
3. Active Listening

The problem

- November 19, 2014 -- email sent to mayor -- no reply
- February 12, 2015 -- written letter mailed to mayor -- again no reply
- November 10, 2015 -- email inquiry sent to councillors Hong, Kip, Yoachim - also no reply
- November 13, 2015 -- telephone call to City Hall about "open" meetings
- 34.7% voter participation in 2014 Nanaimo city election, 27% in 2011
- Systemic lack of opportunity for grassroots community engagement and participation in city governance between elections

Dear Mr. McKay,

Congratulations on your well deserved win in last Saturday's election. My faith in the electoral process was bolstered substantially by the election outcomes.

I am particularly interested in your ideas about reforming the committee process. While the voter turnout improved over 2011, it remains dismal at 33%. Therefore, I suggest that as part of your committee reform, you establish a new committee called the "community engagement committee" (or some such like title). Such a committee would have as one of its primary goals increasing voter turnout and engagement with local government. Additionally, it would seek to facilitate greater community dialogue and discussion at the grassroots level, build community social networks, and foster greater community cohesion.

Such a committee would be welcomed by the community and if driven by the grassroots community (rather than elites) could help remedy the poor impression Nanaimo's previous government left with its citizens. I would be happy to discuss this idea further with you and would like to be involved in such a committee.

Mayor Bill McKay will take on the lion's share of political seats this term, according to a new roster of council appointments.

Political appointments to the city's boards and committees were announced by the mayor Monday, with the heaviest assignment loads going to McKay and councillors Jim Kipp and Jerry Hong.

According to McKay, tasks were assigned based on job demands and councillors' interests. He took a lot of 'fill ins' for positions others weren't keen on.

Ten appointments in total have gone to the mayor, with half to external boards and liaison committees like the Tripartite Liaison Committee and Greater Nanaimo Chamber of Commerce. Hong will have positions on the Regional District of Nanaimo board and six city committees – the highest number of internal seats given to any one councillor – including the new Youth Advisory Council, while Kipp saw most of his seven appointments to external groups.

Coun. Diane Brennan will join five committees and boards which include the Culture and Heritage Commission and a return to the Advisory Committee on Environmental Sustainability and Social Planning Advisory Committee. Coun. Wendy Pratt will join Brennan on the Culture and Heritage Commission, as well as groups like the Grants Advisory Committee and Parks and Recreation Committee.

What are they?

- A new way for residents to connect with their City.
- A secure place that effectively allows residents to have input and say.
- A convenient way to provide input.

A Proposal

Establish a new committee -- the "community engagement committee"

- 8 to 10 members, with one council member (rotated annually)
- Meet monthly (or every two months) as a committee
- Have a regular quarterly (or bi-annual) forum for citizens
- Have a blog or webpage (and online forum)
- Produce an annual report to city council

OBJECTIVES & PRINCIPLES

- 1. build greater grassroots community engagement with city governance
- 2. provide an opportunity for interested ordinary citizens to collaborate and discuss ideas about Nanaimo
- 3. provide authentic feedback and ideas to city council
- 4. seek to increase voter participation for the next election
- 5. build greater community cohesiveness and social capital
- 6. be a non-"political", low stakes discussion forum for citizens

Discussion on any topic, but guided by committee objectives

- minimal cost
- minimal risk
- tremendous upside
