Emerging Issues & Opportunities

- CleanBC Better Homes Municipal Top-up Rebate Program extended from March 31, 2024 to March 31, 2025 but remaining budget will likely run out in April 2024
- Establishing a home retrofit financing program will likely require additional capacity and grant funding support
- E-bike program to be developed after E-Mobility Strategy completion with opportunity for top-up if the Provincial Electric Rebate Program for 2024 is confirmed







Budget: \$300,000/year




















East Wellington at Madsen Traffic Signal





Emerging Issues & Opportunities

- Community partnerships to enable facility and infrastructure growth such as the Japanese Canadian Legacies Society infrastructure grant and BC Heritage Site grant.
- Natural Areas expand restoration work and review natural assets and urban trees.
- Growth (both of the parks and trails system and its amenities and growth in the
 parks userbase)- While operational budgets do grow, maintenance team capacity is
 not in step with growth. There is an opportunity to build Parks Operations
 maintenance crews to be able to proactively maintain parks assets and stop the
 break-fix cycle.
- Annual program funding for some annual programs has not increased over time impacting project outcomes. Partners in Parks for example.
