Overview



Systems Planning Organization Reason for Being

The HHAP supports a **Systems Planning Organization** to help optimize a current approach and maximize return on investment.

The SPO's primary focus is on the resources to meet the housing needs of for housing: seniors, Indigenous peoples, people with diverse abilities, families, dealing with mental health and addiction issues, veterans and young adults.

Systems Planning Organization Mandate

Recognize the collective value of multiple sectors and organizations working together with a common goal to build strong relationships, develop a well-resourced and high-functioning sector and to address homelessness:

- <u>Research, data, analysis, education and information</u> related to the community's collective homelessness prevention and response priorities;
- <u>Convene</u> transparent leadership in support of the entire community for housing and homelessness;
- <u>Coordinate a systems approach to homelessness planning</u> that connects the sectors together through information and analysis about funding and resources, client service needs, and shared accountability measures to advance strategic outcomes; and
- Identify, communicate and coordinate approaches to deal with <u>system gaps</u>, <u>priorities and opportunities</u>.

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Systems Planning Organization Governance Structure

The SPO is an independent, non-aligned agency that jointly manages and makes decisions through an equitable structure. This structure is defined within parameters of the *Society Act*.

Board of Directors:

 9 Board Members: City of Nanaimo, SFN, Prosperity, Practitioners, Community

Staff: Team of 4

Executive Director, Research, Data and Communications, SPO Manager

Operating Approach in Community

- We Leverage Resources, Capacity, Data
- Facilitate, Collaborate, Convene and Provide Research with City, Partners, Stakeholder and Funders
- We Seek Resources for the Community Housing Effort
 - Support local housing related organizations
 - Emergency Weather Response Program
 - CMHC Research Fund
 - Rental Protection Fund
 - BC Housing HEART/HEARTH Funding
 - Island Health Road to Recovery Funding

Activities in Progress

- SPO Taskforce (reconstituted HH Taskforce)
- Funding for Programming: Expand BC Housing Extreme Weather Response
- Capital Development Services:
 - Support for community redevelopment opportunities, including partnerships that will move latent redevelopment toward housing
 - Add annually to the below market housing stock, urban Indigenous housing, shelter spaces, long-term transitional housing
- Opportunities to enhance Community Outreach:
 - Standards of Practice, HR support and training, etc.
 - Supporting funding opportunities

In Summary: Work of the SPO Increased Resources and Shelter/Housing

- Laser Focused on Gaps and Leverage Points
 - E.g. Non-Profit and Community Re-Development Support

• Every Action of the SPO is tied to INCREASING:

- Supply of below market/subsidized housing stock and shelter spaces
- Supply of related Housing Services
