Housing is only one of several dimensions of any thriving citizen. Individuals with lived experience of, or at-risk for, homelessness may have multiple unmet needs.



- 1 Personal, gender, spiritual and cultural safety; sense of belonging; inclusiveness; and community integration.
- 2 Housing needs (e.g., family reunification, independent housing, shelter, supportive housing, addiction treatment/recovery housing).
- 3 Care for problematic substance use, mental health challenges, and physical well-being including vision, auditory, and dental health.
- Labour market engagement and purposeful activity by connecting employers with employees and organizations with volunteers.
- 5 Life skills development; high-school equivalency; continuing education; knowledge & skills certification; work readiness skills; and/or job training.
- Resolution of legal issues including immigration status, justice system involvement, securing government benefits, family law, housing and employment rights.





To relieve poverty and advance the education of persons in British Columbia who are poor, addicted to drugs and/or alcohol, unemployed, criminals, and/or disabled.

Establish and maintain a residential facility in British Columbia designed to house and accommodate such people and teach them vocational, interpersonal and social skills, personal awareness, independent living skills, earned positive self-concept and accountability, responsibility and habits.

Residents will be led towards a life of independence, integrity and purpose in order to help them integrate, work, and participate in mainstream society.

The Model

- It is a highly structured 2–4-year live-in community that provides a pathway towards a preferred life path for those exiting correctional facilities, and/or wishing to leave life on the streets behind.
- Community members engage in purposeful and meaningful activities that contribute to developing life skills and prosocial behaviours, achieving high school equivalency, and learning three marketable vocations.
- For 52 years, this evidence-based, peer-led model has capitalized on the inherent power of 'each one, teach one' to prepare individuals to rejoin society with confidence, motivation, skills, knowledge, and fortitude to forge a new path for themselves.





A Place to Learn, Lead, and Earn

Delancey Street provides an attractive, empowering opportunity for vulnerable individuals to learn, lead, and earn, at no cost to participating members, family, or government.

The model sustains itself through the sale of goods and services delivered through Delancey Street's own vocational training schools, staffed by seasoned members of the community.

Vocational training schools are developed to meet local needs (e.g., trades, tourism & hospitality, bicycle repair, organic farming, moving & trucking).

A person must:

- ✓ ask for help for himself/ herself/themself
- ✓ Make a two-year minimum commitment
- ✓ Be willing to accept a very structured environment from dawn to dusk
- ✓ Accept three essential rules:
 - 1. No physical violence
 - 2. No threats of violence
 - 3. No drugs or alcohol
