members that share my position and perspective on this situation.


As a founding member of the Neighbours' of Nob Hill association and as a long time resident of the area, I am well aware of the necessities and challenges of our little community. Across time the association has worked diligently to make the area more livable for the residents of Nob or Nobility Hill. Community driven and supported actions such as the "John Watch" walks of several years ago, the establishment of a "Neighborhood Watch", the eventual declaration of 522 Hecate as a "nuisance property", an expanded presence of Law Enforcement and a number of other resident driven initiatives have changed the face and quality of our community.

At the core of things, it was our intention to create a safe and open park that offered children, individuals and families a place to gather, relax and play that was free of needles, condoms and other refuse. Through the ongoing efforts of myself, my partner and our neighbours' we have an absolute gem where children actually come to play. It is an absolute pleasure to hear the sounds of active kids playing in our park. Less than a dozen years ago that was not possible. I am looking forward to the public consultation aspect of this process as there are a number of factors to be discussed. On the part of the city, it is vital that the wants of the entire community be considered before a decision is made. It is the responsibility of the municipal government to remove personal opinion or agenda from this discussion so that volume is not allowed to overpower good sense. A vocal minority of local dog owners unwilling to access the numerous existing dog parks in Nanaimo is not adequate justification to sacrifice, yet again, such a beautiful green space.

OVERVIEW

Purpose of Report

To provide the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee with the public feedback received since April 2015 on the Beban Park Pickleball Courts Pilot Project and make recommendations on this community request for consideration and approval.

Recommendation

That the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee:

1. maintain the two pickleball courts at Beban Park; and,

establish six new pickleball courts at Beaufort Park in future capital improvements to the existing courts.

BACKGROUND

Pickleball is a racquet sport that combines elements of badminton, tennis, and table tennis. Two, three, or four players use solid paddles made of wood or composite materials to hit a perforated polymer ball, similar to a wiffle ball, over a net. The sport shares features of other racquet sports, the dimensions and layout of a badminton court, and a net and rules similar to tennis, with a few modifications. Pickleball was invented in the mid 1960's but is quickly gaining popularity in Nanaimo and the Central Vancouver Island area. Pickleball can be played inside or outside

At the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission meeting held on 2014-OCT-01, a delegation from the Nanaimo Pickleball Club addressed the limited availability of indoor and outdoor space for playing pickleball. The Club was looking for additional inside space and presented their wish to have dedicated outdoor space as part of the Beban Park Master Plan. The delegates advised that six pickleball courts can fit in the same area as two tennis courts and they would like two courts at Beban Park converted to a dedicated pickleball space. The Commission determined by motion that the matter of converting the tennis courts at Beban Park be referred to the Parks Committee for review as part of the Beban Park Master Plan process.

The Beban Park Master Plan Update 2015 (adopted May 2015) recognizes that the existing tennis courts are a destination for some park users. It also states that park courts should be adaptable and flexible for emerging sport trends as well as traditional sport use.



At their meeting held on 2014-OCT-09, the Parks Committee recommended that the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission:

- approve a one-year pilot project, to be defined subject to start date, to allow for two Pickleball courts within the confines of the tennis court located closest to Bowen Road at Beban Park; and,
- direct Staff to obtain feedback during the pilot and report back to the Commission with the results at the end of the pilot period.

These recommendations were approved by the Commission at their meeting held on 2014-OCT-27.

The pickleball pilot began in April 2015 and a sign was erected at the site requesting feedback from users over the course of the trial period. A copy of the sign is presented in Attachment A.

Public Input:

Over the pilot, seven residents expressed their input to the Parks, Recreation and Environment Department. Feedback was positive from pickleball enthusiasts and more negative from tennis players and is shown in Attachment B.

Statistics in Nanaimo:

There are currently 24 tennis courts in Nanaimo. These courts are in varying conditions and are frequently empty. The tennis courts at Morningside Park and Bowen Park were recently resurfaced and the remaining courts at Beban Park are budgeted to be resurfaced in 2017.

Pickleball is growing in popularity. Between club rentals and parks and recreation drop-in times, pickleball booked Oliver Woods Community Centre for over 1000 hours in 2015 and over 670 hours in 2014. Pickleball bookings for 2016 are already at 700 prior to August. Attachment C presents the booking summary. Outdoor spaces for pickleball play will help to make the sport more accessible to people who cannot attend indoor play during the day and help to deal with sport growth.

Logistics of Court Conversion:

As part of our asset management budgeting, staff are considering resurfacing the aged tennis courts at Beaufort Park in 2017. A pickleball conversion could be integrated into this upgrade which is estimated at \$150,000.

Beaufort Park currently has the space for two tennis courts with one court netted and lined. The courts are rarely used for tennis play and are conveniently located next to a large gravel parking lot. The courts need to be resurfaced and \$150,000 is budgeted for this work. The existing courts at Beaufort Park could be converted into six pickleball courts. These side-by-side courts would be perfect for league and tournament play. Attachment D shows the potential Beaufort Park layout.



OPTIONS

- 1. Approve the recommendations for both sites.
 - Budget Implication: The 10-year capital plan already reflects improvements to the courts at Beban Park. Beaufort Park requires improvements to the hard surface courts - whether suited for pickle ball or tennis.
 - Policy Implication: The Beban Park Master Plan Update supports improvements to the hard surface courts at Beban Park. Beaufort Park does not have a park master plan in place.
 - Engagement Implication: A community engagement process has already taken plan for Beban Park.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: The tennis court assets at both Beban and Beaufort Park are in need of replacement and should meet the changing needs of the community.
- 2. Deny the recommendations for both sites.
 - Budget Implication: Improvements to the surface of the Beban courts are already budgeted for in the 10-year capital plan.
 - Engagement Implication: A public process regarding the Beban Park courts has already taken place.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: Asset management and renewal of existing park infrastructure and facilities still needs to be taken into consideration.
- 3. Approve the recommendations for one site.
 - Budget Implication: Improvements to the surface of the Beban courts are already budgeted for in the 10-year capital plan.
 - Policy Implication: The Beban Park Master Plan Update supports improvements to the hard surface courts at Beban Park.
 - Engagement Implication: A public process regarding the Beban Park courts has already taken place.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: Asset management and renewal of existing park infrastructure and facilities still needs to be taken into consideration.

SUMMARY POINTS

- Pickleball is gaining in popularity, and keeping up with emerging community needs, outdoor courts should be established.
- The Beban pilot project has proven fairly successful and permanent conversion can be included in budgeted capital projects.
- The Beaufort hard surface courts are underutilized and could be converted to pickleball facilities for league and informal play with capital budgeting.



		I am responding to the invitation (posted at the new outdoor Pickleball courts) to write to you.
		First, a big THANK YOU to the Nanaimo PR&C for developing Nanaimo's first dedicated outdoor Pickleball courts. I'm confident that they are (and will be) heavily used – justifying PR&C's expenditures on this initiative.
		I wish to give you a sense of the explosive growth Pickleball is likely to experience in this area over the next few years by describing the growth of Pickleball in the Arizona community (Sun City Festival) http://www.delwebb.com/communities/az/buckeye/sun-city-festival/11852/index1.aspx#.VZIKR_nzNsk) where we stay in winter.
Ernest	2015-JUL-05	This community started to be developed almost 10 years ago in the desert northwest of greater Phoenix. The developer (Pulte Homes) had assembled a land bank for retirement (55+) community (Sun City Festival) that would ultimately have over 7000 homes, two 18-hole golf courses, two large recreation/social centers, etc. The recreational facilities initially developed were expected and intended to serve the first 3000+homes. These included one 18-hole golf course, one large recreation/social center, a softball field, 8 pickleball courts, 6 tennis courts, etc.
		My wife and I bought a home there in late 2007 and soon learner the sport of Pickleball (which we had never previously heard of). The community has now grown to 2000 homes. Pickleball has become so popular there that the developer's initial formula/ratio of 8 pickleball courts to 6 tennis courts has proven to be completely "out of whack". On a typical morning last winter, all 8 pickleball courts would be occupied (by 32 people playing doubles) with another 12 to 15 people waiting to rotate in, while only 3 or 4 tennis courts would be in use. The Pickleball Club (http://www.scfpickleballclub.com/) had over 400 members from these 2000 homes — at 2 people per home. That means that ove 10% of the residents are in the PB Club — and there are additional casual players not in the Club.
		The pressure on court time has become so great that the developer has agreed to build another 21 courts over the next year! (http://www.scfpickleballclub.com/proposed-pb-complex.html). That gives you an indication of the dramatic



		growth in the popularity of Pickleball in the southern states over the past few years.
		Canada's PB growth curve appears to be 3 – 5 years behind the US as snowbirds introduce and popularize the game in Canada. If the ultimate participation rate amongst the 55+ demographic in Nanaimo is, say, 5% (vs. Over 10% of our Arizona retirement community), that would represent:
		5% of (0.102 + 0.168) x 90,000 = 1215 potential "senior" players
		Note: I've obtained the 0.102 and 0.168 figures from the 2001 Census which reported that 10.2% of Nanaimo residents were age 55-64 and 16.8% were 65+. (The February, 2005 PR&C Master Plan [Lanarc Consultants) projected that these segments would form an even higher fraction of the population over the next 10 years.]
		And, of course, PB will start to grow among younger adults.
		The new outdoor courts at Beban has helped to reduce the number of Nanaimo players that were increasingly driving off to Fuller Lake or Parksville to take advantage of the better ratios of courts/population in those communities. Going forward, I've no doubt that an additional 4 to 6 outdoor courts would be well used and justified.

They already have more players than the 2 courts can accommodate so his wish is that, it the future, we put multiple courts (ideally 6) at one location to accommodate clinics, tournaments or club play. He doesn't care where we do this e.g. Beban or Divers Lake, but multiple courts is best. He'd also like the courts to be screened in similar to the Bowen Courts. I told him the Bowen screening was a donation and he said his club has a 'fair' amount of money so that might be something they can help with.

This is not a changing community trend, it is a new sport that is now catching on in Canada, primarily enjoyed by the older generation, it requires a little less movement and skill than tennis. I have played pickle ball and have enjoyed it too. You may say you are just removing one court but come



		along on a busy day and you will see how much difference that one court makes especially when lessons are being taught on two courts. Leaving only three courts available.
		One of my friends volunteers her time teaching tennis to the youth just outside of Nanaimo and she has said it is a growing sport for ages 5 to 70 or more. 

OVERVIEW

Purpose of Report

To provide Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee with background information on the Bourbon Park Partners in Parks (PIP) Program request for consideration and approval.

Recommendation

That the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee allocate the remaining funds of \$18,243 from the 2016 Partners in Parks (PIP) Program budget, and, earmark \$1,757 from the 2017 Partners in Parks (PIP) Program budget for a total of \$20,000 for Bourbon Neighbourhood Park Improvements.

BACKGROUND

Bourbon Neighbourhood Park is a 0.08 ha undeveloped neighborhood park. It is zoned PRC-2 which allows for playgrounds and other "active" park amenities and was acquired by the City through recent subdivision. It could potentially grow through additional development in the future.

The Park is currently undeveloped at the entrance to this new residential neighbourhood. The Park provides a slight buffer to the industrial development behind this neighbourhood on Boxwood Road.

After a neighborhood request to better utilize and beautify this public space, a PIP start-up meeting was held on 2015-SEP-22. Residents attended and indicated support of park greening, planting shade trees, and installation of a playground. A picnic table and bench, park name sign and no dumping sign, and buffer planting to screen the industrial area have also been requested.

This Park is zoned PRC-2 and has been designated as such in anticipation of future active recreation amenities. This park is well over a five-minute walk (400m distance) from the closest playgrounds at Beban Park and Forest Drive Gyro Park, as well as being across Bowen Road which creates a major divide. Discussions did emerge in late 2015 about playground development at nearby Fern Park (about 350m away) but no progress or further interest has emerged at the Fern Park site.



Funds from the PIP program are approved and allocated on a first-come, first-served basis. Currently, \$18,243 funds remain in the 2016 budget to support PIP program park development and \$100,000 is expected to be allocated for 2017.

If approved, a project account will be set aside for the Bourbon Park improvements. All disbursements from the account will be City controlled, and the project will not start until all fundraising and in-kind support is confirmed.

OPTIONS

- 1. Approve the recommendation and budget allocation.
 - Budget Implication: There is only \$18,243 remaining in the PIP account for 2016 projects. Money from the 2017 account could be earmarked to meet the remaining funding request.
 - **Engagement Implication:** Public engagement has already been completed in PIP community process.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: Meets goals for Community building partnerships.
- 2. Deny the recommendation and budget allocation.
 - Budget Implication: Monies will remain in the PIP account for 2016.
 - **Engagement Implication:** Public engagement has already been completed in PIP community process and the efforts put in by the neighbourhood would be affected.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: Momentum amongst community partners for the project may be lost.
- 3. Approve a varied budget allocation.
 - Budget Implication: There is only \$18,243 remaining in the PIP account for 2016 projects. If a lesser dollar figure is granted, the project will either be scaled back or neighbours will have to increase fundraising.
 - **Engagement Implication:** Public engagement has already been completed in PIP community process.
 - Strategic Priorities Implication: Meets goals for Community building partnerships.

SUMMARY POINTS

- A collaborative concept plan has been developed as a long term vision to move forward with for the neighborhood park development.
- Bourbon Park is zoned PRC-2 which supports playground improvements.
- Improvements would be implemented with assistance from the PIP grant and the volunteer efforts and donations from the neighborhood and neighborhood connections.

- Swale in the park and underground servicing



Please accept this letter as an application, by the residents of Silver Valley and Bourbon Road and the surrounding area, to the Partners in Parks (PIP) program. We are requesting a grant of \$22,000 to install playground equipment, benches, a picnic table and suitable plantings for our vacant lot.

Background

The Silver Valley Road and Bourbon Road development is situated in between an industrial area and a suburban area. Our neighbourhood is very unique in that our homes are so close to large industrial businesses. Being that we are so close to these businesses the neighbourhood is really lacking an area for children to safely play.

Bourbon and Silver Valley Roads are also surrounded by Meredith and Boxwood Roads. These are two very heavily used roads by not only local traffic but by heavy duty vehicles that are housed in the surrounding industrial area.

Being that our neighbourhood is tucked in behind Meredith Road, it makes our vacant lot so idyllic for a safe and quiet area for local children to play.

On just our two small streets alone, there are multiple residents with children under the age of 12, as well as residents with grandchildren that visit on a regular basis. There is also a significant amount of families that live on busy Meredith Road with children under 12. We believe that with

a new playground addition parents will be breathing a sigh of relief having a safe and welcoming place for their children to play.

At this time, within our general area there are no playground facilities within a 1 km walk, with the closest playground being either Forest Park Elementary School or Altrusa playground at Beban Park. These locations are also not accessible without having to cross heavy traffic roads that need parent supervision. The nearest park is Fern Park and it is just grass and trees with no play equipment. The next developed city park with a playground is Forest Drive Gyro Park and that is 1.3 km away from Bourbon Road; these distances are not consistent with Nanaimo's plan to have playgrounds within 0.5 km (about a 5 minute walk for adults) of residential areas.

- May 2016 Final working group meeting prior to commission presentation



Vision and Wish List

Our vision is to create a multifunctional space to be used by our diverse residential population, with the most attention being spent on a safe play area for children. We would like the completed amenities to blend in with a natural landscape.

- One small playground at the back left corner of the lot with equipment that is appropriate for toddlers as well as children between the ages of 2 and 12,
- We would like the play equipment's colour schemes to fit in with the natural looking green space,
- We would like to plant some low maintenance buffer plants to be placed along the back fence to hide the Longwood Brewery to reduce noise pollution,
- A decorative wooden fence between the play area and the road,
- · Grass,
- Picnic table installed,
- Low maintenance trees/shrubbery,
- Park name sign,
- No dumping sign,
- Removal of hazardous trees.



Budget and Community Fundraising

We recognize that significant donations of time, labour, materials and services will be necessary to construct Bourbon Park. Already, numerous residents have expressed their willingness to contribute labour to this project.

Westcore, a local mechanical and electrical company, has already offered labour and use of their tools for the construction of the playground. Country Grocery has offered to donate supplies for a construction wrap-up party.

Grants from an extensive list of service groups, financial institutions, and large businesses with a local presence have been applied for; however, we have not been informed the organizations have selected their grant recipients.

Our fundraising committee has been in contact with the Longwood Brewery. Longwood Brewery has a two-day beer/music festival called LongwoodStock planned for August, which involves an afternoon and early evening party on their Boxwood Road property, the south-adjacent property to Bourbon Park. The organizers of the festival have acknowledged that their party will and has inconvenienced the residents of Bourbon and Silver Valley Roads in the past. As such, we are confident we will be able to secure a substantial donation from either Longwood Brewery or through LongwoodStock. The festival planning committee will meet in May and will be able to confirm if they are able to provide park funding.

As a newer housing development with an extensive neighbouring commercial area, we also have developers, builders, landscapers and realtors working in the area on an ongoing basis, many of whom we have or will be contacting for fundraising. Although we don't have fundraising complete, we are confident of our ability to fulfill our obligations to this project.

SUBJECT TRAVEL ASSISTANCE GRANT – NANAIMO LAWN BOWLING CLUB

OVERVIEW

Purpose of Report

To request that the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee recommend that Council approve a request from the Nanaimo Lawn Bowling Club for a Travel Assistance Grant.

Recommendation

That the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee recommend that Council approve the application for a Travel Assistance Grant to Nanaimo Lawn Bowling Club in the amount of \$350 for seven (7) athletes to attend the Blind Bowlers Association of Canada National Championships being held in Ladner, B.C., during the period 2016-SEP-12 through 2016-SEP-18.

BACKGROUND

The City of Nanaimo provides a contingency account for amateur sports and cultural groups, and individuals to travel within B.C. (excluding travel on Vancouver Island) and out of province to a Regional, National or International Championship. These funds are available to sports and cultural groups qualifying in Provincial or Regional competitions and the current policy provides \$50 per person to a maximum of \$1,000 per application for travel within B.C. or \$100 per person to a maximum of \$2,000 per application for travel outside of B.C. Requests are considered on a first-come, first-served, basis as funds remain available.

Staff review all Travel Assistance Grant applications and forward the recommendation to the Parks, Recreation & Wellness Committee for review and recommendation to Council.

On 2016-SEP-07, staff reviewed a Travel Assistance Grant application submitted by Nanaimo Lawn Bowling Club requesting financial assistance for seven (7) athletes to represent Nanaimo at the Blind Bowlers Association of Canada National Championships being held in Ladner, B.C., during the period 2016-SEP-12 through 2016-SEP-18. Staff determined that this application met all of the grant criteria and recommend approval of the application.



OPTIONS

- 1. Approve the Travel Assistance Grant.
 - **Budget Implication:** To date, \$4,600 from the 2016 travel grants contingency funds has been awarded or is pending. If the above travel grant of \$350 is approved, \$2,550 will remain available for any additional 2016 travel grant requests.
 - Engagement Implication: Promotes excellence in sports and culture.
- 2. Deny the Travel Assistance Grant.
 - Budget Implication: To date, \$4,600 from the 2016 travel grants contingency funds has been awarded or is pending. \$2,900 will remain available for additional 2016 travel grant requests.
